### OUR DEAD PRESIDENT

The death of President McKinley caused as great a shock as did the first news of the shot which laid him low. ## HOW TO DEAL WITH ANARCHISTS

The assassination of President McKinley has brought most forcibly to the front the question of what to do with the anarchists, and it is a poor sort of newspaper or prominent man that does not have an infallible solution ready. The press, however, seems to confine itself to hurried but vague talk about amending the immigration laws, excluding anarchists, preventing anarchists meeting and prohibiting the advocates of anarchy from uttering or printing their murderous tenets. All these makeshifts are radically and irremediably weak. Until we have infallible and impeccable official mind-readers, no immigration laws can exclude anarchists, without excluding all immigration. Prohibit anarchists from meeting in public and they will meet in private where they cannot be watched. Prohibit them from speaking and they will whisper. As a matter of fact the American people would not endure for a week, any system one-half so rigorous as those which on the continent of Europe, with all the power of despotic governments behind them, have no perceptible effect in stopping the growth of anarchistic sentiment.

Prohibit a man from advocating his ideas, and every one will make it his business to find out what those ideas are. Imprison a man for talking and you make a martyr of him at once. Prevent any class of citizens from meeting freely, and you arouse antagonism in quarters where no sympathy with anarchy could be found.

The effective way to deal with anarchists in this country was pointed out years ago, in the case of the Chicago assassins, and no better course could now be adopted than to round up every known anarchist within reach of the law, and for every one who could be proved to have advocated violence provide a piece of hemp. Hang every mother's son and daughter of them who has spoken or written instigation to murder, and it will be many a long year before any will be found to work the feelings of the crowd up to the point where a president of the United States will be murdered in cold blood. This will only be cold justice. Emma Goldman, Herr Most and all the rest of them are as guilty as the wretch whose bullet laid the president low. Let them suffer the same fate as he, and such "leaders" will be careful where they lead.

### A MODEL VILLAGE.

Power of Example Finds a Town in Cities, State of Beauty.

How to establish a model village is illustrated in Leedale, located about 18 miles from St. Louis and begun by a manufacturer ten years ago. It differs from Bellman in that its residents enjoy the liberties permitted to dwellers in any municipality, and therein is believed to lie the secret of its success.

There is no bus in any form. No resident has ever been asked to cut his grass or to go to church or keep sober.

The opportunity was created, and then the people were allowed to work out their own material salvation. It is a park village with winding roads, an abundance of trees and about a third of an acre of ground with each cottage.

These cottages are sold to those

of the employees who care to buy,

the monthly payment being about equivalent to city rents. Each house has running water and electric lights, and with each cottage the corporation furnishes a lawn mower and plants from a greenhouse established for that purpose.

There are a bowling alley and a billiard room, a clubhouse for unmarried men and a lecture and dance hall, schools, a library, a baseball field, tennis courts and skating ponds.

"At the start scarcely any of our people made any gardens; scarcely any planted flowers," says the creator of this bit of earthly paradise. "They did not know how to do it or care for it. By infections example they now all have gardens and handsome yards.

For three years I have lived in the center of the village with my own family

and my daughter's family."
