### Political Gossip.

Chicago, May 31.—A special from Washington says: Appointment Clerk Higgins evidently needs to be watched. Messengers, laborers, and others in the treasury holding subordinate positions, complain that he goes about the corridors drawing his forefinger significantly across his throat, to indicate the process of decapitation, and muttering: "You will have to go." "The republicans must go." He contributes very much toward disturbing the peace of nervous subordinates, and injuring the service by antics of this sort. Higgins has let it be known that he has obtained a list of all clerks who have made any contribution for political purposes, and has indicated that a contribution of that sort is a sufficient test of offensive partisanship to warrant summary removals. He has possibly never heard of section thirteen of the civil service act, which provides: "No officer or employee of the United States mentioned in this act shall discharge, or promote, or degrade, or in any manner change the official rank or compensation of any other officer or employee, or promise or threaten to do so, for giving or withholding, or neglecting to make any contribution of money, or any valuable thing, for any political purpose." If the conduct of Higgins is as quite generally reported in the treasury, it seems pretty clear that by his threats, is violating the act. He should be brought up with a round turn for such grotesque performances as trying to terrorize public servants by parading the treasury corridors, and with his fingers significantly cutting his throat.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Senator Dolph of Oregon said that the subject of the future action of the majority of the senate in relation to nominations was discussed in caucus at different times, but no definite line of policy was adopted. It was found that the republicans differed among themselves, some contending so long as the senate is republican it should do all in its power to keep republicans in office, while others boldly declared the democrats had elected their president and were entitled to the offices. About the nearest approach to any fixed policy was the action in permitting the cases of one or two democrats nominated to succeed republican collectors of revenue, but recently appointed, to go over without action. It seemed to be the view of the majority that republican collectors who were but recently installed ought not to be displaced, but no objection would be made to the removal of collectors who had served several years. It will remain with the senate to fix a policy with regard to nominations next winter.

The visit of Congressman Warner of Ohio, the famous silver man, is another indication of a coming storm. Warner is an aggressive silver man. He does not believe in the policy of suspending coinage. He does not indorse the views of the administration on this subject. It was to Warner that the president's letter on silver was addressed, and radical silver men in the democracy have never been satisfied that Cleveland should have outlined his policy on that subject before he delivered his inaugural. The administration will find itself in sharp antagonism to powerful elements in its party, both on financial and tariff questions. Congressman Mills of Texas is here. He is a blunt, plain, sincere man and an enthusiastic free trader. He believes the democratic party is the party of free trade, and does not propose to bridge his tongue out of any consideration for expediency. He says he has prepared a bill which he will introduce at the next session. It is a free trade bill. He was opposed to the Morrison horizontal bill, and favors no concessions on that subject. Mills is not prepared to speak against the administration, but he evidently will be one of the leaders among southern men against the protective tariff and the national bank policy which it is clear the Cleveland administration will adopt. This declaration of Mills is one of the congressional breakers which are ahead of the administration.

It is pretty well understood in government circles that neither of the New York cabinet officers, Manning and Whitney, desires to stand as a candidate for the nomination for governor of New York. They remember the fate of Folger; but it is now believed in the inner circle of New York politicians that Manning and Whitney have agreed to recommend to the president that the

administration shall support Roswell P. Flower for that place. Flower has not thrown away ambition, even if his name was not mentioned in the presidential nominating convention at Chicago. He was here a few days ago, and had a long interview with the president, Whitney and Manning, and it is common talk here that the primary object of the president's visit to New York was to consult with local leaders as to the advisability of bringing out Flower.

The era of democratic simplicity has not fully returned. The president, in all his movements, evinces a desire to avoid mixing with the common herd, and takes every occasion to shun the people, save when absolutely obliged to meet them. It was announced, for instance, on Thursday, that he would leave for New York at 10 o'clock at night, and a small crowd gathered to see him, but he left at 4 o'clock, and did not travel as other passengers do, in an ordinary car. On the contrary, he, with Secretaries Whitney and Endicott, took a private car, the property of the vice-president of one of the "bloated railway monopolies" democratic orators talk about.

