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The President's Message.

The president's message is quite a long document. A great deal of space is taken up with statements that relate to the general and ordinary business of the government. Upon these subjects the reader will not dwell. Attention will be concentrated on those subjects whose treatment will indicate the general policy of the administration.

The president recommends revision of the tariff laws, not only in their administrative features but in their schedules. The inequalities of the tariff laws, he says, are a source of great inconvenience to the people. He recommends that the tariff laws be revised so as to be more uniform and to be more in accordance with the principles of justice and equity.

There is no recommendation for sweeping repeal of the internal revenue, but it is suggested that removal of the tax upon tobacco "would relieve an important agricultural product from a burden which was imposed only because the revenues from customs duties were insufficient for the public need," and the suggestion is made, with some apparent hesitancy, of removal of the tax on spirits.

The message starts inquiry upon a great many other subjects of national importance. These subjects will be under discussion, more or less, during the whole of the long session of congress.

Secretary Windom devotes considerable space to the deplorable condition of our merchant marine, and makes some of the recommendations contained in the president's message. He says: "Our farmers and mechanics are practically excluded from the markets of the world, except as they may be reached by circuitous routes prescribed for their own advantage and convenience by our great competitors in these markets. Overwhelming public sentiment demands that this humiliation and loss shall cease. If our industrial interests are to prosper, if our commerce is to be sustained, extended and increased, we must cease to be dependent upon any other nation or people for access to foreign markets. American vessels running between San Francisco and Asiatic ports and receiving a mail compensation of only \$14,446 a year, have to compete with subsidized ships of other countries, and especially with the subsidized ships of Great Britain, which recently established a line between Liverpool and San Francisco, and which has been aided to the extent of \$165,548,000.

During the last fiscal year we paid to foreign steamers for carrying our mails \$390,583, and to our own steamers only \$109,828.

The ordinary revenues of the government for the year ending June 30 were \$387,050,059; expenditures \$109,053,313.

Silcott, cashier of the office of the sergeant-at-arms of the house at Washington, has departed with \$75,000 shortage. The dispatches say: "The democrats were cast in a cave of gloom by the discovery of the defalcation of Cashier Silcott. He was a democratic appointee maintained under the democratic control of the house, at a time when the stump speakers of that party were crying: 'Turn the rascals out!' Every member on the democratic side looked as if he was the chief mourner at a funeral. The republicans were not particularly hilarious, as nearly every one of them were caught for from \$300 to \$400, but they were glad to know that it was not one of their officials that had robbed them. The democrats not only lost their money, but one of their favored men had covered them with disgrace. No member on the democratic side seemed to smile after the statement of the defalcation had been read."

The dispatches give an account of the sums lost by various congressmen, and say:

"Binger Hermann, of Oregon, fared even worse. He has not drawn any salary since May, and had about \$2800 coming to him. He expects, of course, to get the money, but he wants it now, and he has no way of getting it until some action is taken by the house."
