J. K. Vanderburg returned from the Sitka last week. He reports some fine country over that way awaiting settlers with families.

Miss Sadie Hall has taken a school on the middle fork of the Coquille river, near Big creek, where she began teaching Monday last week.

The steamer Arcata has been laid up at San Francisco for a few days. The word now is that she will leave that place for this next Saturday.

F. P. Norton is agent for the West Shore, the Daily, Weekly and Sunday Oregonian, eastern newspapers, story papers and the red rubber stamp.

J. C. Patterson, receiver of the Roseburg land office, is on the Coquille, rustication, and also giving some attention to matters of business connected with his office.

Judge Dyer and the county commissioners visited the paupers and their quarters at Timmerman's place across the bay last Saturday and found everything in a satisfactory condition.

There is break over the line of Jarvis, Cornwall & Co., between Empire and Drain. The road is in excellent condition and the accommodations of all kinds along the route were never better than they are now.

Dr. Tower, D. L. Rood and Alex Lang returned from Roseburg last Sunday. Lang brought back with him a large and fine young iron-gray horse, to supply the place of the one he lost by death a few months ago.

Sunday Dr. Hunter returned from Portland, where he went to attend a meeting of the grand lodge of the A. O. U. W. The doctor reports an interesting session of the lodge and the order as in a prosperous condition in this jurisdiction.

Henry Hudson will go below by the schooner Merchant, after machinery for new soda works which he intends starting north of this locality. He will also, while in the city, buy the instruments for the new land organized at Coquille City.

The agricultural society will meet at Coquille City next Thursday. James Allen is in town and has been giving out chickens at the stock, which is being liberally taken. This is as it should be, for the movement is one worthy of encouragement.

Miss Sadie McKnight has gone to her father's ranch on South Coos river to pass the school vacation, and yesterday Miss Maggie McKnight came to town on a visit.

Miss Julia A. Barklow, only daughter of Rev. David Barklow and wife, being near Myrtle Point, has been adjusted in mind and is to be sent to the state asylum. She is 16 years of age, violent, and inclined to kill herself, having once attempted to do so with an ax. Henry Rhodes and his sister Ann have been appointed to convey her to the asylum. Rhodes will go to Myrtle Point today and they will start from there tomorrow and go by way of Tons.

The action brought in Justice Hyde's court last Monday, by David Yeering against Frank Ross, resulted in a verdict of \$32 and costs for Yeering, who sued Ross for \$120, for some six head of his young cattle that he claimed had been driven from their range and butchered by Ross. The judgment was for two of the cattle, which Ross admitted having killed. The fate of the others seemed too much befogged in indefinite testimony to warrant the justice in awarding the full amount sued for.

The latest report in regard to the new steamboat on the ways at North Bend is that she is being built for business on this bay, and we are inclined to believe that the report has some foundation in fact. The North Benders feel that the brevity of the stops of the other boats at that place is an injustice to them, and the presumption is that they now intend to have a boat of their own, which, if it does not make its headquarters at the Bend, will be run to suit the interests and convenience of the people of that place and those who transact business there. She will be a good one, intended to surpass in speed and accommodations any other boat on the bay. Her machinery is being put in on the ways and she will be launched in a week or so.

THE EMPIRE BOOM.

What is Being Done and What is to Be Done.

Empire is now most assuredly looking up and enjoying a boom. It had been going the down grade for so many years that it had become almost depopulated. But the Oregon Southern Improvement company have checked the decline and already made a great change there, and within six months Empire will look like a new place. The old mill and all the buildings and property of the Lane dynasty were in a ruinous condition when the new company took possession, but now all this is changed; the mill is running, sawing out timbers to be used in the building of the new mill; the houses have been painted and overhauled, and an air of prosperity now pervades where but a few months ago there was only desolation and silence. The drivers are busy at work driving piles for wharves and booms, and the sound of the hammer and saw is heard in all directions. Two logging camps have already been started—one in charge of Wm. Turpin and the other in charge of Rod. Millidge—and the woods, where silence has reigned for so long, now ring with the sound of the ax and the crash of falling trees. Turpin's camp is below town and Millidge's is back of the upper end of town, and he puts his logs into the mill boom.

The new mill at Empire is to be a large two-story structure. The south end of it will comprise where the logway of the old mill ended. It will run north 400 feet, and will be 72 feet wide. The motive power will be 12 or 13 steam boilers, each 44 feet long and 4 feet in diameter, and three engines—a single one with a 30-inch cylinder and 36-inch stroke, and a pair coupled, with 24-inch cylinders and 36-inch stroke. The machinery for the mill is being manufactured at the Union Iron works, San Francisco, and is to be ready for shipment to Empire by the middle of September next, and it is expected that the new mill will be completed about next January. It will have a capacity of 150,000 feet of lumber per day; all of the machinery will be of the best make; everything will be arranged in modern and most convenient shape, and nothing will be wasted, as all scraps and refuse will be shipped.

