The New Mill Coming.

W. Granger, the reputed millwright of the Southern Oregon Improvement company, returned to the bay by last steamer, accompanied by his wife and daughter, which is an indication that he came to stay and put up the big mill that has been so much talked about. A private letter from San Francisco says: "The steamer Arcata was on the bay at North Bend, Me., will soon be on her way out from the east, with the machinery and equipments for a mill at Empire City. The mill will be built and put into operation this summer. As to further improvements, it is said the company will move cautiously; but not for the want of means. It has all the money it needs and is under control of Boston men, who carefully consider any new departure before making it. As chief manager of the company, W. H. Besse has been succeeded by a man named Smith. There is no probability of the inauguration of any railroad building this summer. The company is content to permit its Coos bay wagon road land to lie as an investment for the present. The building and equipment of the mill are about all the improvements that have been agreed upon so far. The Southern Oregon Improvement company badly needs the Newport coal mine to round up with, and it may buy the mine."

Photographers Coming.

The McMullan Bros. of San Francisco are about to pay another visit. It will be remembered that they were here about two years ago, at which time they did a very large business. Their work was considered the best ever made by any traveling concern visiting this county. They are now busy in the city preparing a new and complete outfit, by which they will endeavor to eclipse the work of their former visit. All will do well to retain their orders until the arrival of the McMullan Bros. The 26th of the month is the date fixed for their arrival.

Uncle Tommy Lowe died at the residence of Mrs. Golden & McCormack in this place last Friday morning. His death was not at all unexpected, for he was 80 years or more of age and had been gradually failing for several months. For the past year or two, until a week before his death, the old gentleman passed off his office window twice in the forenoon and twice in the afternoon, on his way to and from the Bayview brewery, his favorite resort and where he was a favorite with all. Daily his steps became feebler and feebler and he found it convenient to grasp the window sills, the woodpile and the railing of the stairway leading up the hill to help him on his weary way. A week ago Saturday Uncle Tommy failed to put in an appearance and the report came that he was unable to leave his couch. Last Thursday evening he dropped into a sweet sleep, and Friday morning he was dead. His funeral took place Sunday and was largely attended. Uncle Tommy had been a resident of this part of the state for more than 30 years and he leaves hosts of friends who will regret to hear of his death, though he was ripe for the reaper.

The attempt of the News to create prejudice against Nasburg by saying that he, after his election, will use his influence in behalf of legislation inimical to the loggers is too absurd to notice at length. Their interests are his also, and he has a great deal to gain by legislating in their favor and everything to lose by going against them. Then why should he do so? Why should when it is said that he will do so? And when it is said so, why should anybody believe it? Nasburg is entirely independent of every milling interest in the county, while his mercantile business comes in direct opposition with the mill stores. He has a business of his own to look after, which certainly would not be sacrificed through pure sympathy for the millmen and prejudice against the loggers. Nasburg's vote and influence in the state senate will be in favor of justice, both to the logger and millman, and this they can rely upon, and more than this they have no right to expect.

B. D. Bigelow, who arrived by the last steamer, is in the employ of the Pacific coast lumber company and he brought with him some of the rigging for fastening the piles and logs that the company intends rafting to San Francisco. The wire rope looks as if it has seen service on some of the cable railways of San Francisco. The first lot of timber to be sent below by this process will consist of 1000 piles and some saw logs, which Bigelow expects to have ready in about three weeks. The rafting will be done in the cove above Bay City, where the work will commence next Monday, if Bigelow's calculations connect.

He is announced to speak at Myrtle Point to-night, at Newport to-morrow night and at this place next Saturday night. Siglin and his organ have been very industrious in their efforts to prevail upon some republican to meet him on the rostrum. He seems to be shunned upon the same principle that men sometimes keep away from a skunk.

The wages paid in this vicinity this year are not as good as they were last year or the year before. Nearly twice as many teams were employed last year as there is any prospect of being employed this year. While the bosses were hunting men last year, this year the men are hunting the bosses and accepting work at reduced wages, for the reason that there are more men than there is any demand for; consequently this is not the logger's paradise of legend.

C. H. Merchant returned from San Francisco by last steamer. The report in circulation that he has purchased the Lobree mill property is founded on the fact that he has bargained for it at \$25,000. If the agreement be fulfilled by the parties thereto, a formal transfer of the property will take place the 1st of next month, when it is probable that the Lobree mill and Dean & Co's mill at this place will be consolidated and run under one management.

A Card from A. H. Thirt.

Tichenor to S. Siglin, the whole signed "Subscriber." Both the letter and the comments accompanying it do me no injustice; therefore, relying upon your generous disposition to deal fairly with me, I take it that you will publish this, my disclaimer. The article accuses me of being in favor of a division of Curry county and the removal of the county seat to Port Orford. Allow me, to say, in emphatic terms, that the idea of such a change has never entered my mind; neither would I have any sense of honor or justice allow me to further any such scheme. So far as the present line between Coos and Curry counties is concerned, I do not propose to tamper with it at all, for in my opinion the present boundary line is plain enough. As for Capt. Tichenor, I will simply say that he has no right to pledge me for any scheme whatever.

More of Siglin's Impudence Unveiled.

To the Editor of the COAST MAIL: In the Coos Bay News of the 14th inst. I see the statement made that J. M. Siglin secured the passage of the bill changing the time for the holding of the Curry county circuit court. This is false. The bill referred to was introduced in the house by Y. M. Wadsworth, a republican member from Union county, September 16, 1882. September 21 it was read a second time and referred to the representatives from the second district. (See pages 66 and 84 house journal.) It was reported back by the committee (page 84 house journal) September 23 and ordered engrossed. The bill day it was reported as engrossed. October 1 it was read a third time and passed. It was received in the senate October 4, where it was left by Siglin to smolder on the table, without even an effort to raise it. Until October 21—seventeen days later, it was then taken up on his motion, which could have been done at any time after its reception in the senate. Siglin then sat still, and Burch of Yamhill moved to suspend the rules and read a second time, and then Fulton of Clatsop moved to suspend the rules and read a third time. It was a local measure in which neither Burch nor Fulton had an interest except to get the calendar fear of it, and having been urged up by the house, they wanted it. The next day it was read a second time and referred to the committee. It was then taken up on his motion, which could have been done at any time after its reception in the senate.
