World's Fair in San Francisco in 1877.

We have received from Marcus D. Boruck, the enterprising editor of the Spirit of the Times, a petition for signatures, which is to be presented to congress, asking an appropriation of \$2,000,000 to aid the holding of a world's fair in San Francisco in 1887.

A dose of free trade in coal and lumber, as advocated by Morrison, the democratic leader in the lower house of congress, and approved by the editor of the Coast Bay News, would soon teach that gentlemen the relations existing between protection and wages.

That popular magazine, the Overland Monthly, comes to hand this month full of good reading and makes the hearts of its subscribers rejoice.

A farmer who believes in the duty on wool has prepared the following table, showing the prices of woolen goods in 1860 and 1881:

This same farmer, who believes in investigating for himself, refers to the above table as follows: "It will be seen by comparing the above prices that woolen goods were 34 per cent. cheaper under the protective tariff in 1881 than under nominal free trade in 1860. That is, a yard of wool cloth that cost the farmer \$1.25 per yard under the free-trade policy of 1860 only cost him 84 cents per yard under the tariff of 1881."

It is announced that Henry Ward Beecher, the great pastor of Plymouth church, will make a trip to Europe the coming summer. It will be his third trip, and probably his last, as his career is drawing to a close.

Evidence Before the Committee.

Morrison and his committee are having a rather peculiar experience in the tariff investigations. Between the evidence of the representatives of the industries of the country and the tedious speeches of the free traders, the Morrison bill is apt to be lost entirely. It is really a funny situation, and illustrates the lack of principle among the democratic leaders on the tariff question.

Senator Sherman has struck the key note of the situation when he says that protection is in greater danger at the present time from its friends than from its enemies. "The manufacturing interests," says Sherman, "are beginning to regard coal, iron ore, pig iron, wool and other articles of domestic production as raw articles not to be protected by duty."
