Garfield and the Chinese Question.

The Democratic journals on this Coast are studiously misrepresenting Garfield's action on the Chinese question. Mr. Garfield simply proposed to respect the usages of nations in the modification of our Chinese treaty, and that was certainly done with power which we were on terms of friendly commercial intercourse. It shows that his statesmanship rises above mere partisan intrigue, and should be a recommendation for him as a candidate for President. The San Francisco Chronicle comments on the subject thus:

There is much popular misconception of Garfield's position in regard to the Chinese immigration. It has been stated that he is a strong pro-Chinese man, but there is nothing in his record to bear out such a reproach. In common with a large number of public men at the East he held that the only way to secure a settlement of the vexed question was by revising the Burlingame treaty. This is the attitude which sensible men in this State have come to adopt. It has brought home to every man that senseless agitation of the Chinese question is of no interest to any one except those who depend upon it for a political effect. The position of all who are not making the Chinese question a vehicle for partisan purposes is exactly the position which Garfield took in the debate in the House of Representatives on the "fifteen passenger act" on January 28, 1879. After the bill had been amended to take effect on July 9th, the following debate occurred, according to the official report in the Congressional Record:

The Speaker—The question now is on the engrossment and third reading of the bill as amended.

Mr. Garfield—I ask unanimous consent, Mr. Speaker, to offer an amendment, that this bill shall not take effect until due notice has been given to China, according to the usages of international law, of the termination of the treaty against which it is a palpable and flat violation.

The Speaker—That is in the nature of the debate.

Mr. Garfield—My amendment will be received unless this bill is merely for party capital.

Mr. Cox of New York—I object, unless I have a chance to answer the gentleman from Ohio.

The bill was then read a third time, and after some efforts to adjourn, the previous question was called, a vote was taken and the bill passed, yeas 155, noes 72, not voting 61. Garfield was among those who did not vote. He evidently was determined not to countenance so unstatesmanlike a measure by voting for it, but did not wish to place any unnecessary obstacle in the way of the passage of the bill, although it did not meet his views.

CHESTER A. ARTHUR.

An Eastern eclogue contains the following brief sketch of C. A. Arthur who is to succeed Wheeler as Vice President of the United States. Mr. Arthur was born at Franklin, Vt., October 15, 1839. He entered Union college, New York, at the early age of 14 years and graduated at the age of 18. He soon after entered the law office of Hon. E. D. Culver, of New York city, who was a strong anti-slavery man, and here Mr. Arthur imbibed strong Republican sentiments. At the age of 23 he was a delegate to the first State Republican convention in New York. He was the counsel in the celebrated Lemon slave case, which followed the course of the courts to the Supreme Court. The anti-slavery men chose Mr. Arthur to defend the fugitive, which he did with such energy and consummate ability that he was at once a marked man. Like Garfield, he is a student, and a man who believes that every American citizen, young and old, should bear his part of the political burden. In 1861 Governor Morgan made him Inspector-General of New York, and by his energy and skillful management the troops began to move forward from New York well armed and equipped for their work. In 1871 he was made Collector of the port of New York, which he filled until 1878, when he was removed by President Hayes, not for any misdemeanor, but because of a difference of opinion upon certain questions of political policy. We have it from men who know General Arthur that his personal character is in every way above reproach, and that he is a man of excellent business and professional qualities, and will make a commanding presiding office in the U. S. Senate.

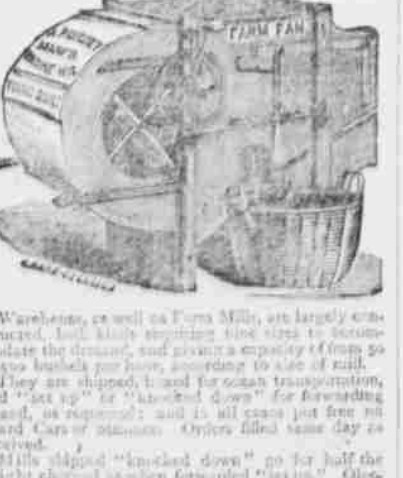
