HOUSE BURNED.—Last Monday morning, during the absence of Mr. S. Lapp and family from his place on Lathum slough, his house was consumed by fire, destroying all the clothing and household goods of the family, except one boat load which had been moved to Sumner, where the family were moving for the winter. It was undoubtedly the work of some villain, as there had been no fire in the house for the twenty-four hours previous. Mr. Grime, brother of Mrs. Lapp, who was stopping with the family, lost all his clothing except an old suit which he had on. The guilt of this infamous transaction should be traced home and punished.

CANVASSING.—W. L. Record representing the California Marble Works, 1112 Mission St., San Francisco, is at the Blanco Hotel. He is making a canvass of the county for work in the line of monuments. The scarcity of suitable monuments in our cemetery would suggest that he ought to meet with a liberal patronage here. WHALE.—Wednesday of last week Reed & Cornwall, who carry the mail from Gardner to Empire City, found a large whale on the beach about five miles from the mouth of Unquapa. Garfield the Next President!
The following is a synopsis of the dispatches received Tuesday night and early Wednesday:

Maine.
Portland, Bath, and other towns show large Republican gains over the September election. The Republicans have a majority over all.

New Hampshire.
60 towns show Republican loss.

Massachusetts.
Democratic losses in cities 25 per cent. Garfield carries the State by 30,000 to 40,000. Morse, Dem., elected to Congress in 4th dist.; rest of delegation Republican. Gain of one Congressman.

Rhode Island.
Indications are that Garfield carries the State by 30,000 majority. Not Republican gain in 100 precincts, 25,000.

Connecticut.
This State is claimed to be Republican by 30,000 majority. Large Republican gain.

New York.
The City is reported 32,500 Democratic. Brooklyn Democratic majority will not exceed 10,000. Auburn Republican 1,000. Republican claim the Mayor.

Pennsylvania.
This State is Republican by 30,000 or 40,000; Republicans gain a U. S. Senator. Legislature Republican joint ballot. Philadelphia 25,000 majority.

Ohio.
Ohio goes strongly Republican. Garfield's majority 40,000. Large Republican gains in Cincinnati.

Indiana.
This State gives increased Republican majority over October vote.

Wisconsin.
This State shows Republican gains.

Iowa.
This State shows Republican gains.

New Jersey.
Democrats elect 3 Congressmen, but Republicans claim the State.

Illinois.
This State gives increased Republican majority.

Colorado.
Goes Republican by increased majority over vote for Governor.

Kansas.
Increased Republican majority.

Michigan.
Returns from the State show Republican majority.

California.
This State is very close, and so far as returns show may fall to either party.

Latest indicate that the Republicans carry the State by small majority.

Oregon.
Conceded to be very close and it may require full returns to decide.

Nevada.
This State is conceded Democratic at Virginia City.

The bark Cyane, and schooner Emma Ulter are loading coal at Eastport.

The weather cleared up Wednesday, after a mild rain and is very pleasant.

Capt. L. L. Williams has returned Roseburg from Washington territory, where he has resided for some months past.

The schooner Nidarus is loading lumber at Lobree's mill; the Norway will take a deckload at the same place.

Put away the Hancock boom, we never shall need it more; for H. up Salt Creek there is room—"I told you so, before."

The voters of Marshfield had the benefit of a City Marshal at the polls last Tuesday. We do not hear anything said about U. S. Marshal in New York.

Dr. T. C. Mackey has purchased the house of Capt. Jas. Magee, in this place, recently occupied by Mr. McColegan, and will move his family here next week.

A man named McCoy was seriously if not fatally injured, at Halsey, Lin county, last week, by the premature discharge of powder when firing an anvil.

Last Thursday evening a social party was given by Mr. and Mrs. Bird—all had an enjoyable time, and it was at a late hour when the guests departed and left the Birds in peaceful possession of their host.

LYMAN WOODRUFF, of Ellensburg, Curry county, has received a patent on a cattle cur. Mr. Woodruff has heretofore patented a process for preserving meat.

ELECTION at this place passed off very quietly. Both parties vigilantly guarded their rights, and we believe there was no ground for dissatisfaction.

JOHN NOAH and his son, coming down Coos river Thursday, captured a fine large buck deer in the water. The animal made a desperate resistance, but with considerable difficulty was taken in.

