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Our Natal Day.
The Fourth of July was celebrated in a patriotic manner in Coos county, and the people at the various celebrations seemed to thoroughly enjoy themselves. Probably the largest celebration in the county was held at Coquille City.
The streets and the band stand in front of the Olive hotel were gaily decorated with flags and flowers. The people began to gather on the main street as early as nine o'clock in the morning, and the crowd was entertained by music and drills by the Coquille City brass band. Too much cannot be said in praise of this organization, which certainly is a credit to Coquille City and Coos county. The boys looked splendidly in the new uniforms, just received, and the music and drill would have done credit to any band in the state. About eleven o'clock the procession formed and marched to the beautiful myrtle grove near town, where the programme, included music by the band; some excellent singing by a glee club; reading of the declaration of independence by Prof. W. W. Airey and an oration by John A. Gray. After the exercises a sumptuous dinner was served which was hugely enjoyed by a large number.
The Marshfield company of O. N. G. were represented by a detachment under charge of Capt. J. J. Earle. Hon. T. G. Owen, of Marshfield was president of the day, and a large number of Marshfield people were present.
In the afternoon various sports were indulged in, and at night both the halls were filled with merry dancers. The celebration at
EMPIRE CITY
was not large, but extremely pleasant. The people met in a grove near town where the usual exercises were held, and an able oration was delivered by Hon. S. H. Hazard, of Empire City. The dinner was such as the Empire City ladies usually provide, and was a grand affair. The celebration at
NEWPORT
was a time long to be remembered on account of the good time.
Gen. J. M. Siglin delivered one of his characteristic orations, which was received with applause. The races made more fun than can be described, especially the egg race, which threw the spectators into convulsions of laughter. The Newport people got up their celebration in good shape and deserve great credit therefor. There was no celebration at
MARSHFIELD, but in the evening a grand ball given by the Catholic Altar Society was well attended and proved a brilliant affair. Last but by no means least was the entertainment at
MYRTLE POINT.
The attendance was very large. On arriving at the grounds the order of exercises was opened by a short and appropriate address by Hon. J. H. Roberts, president of the day, followed by music by the band, reading of the Declaration of Independence by J. S. Stephenson, singing, "America," by the children, and "The Star Spangled Banner," by Miss Alice Schroeder, and recitation by Louis Wier. The Rev. Father Beutgen, orator of the day and Col. Rosa closed with a few remarks at the close of which the tables were spread and everybody invited to partake of a picnic dinner, and if anyone went away hungry it was their own fault, as there was an abundance left.

A dispatch from San Francisco dated July 6th, says: "Large rafts of logs are being constantly towed down the coast. Yesterday the steamer South Coast arrived from Fort Bragg with a raft of 316 piles in tow. Off Mendocino, during a heavy breeze, forty of the piles broke adrift and could not be recovered. Transporting lumber in raft form is becoming quite popular on the coast, although it has been mostly confined to bringing piles from Fort Bragg, yet there is no doubt that soon rafts of timber will be towed down from the Sound. In fact, the Pacific Pine and Lumber Company has purchased the right, for this coast, of Robertson's patent, for ocean rafts. The company has been incorporated, with a capital of \$50,000, and a raft will be constructed as soon as possible. The great trouble in floating an ordinary flat raft of logs, like that brought by the South Coast, is that the ends, if at all heavy, will inevitably cause a part to break adrift and captains often consider themselves lucky to bring any of their logs into port."

Fred Olsen, a lad aged about fifteen years, met a sad death at Porter on Wednesday. He had been at work in the cook house as a waiter for some time and a few days ago asked for a job in the mill, when Mr. Sangers told him he could not be employed unless his parents consented. The boy came back and said it was all right, and was put on the staging which runs along the slab conveyor to the end over the fire. His duty was especially to watch for fire and extinguish the same with a hose. The work was really nothing, and about half past eleven the fatal day he came down into the engine room full of boyish fun, and after romping about awhile went back to his place. At dinner he was missed, and when some one asked after him, one of the men came out and found that the poor boy had fallen from the platform near the end of the slab conveyor, a distance of about 40 feet, and was lying about six feet from the fire, literally roasted by the heat. No one saw him fall, but probabilities are that he made a mis-step and falling was stunned so that he could not crawl away from the fire, and never regained consciousness. His parents live at Bay City mill, and he was a bright young man, greatly liked by all his associates. The funeral services will be conducted at the Baptist church to-day at 2 o'clock p. m., by Rev. F. E. Scofield.
