### A BEHORNING RACK.

BATTLE EASILY CONTROLLED DURING THE OPERATION.

Simple in Construction and the Cost is Small—May Be Carried in a Wagon and Moved from Place to Place, Handy For the Farmer.

Mr. A. P. Rhall of Coos Bay describes a handy rack for slaughtering cattle in *American Agriculturist*.

Farmers who wish to obtain their cattle experience in slaughtering by controlling their own operation, this is the purpose. The rack is made of four inch square timber. Two pieces, each six feet long, are laid at the base and are connected by four crosspieces eight feet long. Two of these crosspieces are placed each one foot from the end of the six foot pieces. The other two are placed in the middle between the first two, about one foot apart. Above the inner ends of the four foot frame are four feet high. Four inch timber is used at most places, and the frame should be well lined throughout as shown.

Near the top of a two inch board are fastened, one on each side of the uprights. One of these is shown clearly, the other merely suggested. It
