The Coast Mail.

MARSHFIELD, OREGON

The steamer Coos Bay is due to-day.

Capt. Crack is loading the schooner Alcide at Empire with wood that he purchased of Sengstacken.

F. A. Golden has another card in this issue to which your special attention is directed if you owe him anything.

J. Lando, senior proprietor of the X L N T Cash store, is again on the bay, in splendid health and as jovial as of yore.

Miss Mary E. Flanagan has returned to her home at Newport. Her health is improving. Mrs. Sheridan came from Roseburg with Miss Flanagan.

Tim Lynch is the middle man and Joe Shingle and Henry Huden the end men of a minstrel troupe organized in this place by members of the Marshfield band.

Counterfeit silver dollars and half dollars are in circulation in San Francisco, and some have made their appearance here. They are bad counterfeits and easily detected if looked after at all.

The requisite number of scholars did not respond to Prof. Golden's invitation to meet him at the academy last Monday and he has indefinitely postponed the opening of the proposed private school.

Jonathon Osborne and family are in Tennessee, prosperous and happy. A letter from one of the family says Miss Maggie and Mrs. Devine have both married since they left here and that the late Mrs. Devine is now a mother.

A. P. Smith, who shot Geo. Gestrein in the boat last week, had an examination before Justice Hyde last Saturday, after which he was held in \$500 to answer before the grand jury, and in default of bail he was sent to the county jail at Empire. Gestrein is now a county charge, and recovering.

The steamer Myrtle is laid up this week, to receive her new boiler and undergo some needed repairs. When she comes again it will be on the fly and to let all the other boats on the bay read her name on the stern. While the Myrtle is off the berth she goes to Uter City in the morning and the Coos goes up in the afternoon.

The name of the little town springing into existence on the Siuslaw river, three miles above Florence, was erroneously printed in this paper a fortnight since. It is Acme, and Sengstacken & Co's saw mill is probably running by this time. A steamer will be built there this summer, for the purpose of towing vessels and doing the business of the river.

Yesterday John Nasburg received a postal card from V. N. Perry announcing the death of T. B. Willard at Coquille City last Monday evening and saying that he would be buried yesterday. Mr. Willard was a well and favorably known pioneer of southern Oregon. He had not reached his three score and ten, he was well-to-do there, and about half his life was lived in southern Oregon.

A saw that cost \$230 was ruined at Dean & Co's mill last Thursday by coming in contact with a part of a broken dog that some reckless chain tender had left in a log. Pieces of the saw fell all through the mill, but fortunately no one was hurt. A valuable saw was also badly damaged at the same mill the other day by a large spike that had been left in a log. It seems strange men will be so reckless of life as to leave such things in logs, to say nothing about the destruction of property.

Last Saturday night Mr. Wald, brother-in-law of Edward Reed of this place, met with a shocking accident at Reed's residence. Wald was in the kitchen, reading, when he was taken suddenly ill with a fit and a coal-oil lamp was in some manner exploded, by which he was badly burnt from the small of the back to the knees on both legs, and also on the right arm from the elbow down. His head and face on the right side were badly scorched, too. The hand was so completely cooked that the entire epidermis and the nails sloughed off. Wald is now in a precarious condition.

Wm. Hongell, of the firm of Hongell & Selander, died in this place Wednesday night of last week and was buried last Friday, his remains being followed to the grave by a very large number of sympathizing friends. He came to the bay about four years ago and he and Mr. Selander had been together in a prosperous business for about three years. Mr. Hongell was a very excellent young man, whose death is universally regretted. In Finland he leaves a father and mother and an elder sister and a younger brother, and in this place two brothers—Andrew and John Hongell—and a sister—Mrs. John Hilstrom—to mourn the untimely death of a faithful and affectionate son and fond brother.

