THE consul for the Chinese, Mr. Bee, received private but official advice by the steamship Oceanic, at San Francisco, that the United States commission to negotiate a new treaty on the Chinese immigration question would be met half way by the Chinese Government, and that all misunderstandings will be speedily and amicably arranged.

ADVICES state that the Chileans appear more determined than ever to capture Lima, and have gathered a force of 30,000 about the city, which they propose to increase to 45,000. The garrison consists of 10,000 effective men. It is stated that the Chileans have 6,000 effective men in the northern department of Peru, destroying plantations and sacking defenseless towns.

A TELEGRAM to the Cleveland Leader says that Geo. W. Keithley, who has been prominent in the Democratic party of Ottawa county, Ohio, since the Greeley movement, and has just retired from the office of Democratic Prosecuting Attorney, says he must vote for Garfield, that his experience as a soldier and recollections of the war will not permit him to join the rebels now.

News from Hong Kong says there is no certainty as to peace or war between Russia and China; the latter power is irritated at the generally aggressive character of foreign missions, especially at the mission now on the way from the United States, which is awaited with deep interest.
