Grant's Pass, Roseburg and Ashland are about a half-off so far as population is concerned. Each cast about 600 votes at the recent election. The Pass has reason to exult in having so soon outstripped her older rivals.

The secretary of the navy has directed the award of the contract for and \$150-ton armored cruiser to Cramp & Sons, of Philadelphia, at the bid of \$2,985,000 and the contract for 3500-ton cruisers No. 6 to the Union Iron Works, of San Francisco, at the departments plans and specifications on a bid of \$1,796,000.

The president has transmitted to congress a communication from the secretary of the interior relating to the destruction, by fire, of the timber lands of the United States. The president expressed the opinion that if proper penalties were imposed by law and a few convictions secured, much waste of forests would be prevented.

From all accounts the run of salmon in the Columbia continues to be very large. As a fisherman said the other day, "There never was such a run of salmon as there is this year. Large numbers are being caught, but there is no market for them." The canneries down the river are taking a limited number at 75 cents each, and outside this there is practically no market for the fish. The union has played hob this season and has probably done for itself. This seems to be an off year for unions and strikes.—(Oregonian.)

The award of the contract for the construction of the \$100-ton armored cruiser was one of the questions considered at last Friday's cabinet meeting. There are but two competitors, the Union Iron Works, of San Francisco, and Cramp & Co., of Philadelphia, and each is working hard to secure the contract. The Union Iron Works made the lowest bid on the plans prepared by the navy department, while Cramp made the lowest bid for a ship under modified department plans. Secretary Tracy said the matter will be settled in a few days, but declined to commit himself further. Naval officers conversant with the matter are inclined to believe the chances favor the Union Iron Works.

The vote thrown in Oregon two weeks ago seems to have been a little over 71,000. The gain is about 10,000 in two years, a larger gain than ever before known in that length of time. It is well-known also, that the full vote of the state was not cast in the recent election. In some of the counties voters have settled at great distances from the polling places, and did not appear at the polls, in Portland and several other places the whole vote could not be cast within the hours allotted, and the polls were closed while voters in large numbers were still in line. Had the number of polling places throughout the state been properly increased, fully 5000 more votes would have been thrown. All, however, will appear on the census rolls.—(Oregonian.)

St. Petersburg, June 12.—The Government has received information that a new movement against the life of the czar is contemplated. The palace and all approaches have been doubled. A number of arrests have been made of persons who are suspected of being connected with the movement.

Paris, June 12.—(General Sierakoff, special agent of the Russian police, has arrived in Paris for the purpose of obtaining information concerning the nihilists who were recently arrested here. He expressed himself as being confident that the prisoners were connected with the most atrocious and dangerous conspiracy against the life of the czar, and the institutions of the Russian Government that nihilism had yet organized. He had positive information that the French contingent of nihilism was in collusion with those in Russia and Switzerland, to murder the czar and precipitate simultaneous outbreaks in different political centers.

A Washington dispatch of June 15th says: "The senate committee on commerce, which has been handling the river and harbor bill for a little less than two weeks, will likely report it to the senate by the middle of next week. Senator Fry says he expects to have it ready on Wednesday. By refusing to give hearings to any but senators and members of the house and ex-senators and ex-members, the committee has simplified its work very materially and has hastened completion of the bill by several weeks. The bill, as it came from the house, appropriated \$20,000,000. Increases thus far made by the senate committee, aggregate about \$4,000,000, other increases will be offered in the senate and urged there, and it is likely the bill will go in to conference with the aggregate of \$25,000,000 or very little less. It is currently reported at the capital that the speaker of the house has said that he will not allow the bill to go through unless it is scaled down 25 per cent. from the amount appropriated by the house bill; that is, unless the aggregate appropriation is reduced to about \$18,750,000. This means that the bill will be in conference for a long time, probably a month. Reed can instruct the conferees at the time of their appointment, if they are willing to take instructions from him. Fry, chairman of the committee on commerce, will make an effort to have the bill taken up and disposed of before the tariff debate begins, so that the long conference will have a chance to be concluded."

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the county court of Coos county, Oregon, for the building of two bridges, one across the North fork of the Coquille River, at the Indian place, or near where the bridge built by J. H. Smith, and said bridge to be built in a workmanlike manner, and as the bridge that was carried away from said place by high water is below, on and after the 15th day of July, 1890, and as some of the lumber and iron for said removed bridge can be used in the new bridge, bidders will examine and consider old bridge material and bid accordingly.

And one bridge from about the center of "C" street along the line of 4th street to "A" street, and from "A" & "H" streets in the unincorporated portion of the town of Marshfield, said bridge to be 1200 feet long, 24 feet wide, 6 feet high from the top of the bridge to the top of the roadway, said bridge to have a span of 24 feet where it crosses slough, that portion on the north side of marsh to be supported by cedar piles and the lumber on the north side, on cedar mud-sills, to be covered with 3-inch planks to have a road bed of 18 feet and walk for footmen of 6 feet with suitable railing, all to be of good material and to be built to the satisfaction of the person or persons bidding for the construction of said bridge are to use 20,000 feet of lumber donated by E. B. Dean & Co.