On the main floor of the mill will be two circular saws for bolting the logs, one gang of 36 saws, and edge and five trimmers. The circulars for bolting will be 36 inches in diameter and their carriage will be 125 feet in length. The upper saw of the double circulars will be 54 inches in diameter and the lower one 60 inches, with a 40-foot carriage.

The logs will come in at the north end of the mill and the lumber, carried from the different saws on rollers, will be carried out by the mill.

The wharves, sheds, etc., for the reception and storage of lumber will be extensive.

The drafting of the plan of the mill was executed by Charles Elvidge, who came up by steamer last month and returned by last steamer. Elvidge lately drafted the plan for the new mill now building at Port Townsend, W. T.

M. V. Brown of San Francisco is the millwright and the timber, most of which are 10 inches square, are now being framed.

W. O. Phillips is engineer of the mill and A. Olsen, who was head sawyer at North Bend several years ago, is head sawyer and millman.

W. P. Granger and G. H. Miller are the two gentlemen at the head of the enterprise here, and they are both highly esteemed by all those with whom they come in contact. Granger was the engineer in charge of the Hoosac (Mass.) tunnel in 1867.

The company evidently mean business and have men at the head of affairs who know what they are about. They have improved the old store building by putting a new foundation under it, a new roof on it instead of the old tin one, a new platform in front, a door and pulley at the rear end for hoisting heavy articles to the second floor, and have newly painted the building, inside and out. E. P. Cook of this place did the inside painting, which is a guaranty that it was well and neatly executed.

The company have a new and extensive stock of goods for their store now on the way from the east by the steamer Alki. Capt. Doane, which vessel left New York on the 1st inst. and will be due here in September. The store will be under the management of Capt. G. B. Knowles.

The house near the mill has been repainted and repaired and Granger now occupies it for an office.

The old cook-house has been newly shingled and painted and a large dining room has been added to it. Mrs. A. H. Moore, formerly of Coaledo and Coquille City, has charge of the cook-house and dining room, and the boarders express themselves as highly satisfied with the fare served.

The company have also made improvements to their houses on the hill, by painting, outside and in, papering, etc., and painting and white-washing fences.

There are in the employ of the company about 40 men, besides the pile-driver crew.

W. H. Noble runs one pile driver and the company are running another, which is in charge of H. A. Osborne of San Francisco, a man of experience in such work. Geo. Davis of this place built the saw for the company's driver. The gins are 60 feet high and 24 inches apart, and the hammer weighs 3000 pounds. It is estimated that at least 4000 piles will be required for the works. Some of the piles they are driving are as much as 23 inches in diameter.

As soon as things get to running smoothly an addition 40 the town will be platted and lots will be sold at a reasonable figure to all who will build houses thereon.

The company are a law and order company, too; they will neither rent their buildings nor sell their land for saloon or immoral purposes, nor keep in their employ men who get drunk.

Coos Bay Boys Abroad.

Percy Levar and A. M. Crawford, who left here for the east a short time ago, have arrived safely at their destination. We make the following extract from a private letter received from Levar and written on the cars east of Chicago June 30:

"This train is going, I should judge, at the rate of about 1500 miles an hour—altogether too fast to suit me. But I want to tell you of a good one on Crawford. We stopped for 20 minutes at a station on the road, and walked forth in quest of a lunch. We had barely sat down and swallowed a cup of coffee when we heard the engine bell ring, and Crawford jumped for the door. When we reached the door I saw at a glance that the engine had but half the train and was probably stopping. So I gave the restaurant man four bits and watched the show. There was an open block between us and the track, and across this Crawford projected himself, his coat-tails flying in wild confusion and his arms beating the air like the sails of a windmill, much to the amusement of the assembled populace, who had tumbled to the racket and evinced their appreciation in the loudest manner. Christopher Columbus, how the man did run! I had no idea he could make such good time. I stopped and wiped the tears from my eyes, and when Crawford reached the train it stopped and backed up, and when I went over he was mopping his noble brow, completely winded. He ran once since, under similar circumstances, but as his misadventure was shared by several others, it was not so funny."

ROAD BUSINESS.
Time extended from the 1st to the 20th of August for the completion of the bridge Superior Whitney it having built in road district No. 3.

The sum of \$340 was allowed for the completion of the bridge above Myrtle Point.