REV. C. P. BAILEY requests us on his behalf to express his thanks to the ladies of Marshfield for their donation from the proceeds of the late fair. The amount received by him was fifty dollars.

That enterprising newspaper, The Western Star, of Roseburg, is about to issue a "mammoth sheet," filled with valuable information as to the resources of southern Oregon. The time of issuing has been postponed in order to announce the election of Garfield.

Vetoed Bills.

Governor Thayer vetoed the following bills: For the relief of Emma Gilla county, providing for the remission of \$1018.24 of State tax, being the expenses for the trial and execution of certain Indians in 1877; for the erection of a highway or ladder at the falls of the Willamette and to appropriate money therefor; and for the relief of J. Quinn Thornton, being \$150 for alleged services under the old provisional Government, with interest to date, swelling the amount to \$645; for the organization of school districts in incorporated towns of 10,000 inhabitants, and to provide for the maintenance and government of the public schools.

Is it Valid?

The validity of the bill granting the Narrow Gauge railroad company the Portland levee, which was passed by the Legislature over Governor Thayer's veto, appears to be a matter of doubt, on account of some irregularity in its passage. The Oregonian says: "The question is now raised in regard to the levee bill whether the failure to engross its second section will not invalidate the whole act. The bill in its present shape is not the bill that passed the Legislature; and there are those of good judgment who entertain the opinion that the act as it now stands is no act at all."

Jas. B. Eads was born in Indiana, in 1820. In 1833 his father started down the Ohio river with his family, proposing to settle in Wisconsin. The boat caught fire and his scanty furniture and clothing were burned. Young Eads barely escaped ashore with his pantaloons, shirt and cap. Taking passage on another boat this boy of 13 landed at St. Louis with his parents, his little bare feet first touching the rocky shore of the city on the very spot where he afterward located and built the largest steel bridge in the world over the Mississippi—one of the most difficult feats of engineering ever performed in America.

Denver Under Mob Rule.

DESVER, Oct. 31.—Denver has been in the hands of a mob for eight hours, and there are now fully 1500 rioters in the streets. The trouble has been growing for days. It was discovered a week ago that there were fully 8000 illegal names registered in this city, and immediately afterward the streets were filled with strangers of the worst character. Ever since the publication of the forged Garfield letter, violent partisans have striven to make an issue of the Chinese question, and the Democratic press has been filled with articles asserting that as soon as Garfield was elected the State would be flooded with Chinese and all white labor driven out.

Saturday night the Democrats had a procession carrying transparencies, inscriptions and cartoons tending to excite animosity against the Chinese. A considerable portion became intoxicated and remained out all night. This noon they made an assault on the Chinese houses, tearing down the houses and beating and driving out the Chinese. One was dragged from Hop Lee's place with a rope around his neck, and his skull crushed in with boots and bricks. The police were called out, but were unable to control the mob. The fire department was ordered to throw water on the rioters, but the mob attacked them and badly wounded two firemen. Many Chinese were fearfully beaten, and one was rescued by the police and taken to jail, which was immediately surrounded by a mob of about a thousand, who hurrahed for Hancock and yelled, "Lynch the leper!" Special police managed to keep back the crowds. The other mob remained intact in the lower part of the city. About dark they were entirely beyond control, and marched from street to street, gutting Chinese houses wherever they saw them, and assaulting citizens. On Lawrence street from an isolated tenement a Chinaman was seen dragged, his ears cut off and otherwise terribly mutilated. He was finally rescued in a dying condition, placed in a carriage and driven toward the city jail. At sixteenth street an unsuccessful attempt was made to drag him from the wagon. Several are reported killed, but the condition of the streets is such that it is impossible at this hour to get definite reports. Many colored men were knocked down and beaten. At this hour rioters are still on the streets in full force. Special police have been sworn in to the number of 300. There is a great deal of incendiarism to-night. The fire department has been called to be ready at the slightest warning.

The reports of pistols are heard all over town, and the militia will be called out. Threats have been made that the Tribune office would be sacked; but though the mob have been howling across the street from it, no attack has been made as yet. Citizens irrespective of party are intensely indignant. The transparencies carried in the Democratic procession Saturday night were directed at the Chinese, and this, with constant repetition of the Garfield forgery, are causes of the mob.

Damage by Floods in England.

