The time couldn't have been more enjoyable, and the unanimous wish of the doctor's numerous friends is that he may at least live to celebrate his centennial birthday, and his looks and his elastic step indicate that he intends to gratify their wish.

An extensive strike among the iron workers of San Francisco to prevent a 15-per-cent. reduction in their wages will delay the completion of the Newport Coal company's new steel steamer, work on which has been and will remain suspended until the strike is ended, and when that will be a matter of considerable doubt, as the employers declare that they cannot afford to pay the past wages and the employees declare that they will not work for less.

The editor of the Herald has made the astounding discovery that we are writing in the interest of a Coos river quarry. We fail to perceive wherein the merits of the matter at issue would be affected if we owned all the quarries on Coos river. It is high time for those who feel an interest in the permanent welfare of Coos county to look at the situation and make a note of the lukewarmness that prevails this community in regard to the bay bar improvements. There is a reason for this lukewarmness. What is it?

J. W. Wilson of Curry county was on the bay last week. He brought up a band of choice beef cattle for O. Schetter & Co. and drove home with him all the young stock cattle that he could buy at reasonable prices along the route. Wilson came in over the new road between this place and King's landing on Tathmus slough. Horsemen have traveled the road some, but the first stock driven over it was that driven by Wilson. He found the route quite as good as he expected to find it, and after a few more of the gulches have been graded and fixed the road will be almost unobjectionable for horsemen and loose stock, while a limited amount of work will render it passable for loaded wagons.

En route for San Francisco, Huden and Painter were bar-bound four days at Humboldt bay, there being only 12 feet of water at high tide. During their stay in Eureka there was a riot in Chinatown, and as David Kendall, an old and respected citizen, was passing by the Chinese quarter, he was struck in the side by a stray bullet and instantly killed. A boy was also shot in the foot. The white people of the place became so enraged at these deeds that they at once called a meeting and ordered the Chinese to depart immediately. A gallows was erected in front of Chinatown, with a chicken suspended from it, as a warning to the moon-eyed heathens to obey the order to go. The steamer Humboldt carried away about 200 and the steamer Chester took about 300. The excitement was so great that the sheriff had to call out the militia to protect the court-house and the jail, in which some 10 or 12 Chinamen were confined.

Next Monday it will be eight years since the steamer Arcata made her first trip to Coos bay, and in that time she has made 192 trips between San Francisco and this port, besides trips to Humboldt bay, Puget sound and Portland. Eight years ago last April the Arcata was launched at San Francisco, and in the following May she made her first trip from there to Humboldt bay. She was built for the lumber trade between Humboldt bay and San Francisco and was named in honor of the town of Arcata. Subsequently she was lengthened out and adapted to the trade that she has been in here. Capt. Holt took command of the Arcata on her first trip and has been in command of her ever since, excepting while temporarily absent on business or recreation. She has been the most successful steamer in this trade. Last year she carried to San Francisco 13,000 tons of coal, at a small cost over and above the amount realized for passengers and miscellaneous freight.

I suppose everyone has received a valentine ere this and that all are anticipating a gay and good time at the masquerade ball next Saturday night. Geo. M. Seely will soon begin logging, and Joe Noah will soon become a resident of North Coos river.

The many friends of Mrs. John M. Hodson will regret to learn that she is still dangerously sick.

Reports from all parts of this and Curry county agree that this has been an extraordinarily good winter for live stock in this section of Oregon. While we have had an unusual amount of rain, there has not been sufficient frost to check the growth of grass. At the Cliff ranch, in Curry county, there has been only three or four inches of snow this winter, and it soon melted away, while before this time last year there had been as many feet. This place is owned by J. W. Wilson, but he does not reside there. At his home ranch cattle have kept beef fat on the range. The same is the case with S. M. and R. C. Dement's cattle, at their places above Myrtle Point, where they keep fine stock.

Crawford & Wilson, successors to Bassett, now have the largest mercantile establishment at Port Orford that the place has ever had, and the indications are that they are preparing for a substantial boom there that they know is coming. It is reported that they have leased the Hubbard's creek mill and Joe Nye's mill, with a view to building a railroad from Port Orford to the Nye mill, which road will ultimately be extended four or five miles, to a body of valuable timber that Crawford & Wilson own on the Sixes river.

