HOW ANARCHISTS SHOULD BE DEALT WITH

The attempted assassination of President McKinley coming like lightning from a clear sky, has given the country a painful shock.

Of course the would-be murderer was a foreign anarchist, and this brings up again the problem of what to do with the anarchists. It is useless to talk of excluding them. If European nations with their systems of passports and police espionage fail, we would better try some other means.

The interpretation of law under which the Chicago anarchists were hanged by the neck until

they were dead is justice and good common sense. The persons who publicly advocate assassination ought to be held equally guilty with the actual assassin who has committed the deed under the influence of their teachings. Should President McKinley die from the effect of his wounds, every avowed anarchist within reach of the law of this country ought to be rounded up and hung, as accessory to the crime.

We want no press censorship or abridgement of free speech in this country; but every man should be held responsible for the effect of his utterances. If he incites the mob to arson or murder, he should be held equally guilty with the poor fool who becomes the dupe of his teachings.

The man who shot President McKinley is no more guilty than is Emma Goldman or Herr Most or any other person who advocates the murder of the heads of governments.

A strict enforcement of this principle would soon put a stop to the abuse of free speech, and do injustice to no end.

STRAIGHT BUSINESS

The Daily Review came out Tuesday evening enlarged from a five to a six column folio. While the change effects an improvement in its appearance and is a step forward on the part of its publishers, the readers of the paper are little, if any, benefited by the change as the increase in size of the paper is fully taken up with additional advertising, giving the reader only about the same amount of news matter as formerly.—Roseburg Plaindealer.

The above is taken as a text, for two reasons. First, because it is a curiosity, in the way of a display of a littleness of spirit with which few newspaper men would publicly acknowledge themselves to be afflicted. Second, because it carries a false idea which no newspaper man ought to be guilty of disseminating, even for the sake of belittling a contemporary.

The idea that an increase in the advertising patronage of a newspaper is of no benefit to the subscribers is one which is already too prevalent among people who have not thought the matter out.

As a matter of fact, in a properly conducted newspaper, every increase in advertising patronage results in direct benefits to the readers. It costs money to run a newspaper, and the better the paper the more money it costs. With a given income, the possibilities within reach of the publisher are circumscribed at a certain line. Increase the income and the field of his achievements is enlarged.

Take this paper as an example. When the present management took charge last December the MAIL was as good a paper as its patronage justified, perhaps better. The improvement since then has been rendered possible mainly by the increase in advertising patronage.

The new type which now appears in this paper has been paid for out of advertising receipts; the increase in the office force is made possible only by increase in advertising receipts; country correspondence is paid for out of advertising receipts; press dispatches bringing the latest news cost money which would not be available but for the increase in advertising patronage.

The cost of the DAILY COAST MAIL during fair week was advertising money. The liberal bulletin giving the particulars of the attempted assassination of President McKinley which was posted around town at 5 o'clock last Friday afternoon; the double column of telegraphic news which

preceded the "Opera bouffe"

(touching the Boer war) arises from the editor of Kitchener in issuing proclamations threatening exile. The Boers care nothing for the most spirited output of the typewriter.

The threat of exile must make them smile. It can have no terror for them. If conquered, they would seek exile, for they will never live where they had a republie and be the subjects of England. They may be worn down, the surviving remnant at last defeated, but their first impulse will be to desert the scene of their blasted efforts and the ashes of their farms.

They do not flinch before bayonets, and they are not to be terrified by pellets of paper.

The effect on England is more serious than the mere cost in lives and money, terrible as this has been.

The great effect will be in the destruction of British prestige. For some reason not clearly defined England had been regarded as a military nation. Only
