The steamer Coos Bay arrived Saturday, went to the Umpqua Sound, returned Monday, took 300 packages of staves at the mill here, went to the Caldonia coal mine Monday night, took in about 60 tons of coal, came down Tuesday morning and sailed for San Francisco Tuesday afternoon.

A. Cory, late filer at the North Bend mill, took a similar situation at the state mill in this place a few days ago, but he is now under engagement to return to North Bend and take the foremanship of the mill there on the 15th inst., A. S. Wadleigh having tendered his resignation, to take effect at that time.

P. C. Durgin is opening the Coos bay and Coquille wagon road between Wall's bridge and Southport, at a cost of \$550. He expects to complete the work in a fortnight. The portion of the road that remains unopened this side of Southport will soon be finished by Supervisor Dimmick, when teams can be driven from this place to Coquille City.

Annie, the 11-year-old daughter of Andrew Olsen, met with an accident at Haynes slough last Friday by which her right thigh-bone was broken. Her dress caught upon one of the pickets of a fence that she was crossing, and thus she was thrown to the ground. Dr. Tower set the fractured limb and when he left the child was in a fair way of speedy recovery.

Archibald Duncan, an inmate of the county hospital, aged 61 years, fell from the steps of that institution last Sunday and broke his left arm near the shoulder. Dr. McCormac, county physician, adjusted the fractured arm and afforded the old gentleman all the relief possible, but the doctor does not feel sanguine of Duncan's recovery, owing to his age and general debility.

The sewing society of this place gave a basket picnic at Pony slough last Friday—May-day. Those who attended the picnic are unanimous in pronouncing it a perfect success and one of the best they ever participated in. In the evening a ball was given at Norman's hall in this place, at which Miss Ida Hall was crowned Queen of May with an elegant wreath of flowers presented by Capt. Ernst in his happiest manner.

Capt. Marshall brought the Arcata up last trip. She is now on her 190th trip between this place and San Francisco. Capt. Holt is looking after the finishing touches that the Arcata is now receiving. After the joiners and painters get through with her he will be ready for service, and Capt. Marshall thinks that will be by the 20th of this month. Steam had been raised on the Arcata before last left and her machinery worked well. We are sorry that Holt did not complete his 200th trip with the Arcata, for he had promised us a big item on that occasion.

Last Sunday was a nice day and the picnic at North Bend was a grand success throughout. The steamer Coos came up from Empire in the morning with about 100 persons who stopped at the Bend, and then the steamer came on to this place, from which she took down 200 or more, and in the afternoon the steamer Comet carried down a large number, so that altogether, with those from the Bend and the adjacent sloughs, there were nearly 500 persons in attendance. The grounds, the nicest on the bay, were in excellent order for the occasion and the employees of the mill had had a neat and substantial platform, some 30 by 40 feet in size, constructed of tongue and grooved lumber, in the shade of the majestic trees, for the benefit of those fond of the dance, and the Empire City brass band enlivened the day with some of their best music. A long table was loaded with a splendid lunch, free for all, which was partaken of at the appropriate time and duly appreciated, while many groups, large and small, ate their lunches at shady and grassy spots in the surrounding grove. There were swings for the little ones, and the big ones who could not or did not want to dance amused themselves at different games, until near 4 o'clock in the evening, when the Comet took the Empire people home and the Coos came to Marshfield. A game they called "Fox and Geese" attracted much attention and created a great deal of amusement because of the many old coos who took part in it and made it lively for the young geese and their Mother Hubbards sometimes when they didn't fall down. Many of the exploits of the old chaps in this game were very laughable and the youngsters took it all in and enjoyed the fun. S. H. Hazard and Capt. Dunham were the champion foxes in fleetness, the former being the only one in the game who could capture the latter when he set his long arms and legs in motion and started off like a wind-mill in a hurricane, making the earth tremble whenever his feet came in contact with it. Monday John Kenyon complained of rheumatism in one knee and Andrew Nasburg was lame in both legs; but Sunday John wasn't rheumatic and Andrew didn't act as if anything would lame him. They tried to entice us into that game, but we were too old a fox for that. We preferred to look on and digest the nice lunch that we had partaken of at that end of the long table presided over by Mrs. Capt. Hill and Mrs. Lizzie Forslund.

