Their attention should also be directed to keeping cows only whose milk commined a high percentage of butter fat. They should not delude themselves with the idea that if they had cows giving plenty of milk all that they required to do to get plenty of butter fat was to feed them well. By all means feed them well; but they might rest assured that no amount of feeding would raise the percentage of fat in the milk of a cow which was naturally low to equal the milk of acow whose produce was naturally rich Two cows could quite easily produce the same quantity of milk in the year, yet when that milk was turned into entier the one cow might have produced 100 pounds more butter than the other. That was not all, for the cowwhich had the 100 extra pounds of butter bad not probably cost any more to keep than the other. 
