Hon. C. B. Watson has returned from the east and is again at his post of duty at Empire.

Rev. W. Lund will hold Episcopal services at Empire next Sunday at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m.

This week Dr. J. T. McCormac, school superintendent, has visited the schools at the forks of Coos river and Haynes, Kentuck and Willanch sloughs, all of which are fully attended and in a prosperous condition.

John W. Carlson has succeeded E. Sinclair as clerk at Golden's drug store. Mr. Carlson is a son of Rev. P. Carlson, who recently organized the Swedish church in this place, and who is now at Minneapolis, Minn.

Edward Johnson, mate of the schooner Bobolink, who had his right leg badly broken at the bar on the 29th ult., is doing splendidly, and his physicians, Drs. Golden & McCormac, say that he will soon be out on crutches.

Capt. W. D. L. Smith and his son William, deputy sheriff, left Empire last Monday for Salem, having in charge Jas. Madison, alias Matt. Tyner, convicted of larceny in a dwelling and sentenced to the penitentiary for three years.

Among the passengers by the last Arcata was W. H. Jackson, formerly and for many years clerk of this county. He is now a resident of Fresno, Cal., and his business here is supposed to be connected with outstanding claims that he has against several persons in different parts of the county. His stay will depend somewhat upon the success he meets with in satisfactorily settling his business.

Thus far this year we have had no evidence from Green Farris that the trout have been troublesome at his place on the north fork, and we hardly believe that the run went that high, and this may be the reason why he has a large crop of luscious cherries, a bucket brimful of which he sent us last Monday. The quickness with which the cherries disappeared after we exhibited them at the house and to the neighbors was positive proof of their excellence. That balances the fish business, Green, and you can now fire away at us with anything else that you have good to eat around the ranch.

The jury before whom D. I. DeLauny was tried at Empire last week found him guilty of assault with intent to kill and Judge Bean sentenced DeLauny to one year's imprisonment in the penitentiary. This appears to have been something of a surprise to DeLauny's friends, who immediately bestirred themselves in his behalf in a more energetic manner than it seems they thought to be necessary before the verdict was rendered and the sentence pronounced. The judge ordered a stay of execution of the sentence for 30 days, the prisoner being remanded to the custody of the sheriff and that officer being empowered to select a suitable person to take charge of him. DeLauny is now in the hands of I. Hacker. Immediately after the judge had sentenced DeLauny petitions were put in circulation at Empire, North Bend, this place, and along the Coquille river, and signed by most of those to whom they were presented, praying the governor and state pardoning board to pardon DeLauny, and the judge's order for a stay of proceedings seems to have been made with a view to giving these petitions, all of which have gone forward, a chance to reach their destination and produce the desired effect, if that can be accomplished. In addition to the petitions circulated for the signatures of men, others were circulated for the signatures of women, and these, too, met with a success similar to the first. The language used in the heading of the petitions was so strong in behalf of DeLauny that some men who signed, without reading, afterwards regretted the putting of their names down when they were told the full purport of the document. This led to some discussion and dissatisfaction, and at present there is considerable feeling in this community in regard to the unfortunate affair in which so much of the happiness of two homes is involved.

Archibald Duncan died at the county hospital last Thursday night. He was an old man, who had been in feeble health and an inmate of the hospital for a number of years. A few weeks ago he fell from the high steps at the hospital door and broke his arm, the effects of which accident hastened his death. He was buried at this place Friday.

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THE ARAGO.

The Newport Company's New Collier.

The new steel steamer Arago, contracted for by the Newport Coal company about a year ago, and just completed at the Union Iron works at San Francisco, put in an appearance at this place last Tuesday forenoon.

Of course we are proud of her—the first steel steamer built on the coast—for she belongs to us, in our minds, and we were over-anxious to see her, for she was to have been here sooner by several weeks. But it is better a little late than never. The Arago looks well, and she has been accepted without a dissenting voice.

There may be handsomer steamers than the Arago, but she is pretty enough for Coos bay, and for the business for which she was built she appears to us to be perfect. Then, what we don't know about the construction of a steamer for this trade Capt. Holt does, and as he knew what he wanted before the Arago was contracted for, the public can rest assured that the Newport Coal company has secured exactly what it needed.

