Garfield and the "Salary Grab."

Among the charges that the Democrats are making against Gen. Garfield, in the vain hope to defeat him, is that he favored the "salary grab" was indeed chiefly responsible for it, and pocketed his share of it. The facts, says the New York Tribune, are directly contradictory to these statements, and are so easily accessible to every man who cares to know the truth that it is simply stupidity to try to pervert them. The salary grab was put on to the Legislative Appropriation bill as an amendment by General Butler, seven days before the adjournment of Congress, in the spring of 1873. As chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, Garfield was in charge of the bill. He opposed Butler's amendment earnestly, and voted against it at every stage. There was a bitter contest, which ended the day before adjournment in the reference of the bill to a conference committee, of which Garfield was a member. He made the report that committee a few hours before adjournment, and, in doing so, he said: "I was opposed to the increase in conference as I have been opposed to it in the discussions and in my voice here; but my assistant conferences were in favor of the amendment, and I was compelled to choose between signing the report and bringing on an extra session of Congress." He was the only member of the conference committee of six who opposed the grab, and he subsequently voted for the bill with the obnoxious amendment solely to save the country the expense of an extra session. His share of the swindle he returned to the Treasury, but said nothing about having done so till the charge was made in the following campaign that he had pocketed it. He then published a letter, going over his own signature showing his whole attitude in reference to the bill, and announcing that his share in the profits had been left in the Treasury under such orders as left it beyond the reach of him or his heirs. That statement buried the slander until the present time.

A Progressive Man.

There is something in the career of a man like General Garfield, that commands the respect and admiration of the masses of the people, and especially of the younger class of voters. A man over whose boyhood the shadow of poverty was thrown, and who, by his own persevering energy, integrity and talents, has overcome the difficulties and drawbacks of obscurity and want, and has placed himself in the position in which Garfield stands to-day, is worthy of honor. It is the pride of our institutions that they afford the opportunity for a young man of commanding talent, by an industrious and honorable course of life, to reach even the highest positions within the gift of a great people, and it should be equally our pride that those qualities that serve to elevate the obscure and to enoble those who have the misfortune to be born in poverty, are appreciated and rewarded. The man who labored for his daily bread, in whatever station he may afterward be found, has sympathy for the honest laborer, and is ever ready to extend to him such assistance as may lay within his power to bestow. General Garfield has passed through every grade of manhood and social position, from the day-laborer, boatman, carpenter, schoolmaster, lawyer, general, member of Congress, and U. S. Senator. He is now the spontaneous choice of the Republican party for President, and he deserves the support of all who recognize the correctness of the principles of the Republican party.

OREGON'S MEMBERSHIP.—Gov. Thayer has nominated as members of the International Commission of Oregon, in accordance with the provisions of an act of Congress approved April 23, 1880, C. H. Lewis and Levi White as Commissioners, and Henry Failing and Frank Dokum, all of Portland, as alternates, to perfect arrangements for an International Exhibition, to take place in New York city in 1883, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the treaty of peace and recognition of American Independence, by an exhibit of the arts and manufactures and products of the soil and mines of this, our great and glorious country.
