A Queer Case.

One John C. Cobb of Philadelphia has created a sensation in that city by leaving his wife for the curious reason that she declined to get religion and join church with him. Cobb has been married several years, and his wife is a very petite but very attractive looking woman, who, however, as she says herself, has a temper when she gets started, although it requires a great deal to arouse her. She tells the following story of the affair:

"Some months ago my husband was converted and joined the Bethany Methodist Episcopal church, Eleventh and Mifflin streets. Since that time he has been assiduous in his attempts to persuade me to join the church, because, he said, it was not right that a religious man should have such a wicked wife. To this I said I did not consider myself more wicked than ordinary people, and that I did not propose to join church, although I had no objections to his being a churchgoer if he did not occupy all of his spare time in attending church meetings. He continued his efforts to make me a church member until the subject became so obnoxious that I could scarcely hold my tongue, but managed to keep my temper until he began to spend every night at some church meeting, seldom, if ever, at home in the evenings. 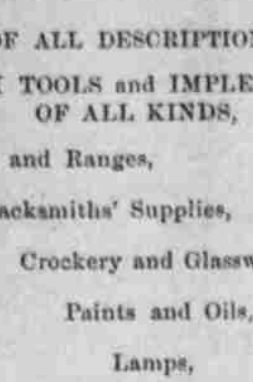
