Launch of a New Steamer for the Oregon Southern Improvement Co.

The following is from a late number of the American Sentinel, published at Bath, Maine: The firm of Goss, Sawyer & Packard launched Tuesday from their yard a fine, large steamer for the Oregon Southern improvement company. She is intended to carry freight and passengers on the Oregon coast. Her dimensions are: Length, 200.1 feet; width, 38.2 feet; depth, 16.2 feet? gross tonnage, about 950 tons.

The steamer has two decks; is heavy copper fastened, iron strapped, and was coppered on the stocks, 2200 sheets being used. She has a large compound 600-horse-power engine, built at the Goss mafrine iron works. The three boilers and two tanks are also being made there. For holiting freight and anchors, she has a large Cook & Rymes engine, with Hyde's patent windlass. The vessel is not yet named.

This steamer will carry about 50 first-class assengers. The after cabin has a large saloon, 8 state-rooms and a large pantry. This cabin is of ash, finished with mahogany and black walnut. Each room has two berths and a walnut stand. The saloon is finely painted and gilded. The middle house will contain ten ms, but it cannot be finished until after chinery and boilers are in.
