Bitter feeling prevails against the whites on account of certain parties furnishing Indians with liquor, and while in a state of intoxication, ravishing the squaws.

RAPID WORK.—A Dayton, Ohio, dispatch of the 28th ult. says: This morning the gauge on the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio railroad was changed from board to standard gauge. Two thousand five hundred men were placed along the line from Dayton to Leavittsburg, distance 225 miles, and work began at 3 o'clock A. M., and the last spike was driven at 9:30 A. M.—the shortest piece of work of this kind on record.

THE outlook at the present time is that this year's crops will be most abundant. A Southern Senator announced the other day that the cotton crop would be the greatest on record, and from present indications it appears that the grain crop will exceed any that has been harvested. Reports of increased acreage come from all directions. From some points decreased acreage is reported, but the percentage is very small indeed. Unless something untoward occurs, the crop of 1880 will turn out a magnificent one.

A SCHOOLMASTER.—In his early

manhood Garfield taught a district school in Ohio, and boarded round. His wardrobe was scanty, consisting of but one suit of blue jeans.