At Empire, last Friday, Jacob Brown and S. Puskala entered into a wordy argument concerning the proper hour for dinner, and from words they speedily came to blows. In the scuffle Brown snatched a large steel file from a bench close at hand, and when hostilities ceased an inventory of the damages sustained showed that Brown was uninjured, while Puskala had an ugly wound on the left side of his head, an indentation

in the skull on the right side, a punch in the breast by the sharp end of the file, and a hole entirely through the right hand, near the thick part of the thumb. Puskala's wounds were dressed and a warrant was issued for the apprehension of Brown, who was arrested and taken before Justice Flegler on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. He was bound over to await the action of the grand jury, and his bail was fixed at \$250, in default of which he was committed to the county jail.

Launch of the Arago.

The launch of the Newport coal company's new steel steamer Arago at San Francisco on the 24 inst. is described as a great success. To witness the launch, people went to the ship yard in carriages, buggies, street cars, a-foot, a-horseback and in tug boats, of which there were three or four.

The launch was announced for 2 o'clock, and at exactly one minute to 2 the motion of the hull became perceptible. "It slowly increased—it became rapid—and, with a majestic courtesy to the spectators, the Arago plunged into the bay, and the green water kissed her keel of steel. The shouts of the spectators, the screech of the steam whistles and the cheers of the workmen on her decks made the scene a most inspiring one. The Arago was baptized by Mrs. G. Prescott with a bottle of California champagne."

A private letter from San Francisco says the Arago's hull presented handsome lines and a shapely appearance. In a short space of time, immediately after the launch, by the aid of mechanical shears of great size and strength and of peculiar construction, the Arago's engines were placed in her.

The Arago is expected to be completed early next month, when she will put in an appearance at this place. Besides fuel, she will carry about 900 tons of coal.

When the Arago commences running the Arcata will be laid up. The new steamer will carry about 3000 tons per month, sufficient for the demand in the present dull condition of the coal market. With an improvement in the market, the Arcata is expected to resume her trips.

Another Description of the New Mill at Empire City.

The new mill just completed by the Oregon Southern improvement company at Empire City, Coos bay, is conceded to be the most complete mill on the Pacific coast. Its capacity is estimated to be 150,000 feet of sawed lumber in 10 hours, which will probably be exceeded when the organization is complete. It is built in the most substantial manner throughout and fitted up with the latest and most improved machinery. The material is Oregon pine, which, as is well known, is the toughest timber grown in the United States. The mill is 400x72 feet, with boiler house 78x46. It rests on 364 cedar piles, driven in 28 rows of 13 piles each, capped and cross-capped with 13x16 timbers. Floor joists 6x16 are covered with inch boards, and two inch surfaced plank laid over them, making the floor. The frame is very solid, and consists of 28 bents 15 feet apart, uprights 16x16 supporting the stringers and cross-stringers, also 16x16, assisted by braces fore and aft. The lower story contains 140 of these uprights, constituting a massive support to the main floor, where the principal operations are carried on, and which is entirely free from posts, the roof being supported by heavy cross-beams, with lighter trusses above, making a lofty room, very light and airy. The roof is covered with cedar shingles and the sides with rustic. The first story contains the engines, shafting, sawdust conveyors and planing machines. The engines and boilers were made by the Union Iron works, San Francisco. There is one large engine 30x36, and one double engine 20x24, and 12 flue boilers 4 feet by 24. The fuel will be sawdust, conveyed automatically to the grate bars, and fed automatically by the Yankee fireman. On the upper floor the logs are hauled up the logway, in the center of the end of the mill, by one of Stearns' mammoth endless chain log jacks, and delivered on either side to the circulars. These consist of a double and a triple mill, carrying saws five feet in diameter. The double mill has Stearns' improved fractional head blocks, and Prescott's steam feed, and can saw logs up to 40 feet in length and 10 inches in diameter. The triple mill will saw up to 125 feet in length and 10 feet in diameter, and has wire rope feed driven by a small independent engine. After being squared up, the timber is taken up by the line rolls, of which there are some 200 arranged in long rows, and delivered to the cut-off saws beyond the circulars. Two of these trim the ends, and the flooring cuts are deposited on the gang rolls in the center of the mill, and run through the gang.