A. H. Ross was allowed \$100 for lumber furnished for road district No. 19.

Geo. McEwan was allowed \$25 for nails and spikes for road district No. 19, and \$15 for nails for road district No. 13.

Simpson Bros. were allowed \$15 for lumber for road district No. 19.

B. Hermann was allowed \$164 for lumber for road district No. 19, and \$15 for lumber for road district No. 13.

Mark Morris was allowed \$45 for transporting lumber from the mill to the bridge in road district No. 19.

Whitney & O'Connell were allowed \$45 for nails for road district No. 14.

The cost of locating a road on Coos river was \$75.

A road was established from the school house on J. A. Youkman's place, at the forks of Coos river, to the east line of township 26.

J. Lehner was appointed superintendent to let contract for telegraph sent by order of board of supervisors.

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The Democratic Platform.

Following is the platform adopted by the Democrats at Chicago last week:

The democratic party of the union, through its representatives in national convention assembled, recognizes that as the nation grows older new issues are born, of time and progress, and that the fundamental principles of the democracy, approved by the united voice of the people, remain, and will remain, as the best and only security for the continuance of free government. The preservation of the rights of the people, the equality of citizens before the law, the reserved rights of the states, and the supremacy of the federal government, within the limits of the constitution, will ever form the true basis of our liberties, and can never be maintained without destroying the balance of rights and powers which enables a continent to be developed in peace and social order to be maintained by means of local self-government.

It is indispensable for the practical application and enforcement of these fundamental principles that the government should not always be controlled by one political party. Frequent change of administration is as necessary as constant recurrence to the popular will, to preserve the rights of the people, and the public servants to become arbitrary rulers.

This is now the condition of the country. Hence a change is demanded. The republican party, so far as principle is concerned, is the republican party; yet those in authority, made reckless by the long possession of power, have succumbed to its corrupting influence, and have placed in nomination a ticket against which the independent portion of the party are in open revolt.

Therefore a change is demanded. Such a change was a like necessity in 1876, but the will of the people was then defeated by a fraud which can never be forgotten nor condoned. Again, in 1880, the change demanded by the people was defeated by the lavish use of money, contributed by unscrupulous contractors and shameless jobbers, who had bargained for unlawful profits or for high office.

The republican party, during its legal, its stolen and its bought tenures of power, has steadily decayed in moral character and political capacity. Its platform promises are now a list of its past failures. It demands the restoration of our navy; it has squandered hundreds of millions to create a navy that does not exist. It calls upon congress to remove the burdens under which American shipping has been depressed; it imposed and has continued those burdens. It professes a protection for the free importation of goods, and has tried to legalize a control of state elections by federal troops. It professes a desire to elevate labor; it has subjected American workmen to the competition of convict and imported contract labor. It professes to protect the rights of the citizen, and has endeavored to deprive the citizen of his rights in the war, leaving widows and orphans; it left to a democratic house of representatives the first effort to equalize both bounties and pensions. It professed a pledge to correct the tariff, but it created a tariff which has continued them. Its own tariff commission confessed the need of more than 20 per cent. reduction; its congress gave a reduction of less than 4 per cent. It professes the protection of American manufactures; it has subjected them to an increasing flood of manufactured goods, and a hopeless competition with manufacturing nations, not one of which taxes raw materials.

It professes to protect all American industries; it has impoverished many to subsidize a few. It professes the protection of American labor; it has depleted the returns of American agriculture, an industry followed by half our people. It professes the equality of all citizens before the law, attempting to fix the status of colored people, and their rights of citizenship, by the decisions of its courts. It "accepts anew the duty of leading in the work of progress and reform"; its caught criminals are permitted to escape through continued delays or actual connivance of the executive. Honeycombed with corruption, outbreeding exposures no longer shock its moral sense. Its honest members, its independent journals, no longer maintain a successful contest for authority in its councils, or a veto on bad nominations. The changes necessary to rescue the country from the grasp of more than 200,000 men, which have yearly been collected from the suffering people by unnecessary taxation.

We denounce the republican party for having failed to relieve the people from the crushing war taxes which have paralyzed business, crippled industry and deprived labor of employment and of just reward. The democracy pledges itself to purify the administration from corruption, to restore to the people the principle of the law, and to reduce taxation to the lowest limit consistent with the preservation of the faith of the nation to the creditors and pensioners; knowing full well, however, that the legislature, the executive and the judiciary, by corruption, outbreeding exposures no longer shock its moral sense. Its honest members, its independent journals, no longer maintain a successful contest for authority in its councils, or a veto on bad nominations. The changes necessary to rescue the country from the grasp of more than 200,000 men, which have yearly been collected from the suffering people by unnecessary taxation.

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
