Let Them Keep up the Organization.

Since the election, Democratic journals have been engaged in encouraging each other to stand by the party organization, and notwithstanding their repeated defeats, to still maintain the struggle for supremacy under its present name and leaders. Before the party nominations for the Presidency were made, the leading journals of that party unhesitatingly announced that the result of the election would be either success or disaster to the Democratic party, and carrying out that idea, it is now time for the party to die. That it ought to have died long since, will not be denied by any disinterested observer of its course; it deserves death and oblivion as much as any political organization ever did. It has not offered to public view a redeeming feature since it was overthrown in 1860 for endorsing slavery and treason and for the stupendous frauds and unprecedented corruption of Buchanan's administration.

But we are not anxious to see the party disorganized. If it were to dissolve its present organization, discard the old name, and reorganize on a platform of principles more acceptable to the masses than those set forth in the late platforms of the party, they would certainly greatly improve their chances of breaking the power of the Republican party four years hence. This course might bring into notice a new class of leaders, but it would not necessarily improve the character of the party, and to the extent that it improved their chance of success, would be a misfortune to the country. It is by all means desirable that they maintain their present organization with all the well-founded objections that exist to it; that in the future, as in the past, they point to, and endorse their party history; and the "Long line of Statesmen" etc. In that case defeat will continue to be the "normal condition" of the party, and the country will continue to prosper under the control of its friends.

The Grant Fund.

A fund of one hundred thousand dollars has been raised in the city of Philadelphia and will be presented to Grant in a short time. The idea originated with one or two of Grant's personal friends who think his present income not sufficiently large to support him in a style worthy of an ex-president. John M. Forbes and other wealthy men of Boston were applied to when the object was first thought of but the New York Times ex-President fund had got the start and so Grant's friends here were thrown upon their own resources. The Philadelphia fund is exclusively for the use of Grant and it was stated to-day by one of the most intimate of the general's friends that the money had all been raised and was deposited in bank. He also said, while refusing to give the names of the subscribers, that the money had been given by both Republicans and Democrats. Within a few days according to the present programme Grant will be invited here and the hundred thousand dollars will be presented to him.

If General Grant has, by extravagance become poor, he should go to the business of tanning again, and advertise his independence. If he would that instead of accepting these donations, it would be one of the proudest examples in American history.

The Irish Difficulties.

The excitement over the question of land rents in Ireland still increases, and it is by no means probable that the difficulty will be settled by the trial of agitators.

Mr. Parnell has issued an appeal to the American people, hoping all lovers of freedom will assist the agitation now going on in Ireland which will secure a radical settlement of the land question.

Mr. Dillon, solicitor for Mr. Egan, Secretary of the Land League, and one of the persons against whom prosecution has been instituted, to-day handed the Crown Officer an affidavit sworn to by Mr. Egan, asking for an attachment against the Evening Mail for publishing articles calculated to prejudice the trials of the travelers.

Increased Value Of Lands.

Washington reports, now nearly ready, show increased value in farm lands, cleared and timbered, for 1880, as follows: California, 3.2; Oregon, 2.0 per cent. For the whole country the average is 5 per cent. South Atlantic States advanced 6 per cent.; Gulf States, 8 per cent.; South Island States, 9 per cent., chiefly owing to the improved condition of Arkansas lands; north of the Ohio, 9 per cent., on account of the vast stride in mineral and manufacturing industries, while Western or prairie States show 10 per cent. The Pacific States are supposed to be down to 3 per cent. increase, on account of the agitation of the Chinese question, but the report indicates that the signs of reaction are beginning to appear.

Sensible and Sarcasmic to the Last.

The Republicans of Clarinda, Page county, Iowa, had a justification meeting after the result of the election was known. According to the Council Bluffs Nonpareil they had the biggest kind of a time, with illuminations, fire-works, music and speechifying. After several Republican orators, among them Congressman-elect Hepburn, had given vent to their feelings with spread-eagle speeches, the crowd called loudly for Lou B. Calk. Calk is a Democrat, and the Nonpareil says he looked too depressed to speak; but the crowd wouldn't be put off, so he mounted a box and made the following unique speech:

FELLOW CITIZENS:—A man usually attends his own funeral, but it is not expected that he should talk a great deal. [Laughter.] I knew the funeral ceremonies would go on without me, so I concluded I had better bring in the body. [Laughter.] But it takes a great deal of grace to sustain a man who helps furnish the corpse for an occasion like this. [Laughter.] Nobody but a Democrat could do it. [Applause.] It is certain that no one but the Democrats have had a chance to try it for the last twenty years. [Shouts and applause.] Disappointment is the modern Democrat's birth-right, and mourning his normal condition. They took out a patent on disaster twenty years ago and it has never been infringed. The patent run out in 1876 and they have just got it renewed. Looking over the landscape of the last twenty years, I behold acres and acres of busted hopes and cords of disgruntled ambitions, barrels and barrels of unavailing tears, oceans and oceans strewn with the wrecks of phantom ships once burdened with Democratic delusions. [Great applause.] Disappointment is an anchor to the Democratic soul both sure and steadfast.

Leaves have their time to fall
And flowers to wither at the north
wind's breath,
And stars to set, but all, O Democrat!
Thou has all time for thine own death.

"I might say with Shylock, 'Such foreboding, yes, suffer-ance is the badge of our tribe.' I could give you 329 reasons for this. [Laughter.] A lawyer offered a judge sixteen reasons why his client was not present in court. First, he was dead. The judge told him that he might omit the other fifteen. The first reason of my 329 is, we lacked voters. You will allow me to omit the other 328. [Applause.] But I could give you more than 329 reasons. Yea, More-y letter. John Kelly did it with his little racket. [Great applause.] Wade Hampton's mule broke his leg instead of his neck and Ben Hill wasn't born a mule. English had foreclosed his mortgages and we couldn't redeem them. Then,—

'Tis the south that can supply
Solid comforts while we die.

"In some states the Greenback party fell through a crack in the platform and crumpled up. [Laughter.] But Democracy still lives. [Great applause.] It's like the mule—it never dies. But unfortunately, like the mule, while it lives it is forever throwing its riders.

"It bucked Greely off and killed him in 1872. Tilden stuck on until he passed under the wire. [Applause.] But there was so much daylight between him and this Democratic quadruped, the judges counted him off, although he had his feet in the stirrups. This year we got a splendid send-off and might have won, but the donkey was stricken down in Indiana with (g) Landers. [Applause.] We close this chapter of history with the hope the story will not be continued in our next. [Cheers.] We accept defeat the more cheerfully because of the magnanimous manner with which you take the victory. We take it every four years. It is a standing prescription. It might well be called the quadrennial peccae. [Groans.] It works up before election, and works down as the returns come in. We thank you for the magnanimous way in which you have turned out to our funeral. [Applause.] We congratulate you on the magnificent and imposing character of the obsequies." [Here the speaker's feeling overcame him, and he retired amid cheering, earthquake and applause avalanches.]
