Siglin's 'Alien' Bill.

Senator Siglin has introduced in the Legislature a bill purporting to license aliens to carry on lucrative avocations in this State. It would compel any foreigner to declare his intention to become a citizen or pay a special tax of one dollar per month. Sections 1 and 6 contain the gist of the whole bill, and read as follows:

SECTION 1. Any alien following any lucrative occupation in the State of Oregon, after a residence of six months in this State, shall obtain a license to carry on such business from the County Clerk of the county in which he may reside, by paying to such Clerk the sum of one dollar per month, for the benefit of such county; but no license shall issue for less than one month.

SECTION 6. This enactment shall not apply to any alien who may have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, nor to any person who might become a citizen of the United States without first declaring his intention, or taking out his "first papers."

This measure is something like the law that was enacted in California a few years since taxing persons wearing long hair. It can never become a law, even if the Legislature are foolish enough to pass it. If it were practicable to levy a special tax upon the Chinese, we would favor such a measure. But this bill imposes a tax upon all foreigners who reside here six months and do not declare their intention to become citizens. The Constitution of this State, Art. I, Sec. 31, provides that "white foreigners who are or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property as native born citizens."

Of course this bill, so far as "white foreigners" are concerned, would be in conflict with this Constitutional provision, and void. Then, if it discriminates between white and other foreigners and applies only to a certain class, it conflicts with the Burlingame Treaty, (Mr. Siglin to the contrary notwithstanding,) and is void.

As it is a species of taxation, and applies to a certain class of foreigners only, (discriminating on account of color) it conflicts with Sec. I, Art. IX., of the Constitution, which requires taxation to be uniform and equal. But Siglin has had so much to say on the subject of the Chinese, that he felt it his duty to make at least a feint at legislation against them for "buncombe."

Forbidden by the Constitution.

Our neighbor says the payment of Southern rebel claims are forbidden by the Fourteenth Amendment to Constitution, which says: "Neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any obligation incurred in aid of insurrection against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void," and considers that this sets the matter at rest.

When was ever a provision of the Constitution known to stand in the way of any demand of the Southern Democracy who control that party? It is well known that the Democrats claim that these amendments to the Constitution are null and void, for the reason that the rebel States had no voice in their ratification. When once in power, with a majority of the Supreme Court on their side, what would stand in the way of carrying out of this doctrine? It is true that Hancock has written a letter in which he says he says he would veto any measure for the payment of such claims; but from necessity as well as inclination, should he be elected, he will yield to the voice of his supporters. The South is the power of the Democratic party and Hancock has always shown a disposition to favor their interests, since he became their ally with Andrew Johnson. The element that assailed the Constitution and the flag in 1861, cannot be restrained by the Fourteenth Amendment, or any other law except the consciousness of superior adverse power. Besides it will be noticed that the Amendment does not stand in the way of payment for property lost or sacrificed in the South during the war, and this class of claims is enough to bankrupt the National Treasury. There will be nothing to prevent the rebel Brigadiers from giving themselves a substantial benefit if Hancock is elected.

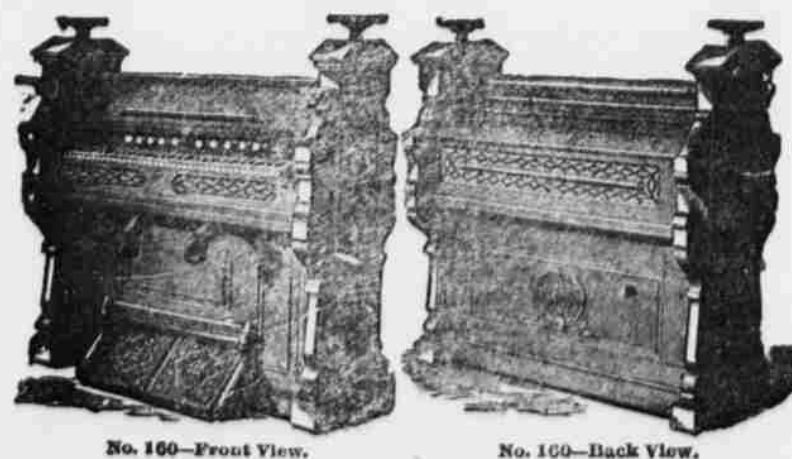