The gang saw was made by Wicker Bros. of Saginaw, Mich., and is 20-inch stroke with 48-inch gauge. Then the logs deliver the boards to the gang edgers on either side, and from thence out at the end of the mill. The lumber to be planed passes into the lower story and through the planers, of which there are three, the largest having a capacity of 30 inches wide and 12 inches thick, and thence outside of the mill to the wharf, where sheds will be built for its reception. The rough lumber will go over an inclined railway to the wharves and lumber yard.

A lathe mill and shingle mill will convert all available material into their respective product, and the refuse not used in other ways will be automatically carried to the slab pit and burned. The water supply comes from a reservoir over a mile away, brought in 4-inch pipe, and there is 75 feet head at the mill. The water is soft and admirably adapted for making steam. A 2½-inch pipe runs the whole length of the mill on each floor, with 50 feet of hose every 100 feet, and a sprinkling pipe runs along the ridge-pole to wet down the roof and prevent fire from sparks lodging there.

The bulk of the machinery and belting was supplied by the Stearns manufacturing company of Erie, Penn., who have no superiors as builders of heavy saw-mill machinery, and the shafting, pulleys and live rolls by Tatum & Bowen of San Francisco. The mill will probably be ready for work by the 1st of next month.—[Oregonian.]

At Woolwich arsenal England has a gun in process of construction that will weigh 200 tons when completed. It is 43 feet 8 inches long, 8½ feet at the breech and 28 inches at the muzzle.

The Late Col. Beale.

On Monday, the 6th inst., there was laid to their last rest in the Masonic cemetery, and with the solemn and impressive ceremonies of the Masonic fraternity, all that remains of Col. Thomas J. Beale, who died in Coos county on the 2d inst., and whose remains were conveyed to this city for interment. He was born April 16, 1822, in Freeport, Armstrong county, Pennsylvania, and on October 14, 1858, he was married to Mary A. Keener of that county. There was born of this marriage five children, one of whom died in infancy and the rest survive. The mother died January 28, 1866, and by her side the new made grave is made. Following in that restless army of gold seekers, Col. Beale arrived in California in 1848, and in 1852 he first adopted Oregon as his home. From early life, in religious faith, he was a Presbyterian; and after he arrived in Oregon he united with the Methodist Episcopal church of Ten-mile, to which for 17 years and to the close of his life he proved constant. He was a Mason from early manhood and one of the charter members of Laurel lodge of this city. He was also a Companion Royal Arch Mason. He was appointed a colonel in the Oregon militia, but was never called into active service. In whatever capacity he was chosen he was ever zealous in the discharge of its duties. As one of the early pioneers of Oregon, he was first in the forefront when danger threatened, and many of the old Umpqua settlers who bowed their sorrowing heads over his grave on Monday can testify to some brave act, some needy charity, some energetic aid, which has given to his name a loving remembrance. To society, he was prompt in all his obligations, and as a man, he was restless in the effort to develop the wealth of the mountains as well as to enrich and utilize the resources of the valley. His fervid imagination gave willing ear to every narrative of speculative venture and at once his persevering nature impelled him on. The electric light of Hope was ever beckoning him onward. In the fond recollection of old friends the name of Tom Beale will long linger. At many a hospitable fire hearth, and at many a camp scene was his familiar voice a welcome harbinger, as the sun of day unnoticed sunk to rest and the fitting shades of night came on. If others excelled him in graceful culture or in academic lore, none were beyond him in mature judgment, conservative principle, and in cordial and true courtesy. Society was to him not always what it seemed to be, but rather what it is. A man was to him what he deserved to be, not what his rank or title made him. He honored his religion by his example. Always ready to concede what belonged to others, he was not slow to invoke redress when he was justly entitled to it. But his trials are over. Devoted companions have bade their long, last adieu! Loving hands have dropped the sprig of acacia on his grave! The stately column is broken! The operative workman is at rest. And while at noon, in the beauty and glory of day, full facing the blazing sun in his diurnal roll, his immortal spirit is wafted along the level of time, to that spiritual temple, that house "not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."—[B. H. in the Plaindealer.]
