A correspondent of the Real Estate Review of Portland, has the following to say of this section:

"Having seen several articles in the papers lately regarding Southwestern Oregon in general, and Coos Bay in particular, I notice that the articles all appear to have been written by persons who examined the country in behalf of some one particular line of business, entirely overlooking all other resources, thereby doing us a great injustice by leading people to think that the industries referred to are the only ones of great enough extent or value to deserve investigation; while the facts are that we have many other resources that will prove as great, if not greater, value as the coal and lumber."

As stated in one of the articles referred to, the principal reason why our section of country is not better known to the public is the fact that at present we have no R. R. connection with the rest of the world, people now having to come here by stage or steamer, both of which modes of conveyance are much too slow for this progressive age. But we now rejoice in the fact that we have the surveys made and the entire subsidies raised for the building of two lines of road to an Eastern connection—one running through the county to the south east of us and the other opening up the country to the north and east; while in addition to the above mentioned roads, the Southern Pacific System will have their engineers in the field in less than thirty days to survey a road from the main line to deep water harbor on Coos Bay, as they fully realize the importance of the trade of this section as soon as it shall become known to the public and an entrance given them.

The competition of the rail roads will open the markets of the world to our products, coal and timber being the only ones that have received any attention from the outside capitalist, and no attention seems to have been given to our farming, fruit and stock raising, ship building, tanneries, etc., any one of which is enough to make the country rich. Our coal mines, though worked for years, have never been thoroughly explored, only one mine being worked at present, with an out-put of some 8000 tons per month. We are now, however, to have a thorough exploration made of the fields by the Glasgow Coal and Lumber Company, a company having a capital of over \$1,000,000, who are now putting in diamond drills to ascertain the full extent of the rich fields known to underlie the veins already exposed. The company have several thousand acres of land, the best location on the bay for a city, the land sloping gently back from their two miles of water front, with 30 feet of water. This company is doing more for the development of our section than has ever before been done by anyone, and our people should give them every assistance in their power, for it is such people, who put in improvements and bring in settlers that we want, not a lot of real estate "boomers."

Situated as we are, about half way between San Francisco and Portland, possessing the largest and most accessible harbor—the only one which can be entered with safety during all kinds of weather—having tributaries to us over 10,000 square miles of territory, and upon the completion of the railroads now under survey and for which the entire subsidy has been raised, we will have 25,000 square miles of the richest farming and grazing lands added to our present magnificent territory, with a climate possessing the advantages of both Oregon and California, without the extremes of either, with the greatest variety and extent of fine woods, myrtle, maple, oak, alder, pine, fir, and the famous "Port Orford" cedar, found nowhere else in the United States, and many other resources. We offer to the stock raiser, the fruit raiser, the farmer, the ship-builder, the gold, iron, copper, or coal miner, the manufacturer, the home seeker, and last but not least, the health seeker, inducements not to be found in any other section of country in the United States, and we will show every courtesy to all who will come and examine our resources, and will gladly give all the information and assistance in our power to those who cannot come in person, but who will take the trouble to inquire."

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Representative Hermann made some very effective observations at the close of the debate on the river and harbor bill. He congratulated congress on the passage of the most satisfactory bill that had ever passed congress. He said that while this would be welcome tidings to the people of the great lakes on the North, the Gulf on the South and the large and smaller rivers of the Atlantic side, it would be more heartily welcomed by the expectant people of the Pacific Northwest. He said it was appropriate at this stage of a bill in which the water-ways of his own state had been so loyally remembered to read to the house a statement he had just received from Major Handbury, from Portland, Or., which announced that the recent soundings of the Columbia river bar disclosed a depth of 25 1/2 feet at mean low water and he said this was already a great triumph and a most conclusive argument in favor of the river and harbor bill of the government. He referred to the benefits which could be expected for the Cascade locks by liberal appro-

pritions, as well as for other portions of the state, and he expressed the hope that congress would at an early date take favorable action on the great railway project of the Columbia, which he said would open up a continuous navigation of 1000 miles, practically from the Rocky mountains to the sea. The Oregon items were all passed as reported from the committee, and no member is more jubilant than Representative Hermann over the result.