Following is a list of the officers of the Arago: G. A. Holt, master; J. Montford, first mate; M. Fritz, second mate; J. Forbes, chief engineer; A. Marshall, second engineer, and W. Quast, steward, and her crew consists of 18 men.

The Arago is 207 feet long, 30 feet beam and 16 feet depth of hold. She has 16 state-rooms, with 32 berths, and is allowed to carry 56 passengers—32 first-class and 24 in the steerage. Six of the state-rooms are aft and the others amidships, and all on the main deck. The rooms are large and furnished with all the modern improvements. The berths appeared to be remarkably comfortable and well equipped, and a large mirror, cushioned seats, marble-topped wash-stand, supplied with water from faucets attached to a pipe connected with a metallic reservoir above, and a neat metallic lamp suspended from a bracket between the reservoir and the berth, give to each room a cozy aspect.

All the officers have comfortable quarters, but Capt. Holt's room is almost too nice for anybody, and it would break his heart to be compelled to return to his old quarters on the old Arcata. Beneath a neat secretary he has a burglar-proof safe that he could not unlock himself this trip without consulting an almanac, tide-table, or something of that sort, and after his visitors once locate on his lounge they feel inclined to stay all day.

The smoking room, amidships and above the machinery, is large, airy, and well supplied with cushioned seats that will be very inviting to lovers that may travel on the Arago—smoke or no smoke.

The dining room is large—being 18 or 20 feet in width and in length the entire width of the steamer. It has two long tables and the equipments of the room are complete.

Permanent stairways lead from the main to the upper deck; there are four or five large life-boats, of metal and wood, with oars; a life-raft, life-preservers too numerous to count, life lines, hundreds of feet of fire hose, two hand fire pumps, fire buckets, water tanks, and in fact everything for the protection of the vessel and passengers in case of accident of any kind.

Her engine is compound, the cylinders being 24 and 48 inches in diameter, with 38 inches stroke. The steel boiler, known as Dickie's patent, is 16 feet long and 10 feet in diameter, with two fire doors at each end. In the boiler are 498 tubes, 3 inches in diameter and 51 inches long, 126 of which are upright and 372 horizontal. The steam allowed to the boiler is 100 pounds per square inch. Two coal bunkers, on either side of the boiler, hold 130 tons each. In the engine department are two engineers, two oilers and four firemen.

The two masts of the Arago, one forward and the other amidships, are each 100 feet in length.

For hoisting purposes she has a derrick boiler and a double-friction engine. There are two immense hatches through which freight is received and discharged—one forward and another aft of the engine—and a land lubber's look into the huge hole makes him shudder and think that the Arago alone could soon carry away a good-sized coal mine. She is intended to carry 1000 tons of coal on a draught of 12½ feet, but about 900 tons will be the extent to which her capacity will be taxed at present.

Her three water-ballast tanks carry about 350 tons and hold her steady in stiff weather.

Her propeller is 10 feet 10 inches in diameter and is cast with a pitch of 17 feet. On her trial trip at San Francisco, with 78 pounds of steam and 62 revolutions of the wheel, she made 14 miles an hour, but in coming up this trip no attempt was made at good time. Whenever there were any symptoms of journals heating she was slowed down. Engineer Forbes expresses himself as well satisfied with the working of the machinery on the trip, and after the bearings become perfected the steamer, with a full cargo, is expected to easily make 11½ miles an hour. She is licensed to run anywhere between San Diego, Cal., and British Columbia.

Tuesday evening the Arago returned to Empire and yesterday she went to the Umpqua, carrying a large number of guests free, with the intention of returning in the evening, taking her cargo of coal last night and departing for San Francisco to-day.

H. P. Macnevin, superintendent of the Yank Lodge, in Josephine county, became insane a few days ago and died, near Yreka, Cal., while being taken to San Francisco by friends. Ex-Gov. S. F. Chadwick now has charge of the

mine that Macnevin was sent from San Francisco to superintend. Late developments in the mine have been of the most encouraging nature. Macnevin was one of the owners. Specimens of the ore sent to San Francisco for assay yielded over \$400 per ton, and they were not of the best in the mine. The ledge is 240 feet wide and of unknown depth. The thought of owning a large interest in such a valuable property unseated Macnevin's reason and caused his death.

