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Cheapsness Not Desirable.

President Harrison, Speaker Reed, McKimley, and other republican leaders have recently made the assertion that cheapness is not always desirable, whereas the democratic newspapers break forth into exclamations of feigned astonishment, and want to know if it is possible that these eminent republicans preach the doctrine that Americans do not want cheap goods?

It is certain that the citizens of this country, and particularly the average laboring man, do not want cheap goods when they can only be had by the degradation of labor.

When cheapness results from improved methods of production, saving in transportation rates, and in profits paid to foreign manufacturers, capitalists and syndicates, then Americans want cheap goods. This is what they get under the tariff laws. We have a great deal of carpet of late and this article will illustrate the effects of protection. An ingrain carpet that sold in 1872 in New York for \$1.70 a yard can be bought to-day for 47 cents, and the reduction is about the same in all other grades.

Every one is familiar with the enormous reduction in all kinds of iron and steel and the reduction of 60 per cent. in earthenware and in everything else where protective rates have been lifted. These industries have been established so that the army of men employed are consumers and competition has brought the prices down in many instances to lower rates than the goods can be bought for in foreign markets. This is the kind of cheapness the thrifty citizens of this country want.

There is a point beyond which prices cannot be reduced without cutting down wages and that form of cheapness laboring men do not want. There is no doubt but on this coast the prices of manufactured commodities could be greatly reduced by the free use of Chinese labor. The Mongolians can live on one-fourth the sum required to support the American laborer and could supplant him in thousands of the industries of the country. Then instead of a population which requires and supports schools, literature, and churches we should have one without any use for the refinements and luxuries of our common life. The American laborer would be compelled to come down to the level of the Chinaman if he would exist in the same field. The politicians who advocated slave labor, and who, when in their days of power, so reduced and degraded white labor that a white man was considered inferior to a negro, the politicians who have put every brand of economy and shame upon toil; in all this history of this country, are the men who are working to-day to cut down wages, decrease wages, degrade labor so that we may have things cheap. It is dish and blood that they hold so cheap. It is because they put a low valuation on manhood that they are willing to cut off every dignity and luxury from the life of the laborer, so that he can have cheap boots. This is the cheapness the American people do not want. The building up of industries and the general prosperity of the country is a matter the average citizen is able to see. If the people want the cheapness that makes life cheap, labor cheap, and men cheap, let them vote the democratic ticket, for that is the way to get such results.

The committee on tax legislation, now in session at Salem, are reported to have nearly agreed upon a comprehensive measure of reform, involving increase of the inquisitorial powers of county assessors, the creation of a state board of equalization and the repeal of the mortgage tax and deduction for debtors. This is very wholesome legislation, and the committee merits praise for its courage and intelligence. There is not yet absolute agreement upon all the points involved, and the bill to be reported by the committee must still run the gauntlet of the legislature. It is scarcely possible, however, that the thorough agitation of popular awakening on this subject should not result in at least some partial measure of reform. Whatever concessions and compromises it is found necessary to yield to popular timidity and prejudice, it is to be hoped that the provisions for a state board of equalization and for the repeal of deduction for debt will be retained. The repeal of the mortgage tax law is an important and desirable reform; but it is less vital than the others. This law would lose much of its mischievous potency as an element of unequal taxation, if deduction from assessment for debt were abolished. It would remain a serious obstruction to the investment of foreign capital in the state, and the cause of high interest and a local monopoly in the money-lending business. The great influence that makes for unequal taxation, however, is deduction for debt, which is also an element contributing to the undue profits of the money trade. With this out of the way, and a state board of equalization in active operation, the burden of taxation would be distributed with reasonable equity.

Stanley, the great African explorer, is coming to this country on a visit. He will be warmly welcomed.

A Portland hunter explains how to shoot snipe as follows: "The trouble is that most hunters load too heavily. They put in 3 to 3½ drachms of powder and 1½ ounces of shot, while 2½ drachms of powder and 1 ounce of No. 10 shot is enough. But the best thing is the smokeless powder cartridges, which allow one to see whether he has brought down his bird or not. In shooting snipe it is not good to be in much of a hurry. They zig-zag for twenty or thirty yards and then get steady, and that is the time to fire. One can afford to wait, as the shot will overtake the bird fast enough. If one loads too heavily, and his arm gets all braced up, he will flinch after awhile and miss his birds. Load light, keep cool, and don't be in too great a hurry to fire, is the correct motto for a snipe-shooter."

Hon. Binger Hermann was interviewed in Portland on Sunday and among other things, said: "I have returned to Oregon to remain during the few weeks of our brief vacation, largely for a change and also to inform myself of the further demands of the people, as well as to visit friends and relatives, among the latter being my aged mother, who resides in Coos county. My time being so limited I shall be able only to call at a few places in our state during this visit. As the early rains will soon make travelling by stage to the coast difficult, I shall go direct there now."

"Will Oregon secure another congressman?"
"Yes. It is conceded by all in the East. The house committee on census has discussed this question, and there was no division of sentiment as to Oregon's right to an additional member, and the bill now pending includes Oregon among the states entitled to additional representation."

J. W. Harrison, a coal broker of San Francisco, in his weekly circular, says there is a large preponderance of buyers and very little to be purchased. Prices have been again marked up, and the outlook is very discouraging for a sufficiency of supplies. Cabled reports from Australia do not intimate any early settlement, hence our principal supply point is cut off, with very slim chance of any early relief. The coal mines are straining themselves to meet the deficiency, but the scarcity of carriers is the material setback for the moment. It is no easy matter to handle 4000 tons of coal per day, which is our average daily consumption when for present we have only our local collieries to draw from. Wellington managers report a daily output of about 2000 tons, which they could readily increase to 1200 tons if they were not harassed with labor troubles. The withholding of this difference from the market is a serious loss to the public here, as well as to the owners of the property.

Thos. Blain, of North Coos river, has been visiting friends in Calapooia valley the last week; while here he went deer hunting with a friend and they failing to fasten their horses securely enough in the evening, awoke the next morning to find themselves "solitary and alone in the midst of a vast wilderness," and no horses anywhere to be seen. They immediately looked around to see if they could find any way out of their dilemma. After a while they discovered two colts and by strategy and much coaxing caught one and endeavored to saddle it, but here was the tug of war, and the colt after gently remonstrating for awhile took the managing of affairs into its own hands, and when Charles came into the possession of his senses again he was down the hill about 60 yards from where he started, while Tom was even in a more deplorable condition, the colt evidently endeavored to divest him of the greater portion of his wearing apparel with a degree of success which made Tom's appearance very picturesque.—(Plaindealer.)