M. T. Wold, who had his right hand amputated a week ago yesterday, died at the residence of Edward Reed last Friday, from the effects of epileptic convulsions, to which disease he had been subject for many years. Prior to the accident that led to the amputation of his hand he had been in the employ of the O. S. I. company at Empire. Before coming to Coos bay, about 10 months ago, Wold worked at Puget sound, where his wife died. He leaves three children, boys, ranging in age from two to eight years. His funeral took place Saturday from the residence of his brother-in-law, Edward Reed, services being conducted at the Baptist church by Rev. C. P. Bailey, after which the remains were followed to the cemetery by the relatives and a large number of sympathizing friends.

We received too late for last week's paper an explanation from Hon. J. H. Roberts concerning his support of the new school law. When Roberts voted for the measure it was his understanding that the effect of it would be to give to each school district only an annual appropriation of \$50. This is also the construction put upon the law by E. B. McElroy, state superintendent of public instruction, and by J. T. McCormac, our county school superintendent.

Fourth class or non-presidential post-offices are now receiving the attention of Postmaster General Vilas and republican heads are being chopped off and tumbled into the basket as rapidly as he can consider cases. Major A. G. Brown is supposed to be the coming man for the Marshfield postoffice.

The Arcata brought on her last trip three large new planers for the O. S. I. company's mill at Empire. Two of the machines are to plane flooring and the knives are so arranged that both sides of the lumber are planed at the same time. The machines are considered perfect in their way.

The Standard's Policy.

The editor of the Portland Standard being the leading exponent in this state of the principles and policy of democracy, it follows that his mutterings on the Russian and English imbroglio must be taken as a faint echo of its thunder; otherwise, he is certainly demented. He cherishes the thought and glories in the hope of that coming era, that blissful dawn, when the world will be all Cossack and republican. How long would republicanism last if the Russians were to succeed in conquering Europe and Asia?

Again he says: "Our sympathies should be with Russia because England gave her sympathy and assistance to the 'disorganizing rebel element' in these states." There may be much of truth in that statement, but there is no doubt and incontrovertible truth in the statement that, so far as a newspaper could go at the commencement of the rebellion, none displayed more sympathy for the "disorganizing rebel element" than the editor of the Portland Standard. Gen. McDowell, commander of the military division of the Pacific, was compelled to sit down on his secession sentiments and seditious proclivities, by suppressing his paper, the Democratic Register, printed at Eugene City, Lane county. Evidently, the man is not serious, or what is more than probable, looking at the part that he took in aid of the late "disorganizing rebel element," he is merely a blustering blatherskite; one of those who pat a man on the back, and say, "go in," while keeping out of the fight. If the civilization of the Cossack suits him, why does he not take advantage of its beneficent influence by migrating and assuming the collar of the Russian czar? Let him practice what he preaches, and cast his logic to dogs; it fits not the intelligence of enlightened and liberty loving people.

More Thoroughbred Cattle for Oregon.

Last week D. C. Stewart of Forest Grove reached Portland with 12 head of pure-bred Holstein cattle, from Rochester, N. Y. They came over the Northern Pacific and arrived in remarkably fine condition. There were nine heifers and three bulls, the oldest being two years of age, and the youngest yearlings. Stewart inspected the best herds of Holstein cattle in the east and selected from what he considered the finest of the herds. Four of the heifers are imported. Experts in cattle who saw the new arrivals pronounce them superior to any that have heretofore been brought to that part of this state. Stewart took 5 of the cattle to add to his 15 of the same breed in Washington county. The remainder were taken by Capt. Geo. Flavel to his farm on Clatsop plains. As the home of the Holstein cattle is upon the reclaimed tide lands, it is thought they will thrive better near the ocean than in the interior, and Flavel has great hopes for the future of his new venture. Stewart also brought a 2-year-old short-horn bull for W. S. Ladd.

S. R. Hill of Kansas City, Mo., also brought some fine stock to Portland last week. His cattle consisted of 12 head of imported Galloways, or Scotch blacks, as they are known abroad. This is said to be the first lot of cattle of this kind introduced into Oregon, though the breed has been familiar to the eastern dealers in fine cattle for five years. They are jet black, with a coating of long hair, and have long bodies, short legs and no horns. Their heads resemble that of the buffalo, and they are said to be able to defend themselves effectively in a contest with horned cattle. The Galloways are strictly beef cattle, in which particular it is claimed they
