We denounce the democratic legislature for its treachery to its pledge on the subject of contract law, and its incompetency and extravagance in the management of the penitentiary. We denounce the present democratic assembly for its extravagance and wanton disregard of the true interests and good name of our state.

The republicans of Ohio, in convention assembled, tender to Gen. Ulysses S. Grant their warm sympathy in this time of his great suffering, and assure him of their great faith and love for him, and earnestly hope that he may be restored to health, and be blessed with many days among his grateful countrymen.

For governor Judge Jos. B. Foraker was nominated, on the first ballot, after the adoption of the platform, by a vote of 4692, and the nomination was made unanimous. The nominations of Gen. Robert P. Kennedy for lieutenant governor, Judge George W. McIlvane for supreme judge, and John C. Brown of Jefferson for treasurer, were by acclamation. J. A. Kohler of Summit was nominated for attorney general, and Wells S. Jones of Pike for board of public works.