A London dispatch of the 29, says: The heavy rains have seriously affected many parts of the country, causing much damage to crops and other property. Nearly every telegraph wire in and around Edinburgh were blown down. The Hartlepool pier has been badly damaged. The farming country near Leicestershire has been almost entirely inundated. Two vessels, the Mary Shields and Transfers, it is feared, are lost. Many vessels and coasters have been wrecked, and it is feared that many lives have been lost.

A Dublin dispatch says a great storm has been raging here since yesterday, and much property has been destroyed. Fully fifty families in the suburbs are made homeless by the storm. Floods at Leeds have stopped several mills, and hundreds of persons are thrown out of employment.

An Omaha dispatch says: The trial of C. K. Allen, formerly Union Pacific agent at Sidney, on the charge of grand larceny, terminated yesterday at Sidney in his acquittal. It will be remembered that some months ago \$122,000 in gold bullion and a small amount of currency received from the Black Hills en route east disappeared from his office in midday while he was at dinner. It had been taken through a hole in the floor. After some considerable search it was found hidden in a coal pile under the cellar, except one gold brick and currency amounting altogether to about \$12,000. The evidence against Allen was very strong, but not strong enough to satisfy the jury, who were out about 18 hours before coming to an agreement of not guilty. The parties who took the bullion and hid it under the office, intended no doubt to come and get it at the first good opportunity.

A FATAL AFFAY occurred at Tombstone, Arizona, on the 27th. Fred White, City Marshal, was killed by a desperado; the latter and his accomplices are arrested and will probably be punished.

The De Lesseps Romance.

The history of M. de Lesseps' second marriage is a curious one. The lady who is his wife was nearly twelve years at the chateau of which she is now chatchaine staying on a visit. Her family name was de Braga. She was of a French origin, but English nationality, her father having filled a post under the British government in the Mauritius. Mlle. de Braga was the perfection of the French Creole type, and very romantic. She had been in the habit of listening to the accounts of the diplomatic and material difficulties which M. Lesseps overcame in Egypt, Paris, and London, and of the courage and humanity he displayed in assisting plague-stricken Frenchmen when he was consul at Alexandria. The relations she heard impressed her as the narrative of Othello's adventures impressed Desdemona.

Mlle. de Braga saw in M. de Lesseps a hero of modern times. His courtliness, chivalrous manners and vivacity enchanted a girl used to the indolent planters of the Isle of France.

She was at La Chesnaye when all Europe was astir about the achievement of the Suez enterprise. Telegrams were arriving from the great ones of the earth, accepting invitation to the inaugural ceremony.

The French sovereign was on board a French warship, to lead a fleet, composed of vessels of all nations, with their apparent and heads of government on board. Festivity reigned at Chesnaye. Mlle. de Braga grew silent and solitary. One day, in the garden, she saw de Lesseps walking on a terrace. She plucked a rose and going up to him, begged him for her sake to wear it to dinner.

He asked whether she did not mean it for his son? No. It was for himself. Her host explained to her that he was on the wrong side of 60, while she was not yet 19. That did not matter. What his age was did never occur to her. She had only thought of his greatness and goodness. In short, he was her ideal. How was it possible for a man reared on the sunny side of a Pyrenean mountain to reason down the feelings this confession aroused? Time was given to Mlle. de Braga to reflect, and she was made to understand that no friendship would be lost were she to change her mind after the bands had been published. The marriage was celebrated contemporaneously with the Suez fetes.

Senator Grover's Health.

The Farmer publishes the following extract from a private letter from Senator Grover, written to a gentleman in Portland from Danville N. Y.:

"When you visited us at Washington, Del., in May last, Mrs. Grover could not sit up two hours in the day. She is now able to sit up nearly all day, and is improving slowly right along. She had at no time suffered in her mind as she did when in Oregon. Her chief difficulty has been marasmus of the bowels, and the general debility attendant upon such diseases. She has not taken any medicine for the past five months, so she is very well and expects to be with me in Washington next December. I am much better than when you saw me, and about four pounds heavier. The spinal inflammation is gradually subsiding, and all symptoms of paralysis leaving me. I have felt that I might go to Oregon this Fall and vote, but my physicians forbid it. They say I am safely over hanger, but that I must await the hardening process of nature to render me safe from relapse."

Will anything ever convince this crowd of boobies that to write even decently demands previous cultivation, information, and common sense; or that real genius is like any other diamond, and needs careful cutting and polishing? I suppose not! EX."

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of United States to be affixed. Done at the City of Washington, this first day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and fifth.