The bids submitted to Capt. Powell, United States engineer, for materials and structures for the use of the government in the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia river have been opened at Washington. A contract for 20,000 lineal feet of piling was awarded to P. F. Fallert of Kalama at 6 cents per foot, his being the lowest bid. A contract for constructing four barges for stone was let to J. F. Steffen at \$364. Work with the scows must be commenced before March 17 and completed by April 15.

The depression in the wool trade is driving some of the Coos and Curry county stock-owners out of the business. Valentine Gant of Rowland has been for some time working off his sheep and taking in cattle, and J. W. Wilson of Curry county says that he intends to do the same thing, as there is no money for him in sheep.

Joe. Ferry is superintendent of the Magalla gold mining company, near Chico, Butte county, Cal., in which mine Adam Pershaker is a large owner.

Notice to Loggers.

Spruce logs, 12 and 16 feet in length, were wanted at the Marshfield stove mill. J. J. EARLE, Superintendent.

The recent dynamite explosion in the house of commons demonstrated the fact that under existing rules governing admission of strangers to galleries and lobbies of the houses of parliament, it will be an easy matter for the dynamiters to convey explosives into the buildings during a session of parliament, and cause the death of many of its members. The government has decided to adopt more stringent rules regarding admission of visitors, and members of parliament in future will not be allowed to introduce strangers in the galleries and lobbies. The speaker of the house of commons alone will have the right of granting tickets of admission to visitors, and he will only issue tickets to members for their friends, after having received a week's notice, so that in the meantime the antecedents of the proposed visitors can be ascertained. Turnstiles will be erected at the entrance to the galleries and lobbies, and experienced detectives be placed at each turnstile to carefully scrutinize strangers.

Thos. McNara, a logger laboring under delirium tremens, cut his throat with a pocket-knife at a hotel at Albany a few nights ago, and then ran into the street and to the river bank a half-mile away, where he was stopped by a night-watchman. Nara's windpipe was severed and it was thought he would die.

In attempting to go to sea at Humboldt bay on the 10th inst., the schooner Annie Gee, Captain Jorgensen, went ashore on the north spit and, it is reported, became a total wreck.

The house bill repealing the pre-emption laws has passed the United States senate, but with amendments that the house is not expected to agree to.

In chopping wood at Roseburg the other day Rev. H. P. Webb made a mistake and hit his left thumb, splitting the bone below the second joint.

A new lein law has been passed by the legislature and approved by the governor.

Mrs. Wm. Trumbal of Josephine county has been sent to the insane asylum.

The Senate.

All doubt as to the senate for the next four years is removed. The election of Evans from New York and Teller from Colorado insures the republicans a clear majority, whether the legislature of Illinois respects the will of the people or not. There are already chosen or to hold over 41 republican senators out of 76, and the democrats without Illinois can get only 34; with the senator from that state they would have only 35. But it is hoped by republicans throughout the country that the splendid services of General Logan will not be ungratefully repaid by defeat. The people of Illinois gave a clear majority for the republican cause, and a plurality of over 25,000. To defeat a republican candidate for senator, either electing a democrat or depriving the state of half its representation, would be a wanton defiance of the popular will. Included in the list of 41 republican senators are General Mahone and Riddleberger, who joined with their associates in formally adopting the republican name prior to the national convention, who sought admission to that body as republicans, and were recognized and admitted by the convention, and who heartily supported the republican national candidates. If without them the republicans had not a majority, it is possible that the bourbon democrats would have been willing to sacrifice almost anything to secure the co-operation of the Virginia senators, though there is no reason to suppose that any overtures to them would have succeeded. But with 39 members, a clear majority of the senate, besides the two senators from Virginia, the republicans know that their opponents have nothing to gain by offering terms to Mahone and Riddleberger, and the savage abuse of those senators by democratic organs will therefore continue. The confirmation of Cleveland's appointments and the power to defeat mischievous legislation will rest with the republicans of the senate for two years from March 4, and after that time they have reason to hope
