News from the Arctic-Whaleship Lost.

The steamer "Dora" arrived in this port Thursday afternoon, twelve days from Oumalaska, Alaska Territory. She reports that she left at Oumalaska the Alaska Commercial Company's steamer "St. Paul," which had just arrived from St. Michaels, to which port the United States Revenue steamer "Thomas Corwin," returned July 28th from a cruise in the Arctic, and to which it intended returning July 11th, after having received a fresh supply of coal, and repairs, having received damages to her rudder in attempting to force her way through the ice.

Vessels Wrecked.

The steamship "Granada" which arrived in San Francisco a short time since from Panama via coast ports, brought Capt. T. A. Jacobson and crew of the wrecked schooner "Dreadnought." The schooner sailed hence on the 23d of May for La Paz and other Mexican ports with a general cargo. She had an uneventful passage down to Mazatlan, which port she left on the 27th of June and proceeded to Navidad. She was loaded with cedar logs when a heavy gale came on from the southwest. Both cables were parted, and she was driven ashore on the 4th instant. The next day the Captain of the port went on board and took charge of the vessel as agent of the underwriters.

The "Dulcinea" says: It is stated that John Crowell, formerly of Camp-tonville, Cal., who left the country about sixteen years ago very mysteriously, returned to his former place of residence on Saturday a week ago. Sixteen years ago he left his home for San Francisco, with the intention of returning within a week or so. Everybody supposed he was dead until about a week ago. He says he was shipwrecked on board a vessel and carried off. During his absence his wife died, and on his return the people of Camp-tonville were strangers to him. Crowell, many years ago, represented Yuba county in the State Legislature.

Working on the railroad in British Columbia are now 1,300 men, a little over half the number being Chinamen.

Of the late Bishop Ames the following anecdote is related: While presiding over a certain conference in the West, a member began a tirade against the universities, education, etc., thanking God that he had never been corrupted by contact with a college. After proceeding thus a few minutes the bishop interrupted him with the question: "Do I understand that the brother thanks God for his ignorance?" "Well, yes," was the answer, "you can put it that way if you want to."

This famine in Kurdistan is still so terrible that at El-Kosh the Kurds have sold hundreds of young girls at about \$10 a head in order to buy food. The British Consul, the Armenian relief committees and the American missionaries have been most active, and have done all in their power to alleviate the miseries of the famished population; but the means at their disposal are very insufficient, and there has been hitherto great difficulty in transporting grain from one district to another, partly on account of the deep snow and condition of the roads, and partly on account of the general insecurity.

FRANKFORT-ON-THHE-MAIN, with a population of about 100,000, is reported to be the richest city of its size in the whole world. It is asserted that there are one hundred Frankforters worth from four million dollars to five million dollars each, and two hundred and fifty who are worth one million dollars and upward. The city is one of the great banking centres of the globe. Its aggregate banking capital is estimated at two hundred million dollars—more than one-fourth of which the Rothschilds, whose original and parent house is there, own and control.

A TELEGRAM from the war department from Fort Leavenworth states that Col. Valla makes a report of a fight between a portion of his force and Indians at Pine Mountain. Four Indians were killed; one soldier killed and three wounded. The troops also lost ten horses. Col. Valla says he is making a combined movement on the Indians of Sierra Fuwa, the band of which range is at right angles with the Sierra Del Banacks bordering the river. His entire force consisted of about 600.

The floods in Moravia, Galacia and Silesia are very serious. Railway transit is interrupted, bridges carried away and rivers overflowing the banks. Great loss is sustained in crops and moveable property.

The trial of Mrs. Clark and son, at Seattle, is in progress. It will be remembered that Mrs. Clark told her son, only ten or twelve years of age, to kill Michael Padden, and he obeyed the order.

EXPERIMENTS in growing rust-proof wheat in California, originally brought from Iowa, have been tried in San Joaquin county for several years. The wheat is dark-colored. This season a considerable quantity of it was raised on Roberts Island.

FOUR hundred men are employed on the Mioene ditch, Butte county, Cal. Over 9,126 feet of flume are ready for the trestle-work. In Owens canyon the flume will be fastened by iron brackets to the face of a cliff, at a height of 127 feet. Over 1,600,000 feet of lumber will be used.

FRANCE has the largest wheat area in proportion to population of any country in Europe; but while England's average wheat is from 28 to 30 bushels per acre, that of France is only 12 1/2. An increase of one bushel an acre there would amount to 16,000,000 bushels. This small yield is attributed to poor cultivation, in the South to the dryness of the climate in spring.

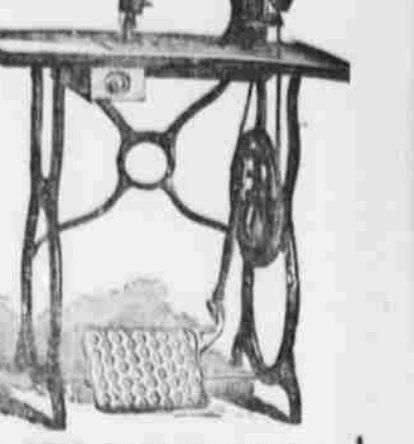
