Orders from Headquarters at Toledo
and Portland.

The following, from J. S. Kountz and
F. H. Lamb, is of interest to Grand
Army men at this time:

HEADQUARTERS G. A. R., ADJUTANT GEN-
ERAL'S OFFICE, TOLEDO, O., April 30, 1885.—
General Orders No. 15.

In accordance with rules and regulations, May
30 will be observed as Memorial day. As de-
fined by resolution of the eighteenth annual en-
campment, it will be kept sacred to the memory
of our heroic dead. Let no idle merrymaking
mar its consecrated hours.

Twenty years have passed since our last grand
review. The death roll of years has added tens
of thousands to the half million graves we left
behind. The daily tolling bell, the freshly
crushed grape, the muffled drum, the slow and
solemn procession, tell how fast our comrades
join the silent ranks above.

One by one a gallant leader languishes upon
his couch of pain, and over myriads of homes
the death angel hovers darkly. Hallowed be the
day that brings such solemn thoughts as these.

Our comrades sleep well. No tear can dis-
turb their profound slumber, no perfume of
flowers make their rest more sweet; but wherever
Memorial day is observed, there rises a higher
ideal of American valor, a holier care for the
men who saved the union.

Let posts of the Grand Army everywhere as-
semble. Enlist all loyal hearts in an observance
of the day. Let the women and children be in-
vited. Let all who reverence the flag unite in
the ministration of loyalty and affection. The
custom of inviting the clergy to hold memorial
services on the Sunday preceding Memorial day is
again commended and comrades should feel it
a privilege and duty to attend.

Wherever there are no graves to gather
around, as on the far frontier, memorial services
may still be held. Where there are no flowers
to wreath, there still remains that perfect flower
of freedom—the red, white and blue. Above
each patriot's grave may its benediction fall.

Corvallis Baptist Association.

The above-named association met
with the Sumner church last Thursday.

The following-named ministers were in
attendance: Rev. J. C. Baker, superin-
tendent of missions, Salem; Rev. C. P.
Bailey of Sumner, Rev. G. W. Black of
Gardiner, Rev. W. G. Miller of Look-
ingglass, Rev. J. C. Canterbury of Ran-
dolph, Rev. F. E. Scofield of Dora, and
Rev. R. J. E. Campbell of Pine Bluff,
Arkansas.

Rev. W. G. Miller was elected moder-
ator, Rev. G. W. Black secretary, and
Deacon Geo. B. Day of Springfield, Lane
county, treasurer.

The opening sermon was preached by
Rev. W. G. Miller.

The home mission report was made
by Rev. C. P. Bailey, showing great des-
titution in this field and recommending
that the Corvallis association continue
to co-operate with the home mission so-
ciety of New York.

The foreign mission report was made
by Rev. G. W. Black, showing that
God is most signally blessing the work
of the Baptist foreign missionaries and
that they should be supported liberally.

The report on education was made by
Hon. Tim. Barnard, who commended
McMinnville college as the institution of
the denomination in this state.

The report on Sunday schools was
made by Rev. C. P. Bailey and the re-
ports on temperance and Sabbath ob-
servance were read by Rev. F. E. Sco-
field and Brother M. L. Randleman.

During the sessions sermons were
preached by Rev. W. G. Miller, J. C.
Canterbury, R. J. E. Campbell, C. P.
Bailey, G. W. Black and J. C. Baker.

Rev. F. E. Scofield was selected to
preach the opening sermon at the next
session, with Rev. G. W. Black as alter-
nate.

On Sunday, at 11 a. m., Rev. J. C.
Baker, superintendent of missions for
the Northern Pacific coast, preached an
edifying sermon from Revelations 1: 17
and 18: theme—"Christ, the head of the
Christian dispensation."

The association adjourned Sunday,
to meet with the church at Lookingglass,
Douglas county, on the Thursday be-
fore the fourth Sunday in September,

Altogether, the meeting of the associ-
ation at Sumner is represented as a very
good and successful one.

The Henryville Mine.

Wm. Phillips, superintendent of the
Henryville coal mine under its new
management, arrived by the Arcata last
Sunday and on Monday morning he
went to Henryville and took possession
of the mine and all the property there-
unto belonging. He found things in
about as good condition as he expected
to find them, and he is now engaged in
erecting a smokestack, preparatory to
starting the engine and freeing the mine
of water.

Only a few hundred tons of coal were
ever taken from this mine, and after it
has been relieved of the water that has
accumulated in it, since the suspension
of work there several years ago, it will
be necessary to run gangways and open
rooms before any considerable amount
of coal can be shipped from it.

It is not the intention of the new man-
agement to rush things furiously at
first, and for some time the force em-
ployed at the mine will not be large,
unless the coal market should so im-
prove as to justify a more speedy open-
ing of the mine than is contemplated at
present.

F. Bernard & Co., owners of the
steamer Wilmington, have offered to
carry the Henryville coal to San Fran-
cisco at \$2 50 per ton, and negotiations
are pending between the lessee of the
mine and the owners of the steamer
Coos Bay for the use of vessel as a col-
lier.

There appears to be no difficulty in
obtaining steamers to carry the coal at
reasonable figures and it now looks very
probable that the mine can and will be
profitably worked.

Wm. Phillips, the superintendent, is
an experienced coal miner, well and
favorably known here as the superin-
tendent of the Eastport mine prior to
the time it passed into the hands of its
present owners.

W. T. Davis, the lessee of the Henry-
ville mine, is an energetic business man
and experienced in gold and silver min-
ing, but this we believe to be his first
venture at coal. We know the gentle-
man well and have no hesitation in say-
ing that he means business and that the
Henryville mine will be worked for all
there is in it.

Davis is expected here by next steam-
er, and also an engineer to take charge
of the machinery at the mine.
