The Coos Bay News indorses the Morrison tariff bill, and thus favors free coal and free timber—something that will affect this locality very injuriously if the bill should become a law.

We infer from a very complimentary notice which he received in the last issue of the Plaindealer that J. C. Fullerton, receiver of the Roseburg land office, will permit his name to be submitted at the next republican state convention for the nomination for congress.

J. M. Siglin lectured at Coquille City last week on "Equal Rights." At the close of the lecture a vote was taken to ascertain the sense of the audience on the subject, when about three-fourths voted in favor of it.

Advices from Washington say that a postoffice inspector will soon visit the bay, to report, among other things, upon the propriety of discontinuing the office at Coos City and extending the mail route between that place and Coquille City to this place.

The News publishes what purports to be the republican slate and gives the name of A. Nasburg for state senator, John H. Roberts for representative, Alex. Stauff for clerk and Chas. W. Olive for sheriff, etc.

At the meeting of the democratic state central committee held at Portland last Thursday Dallas City and the 17th of April next were fixed as the place and time for holding their state convention.

Last Thursday night Sheriff Smith lodged A. J. Leonard in the Portland jail. In referring to the matter the Standard says: Ambrose Patton, from what has been learned of the transaction, was shot down on the public road, and his body carried some distance and thrown into the river.

Launch of a New Steamer for the Oregon Southern Improvement Co.

The following is from a late number of the American Sentinel, published at Bath, Maine: The firm of Gos, Sawyer & Packard launched Tuesday from their yard a fine, large steamer for the Oregon Southern improvement company.

This steamer will carry about 50 first-class passengers. The after cabin has a large saloon, 18 state-rooms and a large pantry. This cabin is of ash, finished with mahogany and black walnut.

Morrison's Measure.

At a recent meeting of the eight democratic members of the ways and means committee, says a Washington dispatch, it was unanimously agreed to report a substitute for Morrison's tariff bill.

Another dispatch says the democratic members of the ways and means committee are caucusing daily to discover some plan upon which a majority of the committee can unite to report on the tariff bill to the house.

Mills and Hurd stubbornly oppose this scheme, because the bill as introduced did not go far enough in the direction of free trade to suit them.

The New York World, in a double-leaded editorial, calls Morrison's attention to the tariff plank in the democratic platform in 1878, and adds: "Upon this platform Gov. Seymour carried the state of New York over the patronage of the administration."
