He brought back with him some of the seed from the hedge cactus and also an Oseage orange, which seed he will distribute in his neighborhood.

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How He Killed Sea Otter.

The other day a tall, roughly-dressed man stood looking at a lot of new-fangled work-stands made of Chinese bamboo hats, supported on a tripod of three bamboo sticks, which ornament a window in Portland. He was chuckling softly to himself, and a reporter stopped and inquired what he saw to please him:

"I was just looking at them things," said he, "and do you know what they look like? They put me in mind of the concerns I made over on the coast to sit in to shoot sea otters."

"Great Caesar," said the reporter, "did you ever shoot a sea otter?" "Yes, dozens of them," was the reply. "I sold the skins from which was made an overcoat for Louis McLane, of San Francisco, and they were beautiful, and the overcoat was the most expensive one ever made in this country, I guess, but it was so warm he could not wear it."

"But did you shoot them from a thing like these work baskets?" "Well, you see the sea otter is very shy and don't come very close in shore, so I used to take three long, slim poles, put a withe around them near the top and carry them away down to low-water mark and set them up, putting the butts well apart, and then I would put a sack of hay in the crotch at the top and sit up there till the tide came in and the sea otters would come swimming along within shot."

"But would not the surf wash down your whatever-you-call-it and spill you into the sea?" asked the reporter. "Not very often. You see the water couldn't get much hold on the sticks, but once in a while the sand would wash out from under one of them and I would get a ducking, but I did not mind that, when I could see a chance to get an otter with \$100 worth of fur on him. But I have given up the business now; otters are too scarce, and I have a little farm near Neah bay."

How the Chinese May Be Made to Go. The following paragraphs from the Astorian, concerning the anti-Chinese agitation, show how it may be possible to make the Chinese go:

The freeze-out game is the best one to practice with Chinamen. By declining to give them employment, as much and as far as possible, they can be made to go, and in no other way, as matters are at present.

Business of all kinds is reported looking up and money is plentier than it was two months ago. There are not as many idle men in Astoria as at the close of the fishing season. Any place that a Chinaman can be crowded out of and a white man or woman put into is a direct benefit to the community.

There is a steady, quiet movement on foot all over the coast to get rid of the Chinese. Every well-meaning man can aid in this. But those who talk "agitation," who chew soap and froth at the mouth and want to start violent measures, are the very worst enemies to this steady, quiet effort that is being made to get rid of the Chinese. Some of these blow-hards never did an honest day's work in their lives, and the worst they are now trying to do is not honest.

Egg Eating. Egg eating is a bad habit to which hens are frequently addicted and the habit is generally acquired on account of our own negligence, or perhaps, false economy. The shells contain lime and hence are eagerly sought after and eaten by the fowls when thrown out. Hens that are confined to very small quarters, or those that are by reason of bad weather confined to their coops, want a variety of food. From the look of the shells as generally fed to them and the egg in the nest they see a resemblance that leads to a trial on the whole egg. This can be and should be avoided by pulverizing the shells before feeding them. It is very little trouble, and it is much trouble to break the habit when once formed. One hen will teach the habit to a dozen others. Sometimes it is found impossible to stop them except by cutting their heads off. At other times they may be stopped by penning on new grounds, changing feed and otherwise attracting the attention away from the habit entirely. It is always easier to prevent the habit than to break it up when once formed.—[Journal of Agriculture.]

John Emerson was drowned at Upper Astoria recently under peculiar circumstances, says the Astorian. He was standing with three or four other men on the dock of the Fishermen's Packing company's premises, when some one called to him that his boat was loose. The boat was only a few yards from shore and the wind was setting it in. There were other boats close by, in any one of which could have been apparently used, but he ran to the side of the dock and made a jump, intending to light in his boat and bring it ashore. He missed the boat and fell in the water. He rose and shouted for help, but before assistance could reach him he was drowned. He leaves a wife and two children. Two brothers live in the vicinity of his place near Alderbrook. He was about 35 years of age.
