The Drain Road.

The last Drain Echo says: "On Wednesday of last week, the engineer with his corps of twelve assistants commenced a pre-trail survey from East Marshfield, south along the east side of the Istimus slough to Utor City, where they will meet the six miles of logging road now owned by the California Lumber Company. From the southern terminus of this road they will proceed eight miles further to a point on the Coquille river some six miles west of Coquille City, and there will locate the southwest terminus of the Drain system, which comprises the Umpqua River, the Umpqua & Coos Bay, and the Coos Bay, Coquille & Coast Railroad companies, all of which have united under one management to build the line immediately from the Coquille to Drain. The engineers now engaged on the preliminary survey will at once upon completion of their work on the Coquille line, start in at Reedsburg on the Umpqua river and run south to Glasgow and Marshfield, and they will be closely followed by the engineer in charge of the location survey who will cross-section as he goes and be followed by the graders who will be at work within twenty days from now. It is believed that the line will be in operation within the Coquille to Reedsburg by February 1st, 1891, and as many men as can be utilized during the rainy season will be employed in making the rock cuts between Reedsburg and Drain, so it is safe to predict that the entire line will be constructed and in operation within one year from to-day. There need be no more skepticism in regard to the Drain Railroad."

Hon. D. P. Thompson has written a letter to the Oregon State Journal in regard to the last campaign, in which, among other things, he says:

"The Prohibition party also cast their votes for Governor Penney. Of these, say 2,000 votes, at least three-fourths of them voted the Republican State ticket for all except Governor. Some of the principal men of that party gave it to me as a reason for supporting Gov. Penney, that they propose to play the role of the abolition party did with the Whigs. They would assist in defeating the Republican party until it is tired of defeat, and then would join hands with the Prohibition party and overthrow the Democracy, and in that way secure its object. No effort was apparently made to elect any part of the Democratic State ticket except the Governor, and to accomplish this end the whole Republican ticket by this process of wholesale trading. The Democratic candidates for Congress and State Treasurer especially, were sacrificed to secure votes for Governor Penney. This trading process secured a large number of Republican votes for the Democratic candidate for Governor. The trade unions also generally voted for him. He had been elected four years ago by the same votes, and they generally voted for him again. The Union party had a full State ticket in the field with the exception of a candidate for Governor, and they generally voted for Governor Penney. The support given to Governor Penney here in Portland by Mr. Joseph Simon and his friends perhaps lost me four or five hundred so-called Republican votes, but as these votes were unreliable for the past four years, except when they could dominate the party to their own interest, this cannot be considered a party loss. The untruthful statements made by Governor Penney in regard to myself in his speech made in the Oregonian of May 12th, and repeated by him wherever he appeared during the campaign (except at Macleay where the Hon. Thomas H. Tongue was present to show his falsity if delivered,) did me no harm and made no votes for Governor Penney, but on the contrary helped me."

While I was slaughtered by the republicans, I am a republican still, and will be found working for the nominees of that party, if worthy, in future as I have done in the past. I believe in the republican party and its principles and especially in all matters relating to tariff and revenue."

Mrs. Hendricks, who is a good deal of a politician herself, is in the field for the nomination of Governor Hill. Part of the funny unwritten history of the early days of the Cleveland administration concerns the disgust of the whole Hendricks family with the absolute insignificance, both political and social, in which it suited the purposes of Governor Cleveland to leave it. Neither of the Hoosier pair held its tongue, and their joint wall of woe convulsed Washington with mirth and Indiana with indignation. Hendricks died hating Cleveland as vigorously as his negative nature permitted, and his wife, who has nothing negative about her, lives hating him. Her deep interest in Governor Hill's ambition is the most natural thing in the world. The Hendricks monument parade was more a Hill boom than anything else.—(Oregonian.)

As was predicted, the change in the weather has started the July run of salmon. The boats came in late yesterday morning with larger catches than have been reported for some weeks. The fish average large, and a great July run in anticipated. The market remains quiet and dull, and the canners are not feeling very jubilant.

"There will be fish rotting under the wharves here before long," said a canner from the Washington side last night. "The pack is not selling, and if fish come in freely the canners will get flooded very soon. The big Alaska pack is what ails the market."—(Astoria paper.)

Five stars were officially added to the flag of the United States July 4th, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Washington and Idaho. Before Wyoming's star is placed on the banner of the Union another fourth of July will have to come, as on that day the stars for the states are officially added. The states that came in under the omnibus bill will no longer be called new. They give away in newness to Idaho and Wyoming, although the latter state will be obliged to wait for a few days before it is added to, as the necessary amendment to the house bill is pending, and the bill is on the speaker's desk awaiting concurrence.
