### OREGON'S NEWSPAPER LAW

In the laws of Oregon of 1880, appears the following on page 30, which protects every citizen from being imposed upon by publishers of newspapers or periodicals, either in the state or elsewhere. Everybody should save this copy of the law for protection against such attempts: SECTION 1. That whenever any person, company or corporation owning or controlling any newspaper or periodical of any kind, or wherever any editor or proprietor of any such newspaper or periodical, shall mail or send any such newspaper or periodical to any person or persons in this State without first receiving an order for said newspaper or periodical from such person or persons to whom said newspaper or periodical is mailed or sent, shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person or persons, whether said newspaper or periodical is received by the person or persons to whom it is sent or not.

The MAIL has received a proposition from a certain "Lithographic Company," doing business from a postoffice box in New York City, proposing to furnish a monthly publication called "My Lady," to be used as a supplement with the COAST MAIL. "My Lady" is a "magazine" of 12 pages and a cover. It is illustrated with a reckless disregard of the cost of brilliant reds and greens and blues and yellows. The reading matter is of a kind that marks "My Lady" as the literal descendent of the kind of publications that have recently been excluded from the mails by an order of the postoffice department, and the advertisements verify the identification. "Free, Free, Free," "Send no money," "All for Ten cents," "Hypnotism," "Most wonderful Bargain ever Seen!" Watcher, jewelry, silk dresses, medicine, most anything you want are all free. We must regretfully decline the offer of the Lithographic Company, which does business from a postoffice box in New York City. The regret is that our turning down of the scheme

will not kill it. Some suckers will undoubtedly be found to jump at the chance to get, at a nominal price, a fine red and green and blue supplement to go with their papers, and their confiding subscribers will be induced to contribute to the sharpers against whom the postoffice department is making such a good fight. Let us give these brethren one pointer, however: If you must stand in with the sharks, do not pay them anything for the privilege. They will be glad to furnish you the "supplements" for nothing if you will agree to circulate them among your subscribers, and we are not sure but they would pay you for your trouble, besides.

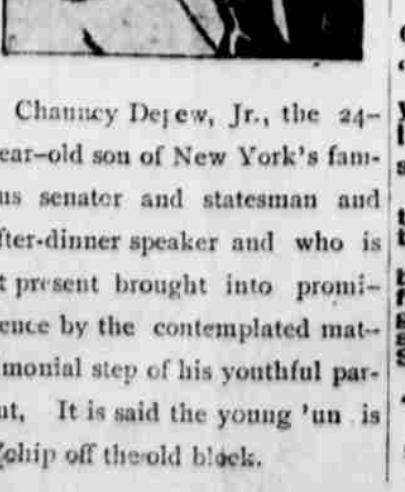

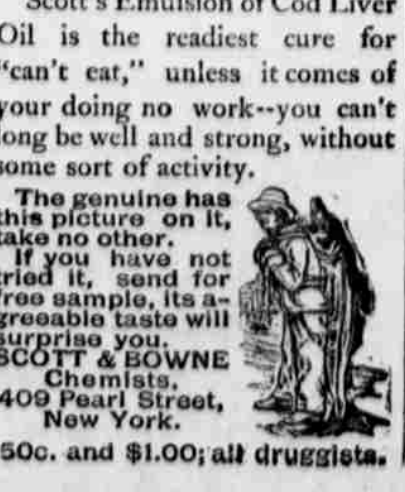
