It is difficult to conceive of anything more horrible than the execution of Mrs. Potts, which took place at Elko, Nevada, last Friday, when she and her husband were hanged for the murder of a rancher at Carlin. The husband met his death after the usual routine of hanging, but the wife, who was a large woman, weighing 180 pounds, had a frightful time. After the doomed couple retired the night before the execution one of the watchers heard a choking sound, and sprang to the side of the cot. He found that she had covered her face with the clothes, and he hastily drew them down, with a started cry to the others on the death watch, for the bed clothes were blood-stained. It was then found that she had opened the arteries in her wrist and was bleeding to death. Not contented to wait until she died from loss of blood, she had stuffed a corner of the sheet in her mouth and was trying to suffocate herself. The deputies quickly bandaged the wounds on her wrists to stop the flow of blood and a messenger was hurriedly dispatched for a physician, but before he arrived she fainted from loss of blood, but she regained consciousness after the surgeon bandaged the wounds. She was still very weak and stimulants were given to revive her. Had she remained bleeding much longer it is more than probable that Potts would have had to face death alone on the scaffold.

The execution was proceeded with and owing to her heavy weight, a rupture of the carotid artery was caused, and a stream of blood burst forth from under the chin of the dead woman, staining her white raiment.

At 11:08 the body of Mrs. Potts was cut down, when it was seen that her excessive weight on a five-foot and a half drop had almost dismembered her head from the trunk, the muscles in the back of the neck alone supporting the connection.

Oregon.—Approaches to Yaquina bay.—Rocks reported.—A cluster of rocks, with about 8 feet of water over them, has been reported about 1 1/2 miles off shore, to the southwest of Yaquina bay entrance. A range through the mouth of Beaver creek and the peak of of Alsea Mount passes just the southward of the rocks.

Columbia river entrance.—Point Adams.—New Life Saving Station.—A new life-saving station has been placed on the south side of the entrance to the river, 1 1/4 miles N. E. of Point Adams Light.

Orford Reef.—Fox Rock.—Whistling Buoy Replaced.—The whistling buoy, painted red and lettered "Fox Rock," has been replaced off Orford Reef, its position being 1/4 of a mile S. by W. 3/4 from Fox Rock.

Coos Bay.—Off Fossil Point.—Non-existence of Fearless Rock.—Buoys Moved.—As the position given to the rock known as Fearless Rock has recently been carefully examined by the U. S. Engineers without discovering the rock, its non-existence can be no longer doubted, and it has therefore been removed from the chart of that locality issued by this Office.

The red nun buoy off Fossil Point has been moved to a position two-tenths of a mile W. N. W. 3/4 W from the point.

Notice to Bridge Contractors.

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the county court of Coos county, Oregon, for the building of two bridges, across the North fork of the Coquille River, at the bridge place, at or near where the bridge built by Betty & Mast stood, said bridge to be built in a workmanlike manner, and as the bridge that was carried away from said place by high water is located on the East farm between 2 & 3 miles below and a road and 18 feet and 10 inches in width, and the bridge to be used in the new bridge, bidders will examine and consider said old bridge material and bid accordingly.

And one bridge from about the center of "A" street along the line of 4th street to a point about midway between G & H streets in the northern portion of the town of Marshfield, said bridge to be 1230 feet long, 24 feet wide, 6 feet high from the marsh to the top of floor of bridge, said bridge to have a span of 24 feet where it crosses through the marsh, and the north side of marsh to be supported by cedar piles and the balance on bents resting on cedar and steel piles, to be covered with 5-inch plank, and have a road and 18 feet and 10 inches in width, and the bridge to be used in the new bridge, bidders will examine and consider said old bridge material and bid accordingly.
