Our Next Appropriation.

The near approach of the next session of Congress suggests the propriety of taking immediate steps to bring to the attention of that body the necessity for another appropriation to carry forward the improvement of this harbor. The effect of the work already done, so far as can be observed, is decidedly favorable, and by expending \$400,000 more in the same manner, a satisfactory test can be made of this plan of improvement, without, the \$400,000 already expended will be thrown away. We have no doubt our Senators and Congressmen will make an effort to secure this appropriation, but would it not be well for us to assist them by preparing a petition setting forth the state of the work and the urgent reasons that exist for pushing it forward the coming spring? The session will be a short one, and our Representative should be supplied with everything that will enable him to secure the action of Congress without delay. Let us circulate petitions rapidly as possible, and present them at an early day in the session. Unless we take this step, the failure to secure an appropriation may be the result.

The Republican's *Leads* special says: Owing to the fact that the fire in the underground workings of the mines in Frier hill, which started in the Chrysolite nearly two months ago, still burns, the Little Chief and other mines are ordered by the court to suspend work temporarily. Thursday night the Little Chief resumed operations, disregarding the injunction of the order of closing its level against the approach of the fire. Eight hundred pounds of giant powder was exploded this afternoon on the line between Little Chief and Chrysolite, to break down the stopes. Another charge of 1000 pounds will be fired to-night. Six men were prostrated by smoke in the Ami mine.

Accidental Death.

Wednesday of last week Woodson Patterson, of Camas valley, went out hunting on horseback; at a later hour his horse returned riderless with a cut on its leg, from which blood was flowing freely. The steps of the animal were traced to where Mr. Patterson was found senseless with a terrible gash in his forehead. He was taken home at once, where he died at midnight without ever having spoken after his injury. There are various conjectures as to the manner in which he was killed, some even suggesting the possibility of foul play.

The "Democrat," of Madison, Wisconsin, which has been bitterly partisan all through the campaign, comes out in an editorial arguing for the disbanding of the Democratic party in the west. It says: The Democracy has only elected 35 out of 180 Congressmen in the North, and only carry New Jersey for Hancock by 1500 majority and Nevada by 300, and that out of 10 Northern States they have not elected a single Representative. The North is solidly Republican and the South Democratic, and the Northern Democracy has performed its duty to the country and has nothing more to offer, no other party duty to perform.

At the meeting of the British Social Science Congress held recently in Edinburgh, Scotland, a paper by Dr. Alfred Carpenter was read, in which he said that the fog peculiar to large towns were not due to unconsumed carbon in the atmosphere, and he recommended the adoption of gas as much as possible for cooking and other purposes to reduce smoke. To abate the smoke excess he went so far as to advocate a tax on grates not consuming their own smoke, and upon chimney stacks, the purchase of gas-works by local authorities, and the rigid enforcing of existing laws relating to chimneys which discharge large volumes of smoke.

Some time since the Russian Government sent two musicians to Siberia to collect and write down the national melodies. By traveling from village to village, and attending the festivities of the peasants, they have collected a large number of tunes, including about thirty which were previously unknown. The selection is to be published during the coming winter, and is looked for with much curiosity in Russian military circles.

GENERAL GRANT, in an interview said he was induced to enter the political fight merely from anxiety for the safety of the country if the Democrats were successful. He never made a political speech before. It was his first fight, but he would not promise it would be his last. If anything extraordinary or serious happened, the party would have his services.

The New York *World* rallies the Democracy to the standard of Free Trade in the following language: We scorn any political association with any protectionist. No protectionist can be a Democrat at all. Our hope is in making the Democracy an out-and-out, thick and thin, aggressive,
