RAILROAD MEETING!

\$37,660 Subscribed!

THE ROSEBURG ROAD WILL BE BUILT!

An Enthusiastic Meeting!

A meeting was held in Odd Fellows' hall last night in regard to the Roseburg & Coos Bay Railroad. About 300 people were present.

The meeting was called to order by A. M. Crawford, and J. W. Bennett was selected as chairman. The chairman stated the object of the meeting in a brief address and then introduced A. M. Crawford, who explained the result of his trip to San Francisco along with T. R. Sheridan, of Roseburg, in regard to getting capitalists to take hold of the building of the Roseburg & Coos Bay Railroad. He stated that certain capitalists had agreed to enter into an agreement to build the road to Myrtle Point by January 1st next, and to Roseburg by Dec. 31, 1891, if the people of Coos and Douglas would raise a bonus of \$150,000. He also stated that Douglas county had raised her share of the bonus, and all that was necessary for to have work commenced inside of the next thirty days was for Coos county to raise her share—\$75,000.

Major Miller, of California, a gentleman of considerable experience in railroad building, was then introduced, and he made a few remarks in regard to the necessity of a railroad to the valley.

J. W. Bennett was called upon and set forth the benefits that would accrue to this section of Oregon if a railroad from Coos bay to Roseburg was built, and asked all those who thought they would be benefited by such a road to subscribe what they could afford.
