As contemplated, Saturday night, Coos Bay Camp No. 8408 was instituted at I. O. O. F. hall. The place was none to large for the occasion, and had the entire class appeared for initiation the hall would have been overtaxed.

State District Deputy Consul, W. A. Wooliever, assisted by several members of Bandon camp, did the work. A class of 106 were inducted into the order, though the number would have been much larger had the weather been more favorable.

The ritualistic work was only cursorily exemplified owing to the vast amount of business before the camp. Deputy Wooliever proved himself a king of organizers in the lodge room as well as outside.

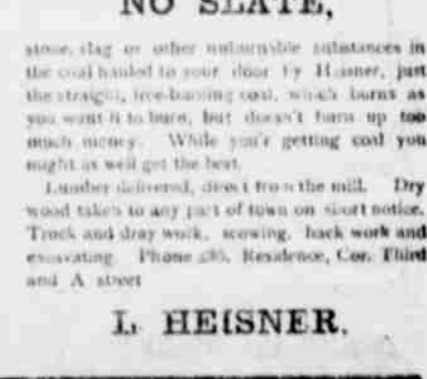
