The Cause and Effect of the Democratic Defeat.

The Democrats of New York take the result coolly. A dispatch after the result was known contains the following language:

The fact is, the result had been discussed many days ago. At the headquarters of the Democratic Congressional Committee here, there has been a conspicuous absence of courage or confidence, since the defeat of the party in Indiana. Before that nearly a hundred hands had been employed in folding and forwarding campaign documents, but after the Indiana disaster the hands were discharged. Silence and gloom settled over what had been a hive of industry, and it was plain to outside observers that the Democratic backbone was broken.

To-day in conversation Democrats were free to confess that they were fairly without hope after the October gale. "It was Indiana that defeated Hancock," said a prominent Democrat to-day. "It was a decision of the Supreme Court-making it an October State that proved our destruction." Amid the wreck of all their hopes the Democrats insist that had Indiana elected Landers in October, Hancock would have walked into the White House in March. In a private letter written here before the Indiana election, Garfield said: "We lost Maine but we carry Indiana. Bull Run made Appomattoch possible." Next to the loss of the Presidency the Democrats mourn the loss of the ablest men in the Senate. Wallace, Eaton, Kernan, Thurman and McDonald all go out with the close of the election session. In speaking of this matter to-day, a prominent Democrat told your correspondent that with the exception of Bayard there were not on the Democratic side four able men than those who have been so summarily decapitated and whose places will be taken by Republicans after March. Whether the Senate will have a working majority of Republicans is still a matter of doubt, but it looks much as if they would. Officials of the Senate now in the city are very uneasy.

Frauds in Alabama. The Times Vicksburg special gives a long circumstantial account of frauds which Democrats attempted and executed in Chalmers, Shoestring district to exclude Lynch, colored Republican opponent of Chalmers for the Congressional election. The district was originally formed to include most of the strong Republican localities along the river border so that all other districts should be securely Democratic, needing no election work to carry them. The Democrats were at liberty to put all their efforts (meaning intimidation, fraud and building) in this long narrow strip of land. They succeeded in suppressing and throwing away enough Republican votes to elect Chalmers, although the blacks, who are all Republicans, outnumber the whites five to one. This year the blacks voted moderately and put in enough ballots to elect Lynch by one thousand majority but 2659 of their votes were thrown out for alleged illegality, thus electing Chalmers. The illegality consisted in this: Years ago the negroes were accustomed to have a flag or eagle printed at the head of their ticket as a distinguishing mark. The Democratic Legislature immediately passed a law that no device or distinguishing mark should be allowed on the tickets and that if they had such marks they should not be received or counted. This year the Democrats printed their tickets far away from the district and only distributed them on the day of the election. Thus the negroes here could not discover, in time for printing, just what was the form of the Democratic ticket, but they printed their tickets in the usual shape and they were the exact counterpart of the Democratic tickets, except that they had heavier type for the names and had printers' dashes between the names. The Democrats had made an innovation in omitting the latter. They, however, declare the dash to be a device, and on this flimsy pretext they propose to seat Chalmers by throwing out the tickets which contained it.

Presidential Electors.

The United States statutes make it the duty of the Presidential electors to meet and cast their vote for President and Vice President on the first Wednesday in December after being elected. This is done at the State capital. It is provided that the Executive of the State cause three lists of the names of the Electors to be made and certified and delivered to the

Electors on or before the day on which they are required to meet. After casting the vote the Electors are required to make and sign three certificates of all the votes cast by them, in distinct lines for President and Vice President, to be annexed to the certified list of Electors which has been furnished by the Executive. One of these certificates is taken by a person chosen by the Electors and delivered to the President of the Senate; one is sent by mail to the same officer, and the third is delivered to the U. S. Judge of the district in which the Electors meet. The certificates are opened and the votes counted in Congress, and the result declared on the second Wednesday in February following the election. The President elect is inaugurated on the 4th March next following.
