Sudden Death.

Uncle Billy Knowlton of South Coos

river died somewhat suddenly and un-

expectedly at the Blanco hotel in this

place last Friday morning. He came to

town the Tuesday previous to his death,

and was at that time indisposed from

fatigue and exposure that he had recent-

ly undergone in prospecting for good

timber land in the vicinity of his loca-

tion on South Coos river, but no one

suspected for a moment that his ailment

would so soon prove fatal, though

Thursday night he was so sick that

Tommy Mortimer and another young

man sat up with him.

At 4 o'clock Friday morning Knowl-

ton was sleeping peacefully and present-

ed every appearance of being better, when

the young men left him and went to

rest themselves.

At 6:30 o'clock S. B. Curtis, clerk at

the hotel, was making his customary in-

spection of the rooms, when he discovered

Knowlton lying on the floor, in a

comatose condition, he evidently having

risen or rolled from the bed.

Curtis called assistance and Knowlton

was placed in bed, immediately after which

he opened his eyes and then ex-

pired, without having said a word.

Knowlton had no relatives here and

his remains were taken in charge by

Baker, post No. 8, G. A. R., of which

he was a member, and they buried

him last Sunday with all the honors

incident to the organization, the woman

's relief corps and a large number of

citizens participating in the obsequies.

Knowlton was the owner of some land

on South Coos river and there was due

him something near \$1000 for timber

cut from his land last season by J. A.

Yorkham. He was a native of Bangor,

Maine, and the only relative he leaves

to mourn his loss is a sister.

The Recorder's Mysterious Wreck.

Last January the Recorder mentioned

the finding by Geo. Sypher of an anchor

or chain on the beach near Floras lake

and connected the chain with a mysteri-

ous wreck that took place there many

years ago.

S. P. Montgomery of North Bend is

conversant with the wreck referred to

by the Recorder and expresses surprise

that there are not many old settlers of

Curry county who remember the name

of the vessel and the circumstances un-

der which she was lost.

It was the bark Friendship, and she

went ashore there about 23 years ago,

having aboard between 200,000 and

300,000 feet of lumber, with which cargo

she had laid at Port Townsend or some

place in that vicinity most of the

previous winter.

Originally the Friendship was a ship

—a New Bedford whaler—cooper bot-

tomed and built about 80 years ago.

At one time in her career as a whaler

the Friendship was captured by the

Feejee Islanders and subsequently re-

captured by strategy on the part of the

second mate, after which she returned

to the east.

On again returning to the Pacific

coast, the Friendship was cut down and

transformed into a bark, and at the

time she was lost she was owned by

Pope & Talbot of San Francisco.

The Friendship was a craft of sharp

build that would draw over 20 feet with

a cargo of less than 300,000 feet of lumber.

The supposition is that the Friendship

became water-logged and was deserted

at sea. Subsequently the lifeless rem-

ains of Capt. Knight and three of his

crew were found on the beach many

miles south of the wreck.

Just after the wreck of the Friendship

a tug left North Bend for the scene, but

her mission proved fruitless, she failing

to succor the castaways or be of any ser-

vice to the stranded vessel.

Montgomery knew the Friendship at

New Bedford, and after she came to this

coast he made two or three trips in her