### A Woman Accidentally Shot and Killed by Her Servant Girl.

At Portland, Sunday forenoon, the 31st ult., Mrs. Preston C. Smith was accidentally shot and instantly killed. The Oregonian says Mrs. Smith was at the time sitting in a low rocking chair in her bedroom, about midway between the foot of her bed and the grate at the other side of the room, with her youngest child, about 18 months old, on her lap. Her maid, Walburg Berg, came into the room and began to make up the bed. The baby sat laughing and crowing in its mother's lap and reaching out its little arms to attract the attention of "Wally," as the girl is called. She stopped to notice the little one and whistled to it, and the mother was trying to get it to imitate the whistle. This pretty playing went on for a few moments and Mrs. Smith was preparing to nurse the child, when "Wally" took up a pistol, which is always kept under the pillow of the bed, and started to place it on the mantel over the grate where it would be safe while she made the bed. In passing the foot of the bed the pistol accidentally struck against the foot rail of the bedstead and was discharged, the bullet passing through Wally's left hand and entering Mrs. Smith's head just back of and a little below her ear. Her head fell back on her chair and the girl, supposing she had fainted, ran down to the kitchen and told the cook to send for a doctor, and taking a glass of water ran back up to assist her mistress. As soon as she entered the room she saw that Mrs. Smith was dead, the child still clasped to her breast. A physician was summoned and the house was soon thronged with sad and horror-stricken friends, but naught could be done except to grieve and to prepare the body for burial. The unfortunate girl who had been the innocent cause of the sad accident was almost frantic with grief, and apparently unmindful of the painful wound in her hand, was moaning and crying as if her heart would break. She could not explain just how she was standing when the pistol went off. She could only repeat: "We were playing with the baby and I was whistling to it and my mother was trying to get it to whistle, when the pistol struck against the bedstead," and then her tears would break out afresh. Mrs. Smith's eldest child, a boy about 4 years old, startled by the pistol shot, came into the room and pulled at his mother's dress, trying to get her to speak to him, but in vain. The pistol, which is a 32-caliber revolver, has been kept under the pillow every night since the late series of burglaries around town was commenced, and the girl has always taken it out and placed it on the mantel while making the bed, and so had become used to handling it. Smith was away from home at the time, having started at 9 o'clock to drive down to his farm on Sauvie's island. A messenger was at once dispatched to carry the sad news to him. He is a son of the late Joseph S. Smith. Mrs. Smith was a native of Huntsville, Alabama, where she was married to Smith some five or six years ago. Her maiden name was Jessie Williamson.

A labor disturbance took place at Pottsville, Pa., on the 21st inst., which for a time threatened serious trouble. About 200 Italian and Hungarian laborers on the Reading and Pottsville railroad, who had struck for an advance of 15 cents a day in wages, marched into Pottsville and went to a place where a large force of their countrymen were laying track and attempted to stop the work. Officers interfered to protect the workmen, the rioters resisted, many were arrested, and bloodshed seemed inevitable for a time, but the strikers finally scattered, with threats of renewing the demonstration. These are some of the men imported under the cheap contract system, who have become tired of working for almost nothing and finding themselves.

Josie Pear, a Chinaman, called at the White house the other day and sought an interview with President Cleveland, who declined to meet the almond-eyed monster. On the curd the Chinaman sent in he said: "I like to see about Chinese fellows entered this country. All should be citizenship. That's what I want to talk to you about, and if necessary will by your servant to China to tell Chinese what you want." After the president returned Josie's card, he left in high-dudgeon, threatening to write Cleveland a letter.

The use of artificial teeth is not so modern as is generally believed. In the museum of Genoa, on the coast of Italy, there are two curious specimens

of artificial teeth found in Etruscan tombs probably dating to four or five centuries before our era. These graves contained the bodies of two young girls. On the jaw of one is still to be seen two incisors fixed to their neighbors by small gold rings; in the other, the rings remained, but the artificial teeth had fallen out. The teeth, carefully cut, had evidently been taken from the mouth of some large animal. The dentist's art among the ancients was not confined to drawing teeth and replacing them by artificial ones, for natural teeth have been found which have evidently been treated in various ways.

### Habits of Crabs and Lobsters.

A few evenings since Professor Bickmore delivered a very interesting lecture at the American museum of natural history on the habits of crabs and lobsters. The appendages of the lobster were remarked upon as peculiarly adapted to its natural wants. The two claws or pincers differ the one from the other, a fact which always gives them an ungainly appearance. One of the claws has a series of grinders, and is used as a mill to crush shell fish and other hard substances, while that on the opposite side is provided with a sharp edge, which is used for cutting. The lobster propels itself by means of thin plates attached to the body, which it uses as oars. Its eggs are attached to and carried about on the under side of the body, and to protect them from rocky bottoms the tail of the animal is doubled up under it, completely covering them. The crab is a higher order of animal than the lobster, the professor said, and he described a number of different classes of the species. The fiddler crab was so called from the peculiar shape and motion of its claws. It has a set of grinding teeth in the anterior portion of its stomach, and a grinding movement is kept up almost continuously. The eye of the crab was very peculiar, consisting of a series of tubes bound together, each tube representing a single eye. He sees singly by combining the images in his mind after the manner of a mosaic. The long feelers of the crab are designed for reaching into crevices of the rocks after its prey. The giant of all crabs is found in the bay of Yeddo. Its legs are 11 feet long, and it scarcely has body enough to hold them together. The hermit is a queer sort of animal, which takes up its habitation in shells vacated by other animals. If a hermit crab was placed in a tub of water with several shells, it would examine them all, and then select that best adapted to its comfort. If two or three crabs were put among the shells, they would often fight for the best shell. The hermit often traveled alone in conjunction with a polyp as a means of protection from the octopus. The polyp did the fighting, while the hermit carried him about and collected food for both.

A crab and a cocoon were held up by the professor before his audience. The crab, he said, was a palm crab, and lived in cocoon groves. It tears off the husk with its claws, hammers through the shell, and then lifts out the meat in chunks with its pincers. The palm crab has a special breathing apparatus which enables it to breathe out of water. The most peculiar of all the crabs was a certain species which lives in the mountains. The animals keep well out of the way during the daytime, but they are fond of making moonlight excursions in little groups to wet their gills in water. They are not infrequently ston at vegetable gardens in their marches, and the damage they do makes the farmers their enemies. The barnacle was said to be the same general species as the lobster and the crab.
