Imperialism of Republicans.

One of the shallowest of the many unreasonable and groundless charges that the Democrats were foolish enough to suppose would help them elect their candidate in this year is, that the Republican party are tending to Imperialism or monarchy, that Grant and his followers wish to give him succession for life in the office of President of the United States. The result of the election shows how little was the effect of that style of electioneering, and there is no probability that the popular strength of the Republican party will be at any future period diminished by representations so manifestly unreasonable and false.

There is nothing expressed or implied in the doctrines of the Republican party, that calls for the exercise by any branch of the Government of power inconsistent with the spirit of institutions, or infringing upon the reserved rights of the States or the people. There is nothing in the history of the party during the twenty years that it has held the reins of government that could even remotely suggest the possibility of such a greed of power. On the contrary, even the extraordinary powers forced upon the President by the exigencies of the war of the Rebellion, were voluntarily laid aside at the earliest period consistent with the public safety. The writ of Habeas Corpus was suspended by Abraham Lincoln, and though the act was denounced by rebels and rebel sympathizers, it was backed by all loyal men, and now none pretend to hold that its suspension was caused or maintained for the purpose of acquiring or perpetuating unusual powers in the general government.

General Grant is the representative of the Imperial idea in the Democratic mind, and the fact that he consented to allow his name to go into the contest for a nomination for a third term is pointed to as a proof of his greed of power. This is the only specification ever given in support of the charge of Imperialism, and the absurdity of the conclusion only finds a parallel in the inconsistencies presented by the record of the Democratic party for the past twenty years. The ballots of intelligent men can never be turned to the Democracy by such transparent fallacies.

Shot Near Leadville—Lieut. Gov. Robinson killed.

A Denver dispatch of the 27th says: A report reaches here to-night from Leadville that a riot is in progress among the miners at Robinson's camp about twenty miles from Leadville, and that Lieutenant Governor Geo. B. Robinson has been shot and killed. A relief party has gone from Leadville. The report is believed to be true.

There seems to be some mystery about the shooting of Lieutenant-Governor Robinson at Robinson's camp last night. The particulars so far as heard are these: There was a dispute about the possession of a mine there and a guard has been placed to watch it. Last night Gov. Robinson and the manager of the mine went to it after dark. The guard not recognizing them and not hearing an answer to who they were, fired, he says into the rocks overhead. Gov. Robinson fell shot in four places. He is still living but his wounds are believed to be fatal. The fact that there has been trouble between the miners and the manager during the past week, the guard's story and the peculiarity of Robinson's wounds makes the theory that it was accidental unsatisfactory.

A correspondent writing from Healer to the East Oregonian gives the following: A cutting affray occurred at the Metlock Bros. saloon on last Wednesday, the 14th inst., between B. Woods and Jim Barnes, the former getting the worst of the game. But he is now lying in a critical condition, but under the skillful treatment of Dr. Shipley, is getting along as well as could be expected, bearing the infliction of seven wounds—the most severe being in his back and neck. Both were strangers in our community and to each other. Barnes was arrested and awaits his trial until next spring, getting his board for the winter free, while his partner fares better at the hotels.

The Inter-Ocean's Washington special says: The suggestion is delicately given out here that it might be well for the Government to 'get rid' of Alaska by leasing it to a commercial company. It might be as well not to restore slavery under such a guise. In the Seal Fur Isles is where it has practically been done, and the miserable Alutes are permitted to sell what they have for sale only to the commercial company, and suffered to buy what they want from that company, in only one way to be completely robbed of all fruits of their labor as though they were under the slave driver's lash. The lease of the remainder of Alaskan territory signifies the extension of that disgraceful state of affairs.
