Twenty-Three Coal Miners Killed at Nanaimo.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 30.—A terrible explosion occurred this morning in No. 3 shaft of the Wellington colliery at Nanaimo, by which 23 white miners lost their lives, and a large number were burned and injured.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 2.—Further advices from the scene of the explosion at the Wellington coal mine states that all the bodies have been recovered, 23 in number.

It is almost impossible to obtain information in reference to the matter. Miners who were at work in the North Wellington mine were on occasion of the explosion having taken place until coming up at midday.

The Fitz-John Porter Bill Vetoed.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Attorney General Brewster submitted to the president to-day, in compliance with the latter's request, a long and carefully prepared opinion upon the bill for the restoration of Fitz John Porter to the army, in which he expresses the opinion that it is clearly unconstitutional.

The provisions of the bill now under consideration are avowedly based on the assumption that the findings of the court-martial had been discovered to be erroneous; but it will be borne in mind that the investigation which is claimed to have resulted in this discovery was made many years after the event to which these findings related, and under circumstances that made it impossible to reproduce the evidence on which they were based.

It seems to me the proposed legislation would establish a dangerous precedent, calculated to imperil, in no small measure, the findings, force and effect of the judgments of various tribunals, established under our constitution and laws.

The house passed the bill over the veto, but it was sustained in the senate by a tie vote, which puts a quietus to the Fitz John Porter business, for the present, at least.

Grover Cleveland, Governor of New York, whose name is being most generally used as that of the probable democratic candidate for the presidency, is a native of New Jersey, born at Caldwell, Essex county, March 18, 1837.

He is next heard of making his way west, in company with an enterprising young man, with Cleveland, O., as his objective point; but visiting, while on his way, an uncle residing in Buffalo, he was induced to remain in that city, as clerk in the store of his relative.

He was elected a judge of the supreme court of Ohio, of which court he was chief justice from 1854 to 1856. He was a candidate for the governorship of the state in 1867, but was defeated.
