There is no doubt of the election of D. P. Thompson as governor of the state of Oregon, and the whole state ticket will go in with him.

"Sawmill" Penoyer believes in the eight-hour system for political purposes but not for sawmill purposes. He adopts it for his political platform, but does not use it in his mill. He also denounces trusts as unwholesome and unjust, but evidently thinks the Portland lumber trust is a good thing; for he stands in to crush out striking carpenters. The lumber trust is a bad thing in politics, but a good thing for Penoyer's sawmill, and that is the kind of a man Sylvester is.

"Never in the history of Oregon has the republican party been so well organized and harmonious as it is this year," said a prominent republican yesterday. "The great general power of organizing and control is the state central committee. Then came the county central committee and lastly the precinct committees. I will bet my hat against a yellow dog and kill the dog if I don't win that the state central committee knows to-day just how nearly every republican stands in relation to the ticket. I understand that not to exceed fifty bolters have been found in the entire state."—Oregonian.

Arrangements are constantly being brought into shape for a schedule of meetings throughout the state during the campaign. Some of the speakers named and written to have responded, but there others yet to hear from. It is not possible for a man to get up and leave his business on a moment's notice. No schedule therefore has yet been prepared, but will be ready in a few days. The committee propose to make a very active, thorough and vigorous campaign, going with able speakers into every county and almost every precinct in the state. They are confident that all that is necessary is to bring the issues squarely before the people, to secure a rousing majority for the ticket. The opening gun under the auspices of the committee will probably be fired by a monster demonstration, to come off about the 8th of May, in Portland.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—After the adjournment of the house this afternoon the republican members assembled in conference to decide upon party policy in reference to the tariff bill.

It is apparently the intention of the republican majority to force through the McKinley tariff bill. The caucus to-day demonstrated that the bill must take precedence of everything else, and a vote is fixed at an early day in order to get action before more protests can be forwarded. The bill will, of course, be amended so much that it will be defeated. There is a possibility that the sugar men will force a restoration of the duty. They now have a strong lobby actively at work upon the members, and every possible string is being pulled to carry it through. Amendments to the wool schedules will be offered, and it is possible that the rates will be slightly reduced.

The Philadelphia Record says that a corn-starch trust has been formed. The capital is fixed at \$10,000,000, and 19 factories are in it. According to the Record, the trust owes its life to the duties on corn-starch and the ingredients of which it is composed. There is a duty of 2 cents a pound on imported starch, which the McKinley bill does not change. But the McKinley bill increases the duties on "dextrine, brunt, starch, gum substitutes or British gum" from 30 to 60 per cent. This increase of duty was made, according to the Record, for the benefit of the corn-starch trust. One is by home competition, the other by letting the article the trust deals in free, and thus handing the industry over to foreign nations. The free-traders prefer the latter plan, protectionists the former. Unless there is a secret method of manufacture, home competition will prevent an excessive rise in prices. Home competition will not accomplish its object in a year, but it is pretty sure to in time. But if an industry is handed over to foreign countries it will take a long time to get it back. One method is, however, to crush trusts by the passage of proper laws.

The Labor Movement.

The labor movement has made the most extensive manifestation of modern times. It is not confined to this country but seems to exhibit a unity of organization which is world wide. Chicago seems to take the lead. On the 1st of May, in that city, the number of strikers was great. The dispatches of May 2d say, "every man, boy and girl employed in the malleable iron works on Twenty-sixth and Rockwell streets is out. The total number of employees is 1200. No particular reason was assigned by the men for quitting work. A committee was appointed last night to wait upon officials, but they seemed disinclined to go before their employers. President Bailey called the strikers about him and upbraided them for going out without notice, and told them that when they found out what they wanted to let him know their demands. The men seemed not to know what to say in reply. The chairman of the moulder's committee says they want 10 hours as a day's work, 15 cents advance in wages and 50 per cent. extra for overtime."

