Hancock is Not the Man. The Chicago Times, during the Cincinnati Convention and when it first became apparent that Hancock was the man on whom the nomination would fall, used the following language: "The Democratic party cannot stultify itself by putting any mere military man in the field. A record of loyalty during the war is, no doubt, essential, but the party cannot afford to go to the extreme of nominating a man who is nothing else than a soldier, and not a very brilliant one at that. Hancock is emphatically not the man for the occasion."

This is undoubtedly a candid expression of a sensible Democrat. A military man who has had some responsibility as a commander in chief where questions of policy and statesmanship have arisen, may have some practical views of the duties of President of the United States, but a soldier like Hancock who has always acted in a subordinate position, who "is nothing else, and not a very brilliant one at that," is the poorest material in the world for that high office. He becomes, as President, a branch of the legislative power of the Government; his veto power is the guardian of the Constitutional rights of the people, and a man of merely a military education, and of only a military experience, whose paramount virtue is that he occupied the position of a general in the army of the Union, and yet maintained his allegiance to a party that was in sympathy with the rebellion, is unfitted for the duties of that position. Because he always acted under the orders of his superiors, and has thus escaped personal responsibility, very little can be said against him. Not even the responsibility of a voting member of Congress has he ever borne. For a military officer, he is well enough, but as a candidate for President, he "is emphatically not the man."

The Last Session a Failure. The New York Times in an able editorial article, reviews the record of the Democratic majority in Congress for the past session, and although the session was of more than six months' duration, shows that it has been most completely barren of good, either to the country or to the party which held the majority in both houses. It says that, judged from the stand point chosen by themselves in the last campaign, the Democrats must regard their record at this session as one of mortifying failure. They professed the purpose to force a repeal of the Federal election system at any cost, and have not even seriously commenced the task. Some of the more conservative of their leaders promised that if the system could not be abolished it should at least be stripped of what they called its partisan features. Mr. Bayard, their most accomplished lawyer and legislator, framed a bill for that purpose, and it was passed. He has now the humiliation of seeing it returned by the President with unreserved approval of its principle, but with a conclusive demonstration that either by intentional duplicity or inexplicable bungling it was so framed that it could not possibly be put into operation.

The Democrats, during the last canvass, as they have at all times for the past seven years, denounced the national bank currency as a costly and needless burden upon the people, and demanded its withdrawal and its replacement by some form of Treasury notes. Although possessing entire control of both houses of Congress, they have not taken a step to carry these views into effect, while, as if to bring their imbecility in action in sharp contrast with their extreme professions, the majority of them in the House, led by a Greenbacker, voted for a resolution reiterating the principle that all currency should be issued by the Government and should be legal tender.

A SPECIAL from Fort Stockton, Texas, says: Major R. G. Lawrence and a corps of Texas and Pacific railroad engineers, after a number of days of extreme suffering from thirst, in the white sand hills, arrived at the Pecos river without loss of life. Some stock and wagons were abandoned at different intervals for forty miles. Those arriving first at the river went in search of others. A number of them were found crazy by thirst and had entirely stripped themselves. They were found within a hundred yards of the Pecos river, drinking the blood of animals they had slain. Some of them were almost blind. Arriving at the river they plunged in head foremost, and but for the bravery of the most experienced, a number would have perished.
