Terrestrial Globes.

As an evidence of the progress being made in some of our Coos county schools, we note the fact that Golden, of the Marshfield drug store, has just purchased two handsome terrestrial globes for their use. This globe is for the school at the forks of Coos river.

The other globe is full mounted, with both meridian circles and ecliptic, which, in addition to the above, will show how the length of the day and night varies at different seasons, the lengthened twilight of summer, what constellation of the zodiac the earth is in for each month of the year, and many other things so difficult for the youthful mind to comprehend. This globe is for the Haynes slough school, taught by Miss Lottie Vandenberg.

The Oregonian is in receipt of a communication from Geo. Tiddlers, of Suvver's station, giving his observations on the cause of rust on wheat. He writes that he discovered a few days ago, by aid of a microscope, minute bugs on all the affected wheat, commonly called cabbage lice. In the night they work on the wheat, sucking the sap out of the leaves and stems. During the day, particularly when the sun shines, they cluster under the shadiest parts of the leaves or stems. The rust appears during the day on the parts which they sucked during the night.

According to what old settlers say, there is a bigger business being carried on in shittim bark in this county to-day than ever before, and some predict that the demand this year will exhaust the supply in this locality and that hereafter there will be a stringency hereabouts. John Dully of Sumner is the shittim king of Coos county just now. He has an unlimited order from San Francisco for the bark and is buying all that he can get, paying \$55 per ton for it in the woods and \$65 per ton delivered at Sumner.

The city election at Portland on the 15th inst. resulted in a republican triumph. John Gates was chosen mayor, over S. Pennoyer, by 150 majority. J. J. Gallagher, in the First ward, was the only councilman the democrats elected. He had 241 majority over Henry McCracken. In the Second ward S. Farrell beat John Donnerberg 281, and in the Third ward Frank Hachney was 488 ahead of Eli Morrill.

Denis Kearney announces his intention to run for governor of California next year on a workmen's ticket. The chief plank in his platform will be that municipalities have the right to regulate the workmen's hours of labor. He says he will make a six-months campaign, and adds: "It will be the most magnificent campaign ever witnessed in California, and I will be elected too."

The New York World is growing wonderfully kind to Jas. G. Blaine. It now accuses him of behaving himself and being stronger in the republican party than at any former period of his career. Of this there can be no doubt; but the mugwumps are yet to hear from. After they repent and return to the republican fold Blaine will be invincible.

Thoroughbred Poultry.

Elmer Dixon of Oregon City writes as follows in the Oregonian:

My experience for the past ten years fully satisfies me that the high-bred fowl is the fowl for all purposes. And what intelligent person would not discard the so-called old-fashioned or mongrel breed for pure-bred fowls that it has taken years of the most careful breeding of some of the most intelligent and competent men of both continents to bring to their now high standard of excellence. If all could take their choice at the same price I dare say they would not be long in making a selection and it would be in favor of the high-bred fowl. There are many of our western farmers who are not yet acquainted with the merits of pure-bred poultry, but still cling to the mongrels. To any one who has had experience with both kinds the difference is quite apparent, the ratio being the same as with thoroughbred cattle and scrubs. The real mongrels are so small in size that it does not pay to raise them for market, and for egg production they are but little better, for they lay but few eggs, and those mostly during the spring months when eggs are cheap. If you chance to find a large, well formed mongrel you may be sure it is the result of crossing to some pure-bred variety. If, then, a few crosses so vastly improve the stock, the pure-bred fowls themselves must necessarily be far superior to the mongrels, both in point of size and egg production.

There are a great many people among us who are always sighing for the old-fashioned breed of fowls—those with big bodies and short legs, non-scratchers and everlasting layers; oblivious of the fact that if the same motherly old hens that live so pleasantly in their memories were suddenly resurrected they would cut a sorry figure by the side of our modern Brahmas, Plymouth Rocks, etc. It is a very general and very harmless delusion that the sun shone brighter and the grass grew a richer green when we were boys. But when we talk of past glories of domestic stock we are confronted by the stern and undeniable fact that there has been constant and steady improvement in their useful as well as their ornamental qualities, and among the modern breeds and varieties now kept by fanciers are fowls that will outweigh, outlay, and outshine anything produced in the day of Auld Lang Syne.

It is ridiculous for people to be so slow to acknowledge that there is any difference between one kind of fowls and another. They may say a chicken is a chicken, whether it weighs two pounds at maturity or ten pounds; whether it is tender and juicy or tough, dry and stringy; and an egg is an egg, whether large or small, delicate in flavor or tough and rank. But every one who has had the opportunity for observation will acknowledge the superiority of good south-down mutton over a mongrel carcass. And to which is the preference to be given, a short-horn bullock, or a steer the offspring of a hundred generations of mongrel stock? Almost any farmer of ordinary intelligence will answer the above and tell you how much more profitable for every purpose is the thoroughbred stock over the native. Because a mongrel chicken was good enough for you, stage coaches were good enough for the present generation, surely we do not refuse the benefits conferred by steam and electricity simply because our ancestors had no such blessings. You are not satisfied to breed horses that can trot a mile in three and a half minutes, because that was the highest speed attained in your grandfathers' time, and why not carry similar ideas of improvement into the poultry yard. As fondly as some may hug the delusion they cannot resist the force of testimony to the fact that our modern fowls show the result of persistent effort toward improvement as much as the present breeds of cattle, sheep or swine.

An Iowa Cyclone.

LE MARS, Iowa, June 17.—The effects of the storm which passed over Plymouth county recently are just becoming known. The killed were William Gobsche and Nicholas Mackel. A child belonging to a Holland family, new-comers of unpronounceable name, was killed, another had its leg broken, and nearly every one of a large family received some kind of an injury. D. E. Hayes was badly hurt in the head. Adam Goetsche is hurt in the spine and internally; Mrs. August Muecke had a leg terribly lacerated, and her daughters Mary and Lizzie are injured internally, and the former has an arm broken; and the mother and aunt of D. E. Hayes had their collar-bones broken. A young man named Swain took refuge from the storm in the house of Cramer, and was seriously injured, as also was Mrs. Cramer. Mrs. Silas Forbes was carried off in her house, while the rest of the family remained safe in the cellar, where she had been, but remembering her sick dog up stairs she went back after it, and was carried away with the house, and severely hurt—but she saved the dog. Nicholas Goddard had an arm broken, and was otherwise injured. There were many miraculous escapes from death and injury. There was a good deal of stock killed; chickens were slain by hundreds, while half beat the growing crops into the ground in various parts of the country. The injury to orchards and grapes is something the country cannot recover from in years. Mrs. W. Gans and child of Marcus, Cherokee county, were killed, and Gans was badly hurt. In Cherokee county, as in Plymouth, there were many exaggerated statements of death and injury, but when hunted down they had no foundation, except in the imagination of persons frightened by the storm. The wonder is that there were

not more killed and wounded. Over 900 claims for damages have already been filed with insurance agents in Le Mars alone, and it is thought the number will reach 1000 in the county. It falls heavily upon several state companies.
