SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7 .- The most severe wind storm of the year has prevailed since 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and though somewhat abated at 10 o'clock to-night it is still blowing furiously. The city was turned topsy tur-


vy last night. Hundreds of signs were blown down, the tin roofing of several buildings was torn off, and many windows and fences wrecked. Nobody was seriously hurt, and the damage is so scattering and divided that it may be set down as nothing. The storm, following a long dry season, found the streets very dusty, and the effect can be easily imagined by those who have witnessed similar tempests here. The air has been filled with flying refuse, varying in size from a cobblestone to a grain of sand, and it has almost been worth , one's life to venture forth. 


