To the Intelligent Voter.
One week from next Tuesday, and before another issue of the MAIL will have reached our readers in Curry county, the election for President and Vice President of the United States will be held. The choice of Chief Magistrate for this Republic is always a matter of great importance to the welfare of the masses of the people, and every voter should consider the subject well before casting his ballot. Every voter should consider that when he votes for Hancock he votes for an entire change in the administration of affairs of the Government. That such a change in this time would be highly detrimental to the interests of the country, no sensible man can fail to see. The Democratic politicians want a change because they expect Federal offices to be distributed among them, but the measures of the people will be injured by it.

FREE TRADE is one of the cardinal principles of the Democratic party, and it is about the only avowed course of public policy which they announce. This doctrine carried out as it would forthwith be by the Democrats, if they should come into power, would be the death blow to the leading industries of the country in general and of Coos and Curry counties in particular. It would immediately reduce the price of wool to less than one-half of what is now received; the coal mines now being worked would have to shut down and all hope of the development of the coal fields now unopened would be abandoned.

THE FINANCES of the country are of first importance in the promotion of the general prosperity. Our currency has been raised to par, and our bonds to a premium by the Republican party. Money is more plentiful than it has been for years, and every industry of the country is flourishing; labor is well paid for, and remunerative employment can be had by all. Yet the Democrats want a change; let the voter think well whether that change would be for the better, before he decides which ticket to use.

THE SOUTH controls the Democratic party. The South is clamorous for assumed rights that they have been denied by the Republicans. They want pay for property destroyed by Union soldiers in 1862-64, and there is nothing in the way of getting it but the law requiring proof of the loyalty of the claimants. This law will be immediately repealed when it is in the power of the Democracy to do so, and a financial crisis such as the country has never seen will be precipitated. This class of claims are not prohibited by the Constitutional amendments, and their payment is simply a matter of legislation. Does anyone doubt the disposition of the Southern leaders to secure this which they consider their due? The Southern leaders, and by virtue of their power the leaders of the Democratic party, declare that the principles for which Lee fought and Stonewall Jackson died. There is something in this election above the personal standing or characters of the individual candidates, and while either of the two leading candidates may be capable officers, in ability as well as character, the election of Hancock points to a radical change in all branches of Governmental policy, the election of Garfield points to conservatism in legislation and in the policy. The election of Hancock will mark the ebb tide of the Nation's prosperity—that of Garfield will sustain it at the present glorious flood of honor, wealth, and greatness.

SUPERVISOR DEVENPORT tells Kelly and the Tammany crowd that if they will furnish evidence of the colonization of voters in the interest of the Republicans he will arrest the parties and bring them before the proper authorities for punishment.
