The Facts in the South.

Our democratic friends are all the time insisting that the question of southern election outrages is a dead issue, but the indignant protests they are making against Senator Sherman's attack on the fraud business indicate that it is a tender subject with democracy. The attempt to take attention from the facts by accusing Senator Sherman of bloody-shirt tactics will not succeed. The Science and Art of Milking. One hundred days will probably be required to make the passage, as the new steamer will not be crowded, but will steam along very leisurely and probably touch at a number of stations both on the Atlantic and Pacific sides of the South American continent.