FROM CAPT. ERNST.

At Black Diamond, Seattle, Victoria, Nanaimo—A Bear Hunt—Ex-Coos Bayers—Etc.

To the Editor of the COAST MAIL:

I had a pleasant trip in the steamer Coos Bay from Marshfield to San Francisco, where I remained three days, and then took passage in the steamer Geo. Elder for Seattle, reaching Black Diamond five days later, after a very agreeable trip.

The Black Diamond coal field is advantageously located and the town is built upon a site that is just rolling enough to afford the place excellent drainage.

At present only one stope in the mine is being worked, and from it the output is 300 tons per day. It is the intention to open another stope, in a month or two, about 2½ miles from the one that is now being worked, and thus double the yield of the mine if the demand for coal will justify it.

The town of Black Diamond is steadily improving and by fall it will become quite a place. Already the population is here, but the houses are not, and many dwell in tents. The large hotel is full to overflowing. So far there has been no sickness here.

Black Diamond is situated 31 miles from Seattle, from which place we receive a daily mail by the cars.

Since my arrival here the place has been visited by two excursion parties from Seattle that made things lively while they remained.

In the way of amusements, we are a little short just now, the base-ball club being the sole occupant of the field, but there are some good musicians here and it is probable that they will soon organize a band and enliven the town in their way.

D. J. McLaughlin and myself were out bear hunting the other day. The bears did not find us, but we found a patch of wild strawberries, of which we picked and ate until we became weary of picking, as it took too many of them to make a bushel.

There are many persons here who formerly lived at Coos bay. They are all well and doing as well as could be expected.

Since my arrival here I took a trip to Nanaimo, by way of Victoria—180 miles for \$1 25 cents! How is that for low? We stopped at Victoria over night and witnessed a large anti-Chinese demonstration, consisting of speeches, a torch-light procession and thrilling music by an excellent brass band. The mottoes carried in the procession were expressive and some of them very familiar—for instance: "The Chinese must go," "No yellow slave shall eat our children's bread," "Boycot those that employ Chinese," "Down with the dragon flag," etc. Several of the speeches made were to the point.

Victoria is a pretty place and those in business there seem to be prosperous and contented. Much of the prosperity of the town is due to the extensive travel through it.

At Victoria I met Bob and Gabe Wingate. Bob is a resident of Tacoma, W. T., and is in the enjoyment of excellent health. Gabe lives near Astoria, and at present his health is not good.

I also met W. Urquhart. He is logging at Maple bay, on the British Columbia side, for the Island railway company. For long timbers he receives \$6 per 1000 feet.

As far as I can see and judge, lumbering is about the same all along the coast—dull and wages down. On Puget sound loggers are working for \$30 to \$40 per month, whereas last year they received from \$45 to \$135.

At Nanaimo I met a great many ex-Coos bayers and had a splendid visit, being there on the queen's birthday. Everybody was happy and nothing was left undone that could be done to add to the pleasures of the queen's subjects.

The Haigs, Hirste, Millers, T. Bradley and others whom I saw at Nanaimo were well and as prosperous as could be expected in these hard times. Nanaimo is a lively town.

Seattle, the coming city of the great northwest, is really a pretty place. It may never have another boom as big as the one it had a few years ago, but it will grow steadily.

At Seattle I met Pat Callen, formerly of Coos bay. He is the same Pat, only a little whiter.

Pat Cardiff is near Seattle, running a planter, as usual.

I also met at Seattle Jas. Campbell, a brother of D. D. Campbell of Coos river. He is a fine gentleman and doing a good business in hardware.

Next Monday John Dillon and myself will begin work on a house for B. B. Jones.

Now, I presume everybody wants to know how times are. Well, they are dull; at least that is what everybody says everywhere that I have been—to many men for the work that there is to do. That's what's the matter with the laboring class. As for the capitalists, I do not know what is the matter with them, unless it be that they cannot find anything more to appropriate. I cannot see how we can reasonably hope for better times soon unless that war comes between Russia and England or we can ship up a fight with China, in which latter event we could begin on this coast and rid ourselves of a great deal of surplus labor.