"At the Wells-French Car Company's shops every one of the 1000 employees went out, and the shops were closed. The blacksmiths are the only ones who make known their demand, which was for eight hours as a day's work."

"The entire number of the employees of N. K. Fairbanks & Co., will go out Monday. This was a surprise, as the men employed by Fairbanks are receiving better wages than those paid elsewhere. They want eight hours' work and nine hours' pay. About 600 men will strike."

The coopers also quit, and the sash, door and blind men walked out, without giving any explanation. They number about 4000.

"A strike of the miners throughout Northern and Middle Illinois fields was decided upon after to-night. A joint conference of the miners and operators split up on the question of including day laborers in a scheme of profit-sharing, the owners declaring there was no margin for laborers. An executive session by the workingmen's representatives followed the final adjournment of the joint conference. The decision to strike was the result. Indiana miners and operators also failed to reach an understanding, and a strike is not improbable."

Some dispatches from other parts of the country show the movement to be widespread. In San Francisco, May 2d, dispatches say:

"The carpenters and joiners, numbering 1200, and mill workers, 750, struck to-day for eight hours. The carpenters claim that less than fifty carpenters served notice of a strike on their employers six weeks ago. The employers refused the demands and the men decided to submit, and went to work this morning, but at noon they changed their minds and struck. They sent a delegation to the carpenters to-night, asking their support, which was refused before August 1st on the ground that the mill had contracts on hand made on the basis of nine hours a day which must be filled before the mill workers should receive a reduction in hours. The mill owners held a meeting to-night and decided to make a resolute stand against eight hours until the mills out of town also reduced the time. The machinists' strikers and bench carpenters are also on a strike."

LOUISVILLE, May 2.—Of the 1200 carpenters in this city between 900 and 1000 struck to-day for eight hours and 25 cents an hour as minimum wages.

Boston, May 2.—The strike of the carpenters is proceeding quietly. There are 1700 men out, and only about twenty at work. Some of these will quit work to-morrow.

ALBANY, Or., May 2.—At the session of the Oregon conference of the Evangelical church a row occurred this morning which resulted in the division of that body into two opposing factions.

At 9:30 suspended Bishop Bowman and his followers attempted to open the conference. The opposing ministers, who are in the majority, resisted, and a physical encounter ensued, both sides endeavoring to gain the presiding officer's chair. Exciting scenes ensued. Threats of arrest were made, and Bishop Bowman declared some half a dozen ministers suspended for opposing his followers. Finally the anti-Bowman faction withdrew, with the books and funds of the treasury, to the M. E. Church South, and held a conference of their own, electing J. Bowersox chairman. The other faction, presided over by Bowman, remained in the Evangelical church, where a session was held.

Each claims to be the Oregon conference and calls the others seceders. The Bowman faction this afternoon adopted a resolution asking the others to return and join them. This is announced will be refused, and the fight will be carried to the bitter end. It will result in a lawsuit for the possession of the church property.

WASHINGTON, I.—A joint meeting of the house and senate committees on immigration was held to-day. Representative Owen, chairman of the house committee, investigated the subject at New York, made a statement.

The inspection of immigration at Castle Garden he pronounced a farce, and said that immigrants were fleeced by boarding-house sharpers. The observation of immigrant officials is that the undesirable element is increasing. Italians are coming in hordes, without money, without clothes, except what they wear or carry in bags. Owen said that Italian bankers in this country send agents to Italy to solicit natives of that country to come to America. These agents scindole Italians, charging them as high as \$80 for a ticket from Naples to New York, the price of which is \$26. Arriving at New York they go to boarding-houses kept and controlled by these Italian bankers, and thence are sent out to labor under contracts made by the bankers or padrones with their employers. If their pay is fixed at \$1.25 a day, the padrones take 25 cents. Besides, he furnishes a shanty in which the men live while at work, and has a man in charge of that. Italians are timid and suspicious, so it is impossible for Americans to get at them. Within the past eight years they have almost entirely supplanted other races in the ranks of unskilled labor in New York City.
