Charley Hilborn of this place is an-

other old settler who is familiar with

the wreck of the bark Friendship, which

vessel went ashore about three miles

north of the Sixes river April 14, 1860.

Hilborn lived there at the time and saw

the vessel sailing close to shore on the

morning of the day that she stranded.

Her proximity to the land in the morn-

ing caused Hilborn some surprise and

he imbibed the impression that she was

mastered by some stupid skipper who

did not know where he was or what he

was doing; but as Hilborn held no

stock in the vessel at that time he went

away about his own business and left

her to her fate. When he returned to

his home in the evening the Friendship

was hopelessly stranded, having gone

ashore at high tide. The first man to

discover the wreck after it struck the

beach was the mail carrier, going down

the coast. He reported the fact to Ned

Wilson, who at once boarded the wreck

and claimed it. The next day the masts

fell and broke up the deck, when the

lumber commenced washing ashore.

The lumber at that time was a perfect

Godsend to the settlers of the vicinity,

who needed it in their business, for

building houses and fencing their lands.

Hilborn captured enough of it to build

him a house 16 by 24 feet in dimensions

and a story and a half high, and also

much fencing material, blocks and

tackle, two anchors and chains, many

carpenter's tools, the cook's potato

masher, and sundry other things. Sev-

eral barrels of pork and other provisions

washed ashore. In the cabin of the

wreck was a lady's hat, that would in-

dicate that the captain's wife was with

him at the time he deserted his vessel.

Hilborn now has two of the blocks and

to this day the potato masher that he

took from the wreck is being used in

his family. It has always been a mys-

tery to Hilborn why the captain and

crew of the Friendship deserted her and

took their chances at sea in open boats,

as the wreck presented no indica-

tions of such an emergency having been

at all necessary.

Last Saturday Rev. C. P. Bailey and

family had a hard time and he came

near losing one of his children in com-

ing in a small boat through the cut-off

between Catchingslough and Coos river.

The water was low and the channel was

so obstructed by logs that the reverend

gentleman was at times compelled to

wade and drag his boat after him, while

the wife and children perched upon logs

or made their way along the banks of

the slough in deep mud and under

many difficulties. At one point Mr.

Bailey placed his little four-year-old

girl upon a log that appeared to be

firmly imbedded in the mud, for the child

to remain there until he had dragged

his boat over a shoal place in the slough.

After he had gone 12 or 15 feet from the

log, it and the child rolled into the
