Arrangements are practically complete for the issue of the first number of THE DAILY COAST MAIL on the morning of the coming New Year.

The DAILY COAST MAIL will be a five-column, four-page paper. It will contain four to five hundred words of special telegraphic dispatches, giving the cream of the world's news in condensed form. It will be just two days ahead of the Oregonian on this news.

Local news will be handled fully and accurately, and a strenuous effort will be made to give all the news of the county that is worth printing.

The paper will be issued in the morning in time to catch all outgoing mails and steamboats.

As performance is better than promise, we will not make too many pledges before-hand, but we will assure every subscriber that he will get his money's worth. We have placed the subscription price at a very low figure, as we prefer a large circulation at a low rate to a small subscription list at a high one.

The price of the daily by mail, to strictly cash-in-advance subscribers will be 50 cents for a single month or 4 months for \$1. If not paid in advance the price will be 50 cents per month straight by mail. We have not yet fixed a price, by carrier, around the town, but it will be placed as low as possible, covering the cost of delivery.

This daily is launched as a permanent institution. It is what the managers of the Mail Publishing Co. had in view when they entered the newspaper field here one year ago. Marshfield is enterprising enough to support a daily paper, and the paper will more than repay the community.

Starting on a small scale, the paper will be improved just as fast as the patronage will justify. All profits will go into the plant, and in a few years Marshfield can boast of having one of the best small dailies on the coast.

Bring or send in your subscription before the first of the year and get the first number of the first permanently established full-fledged daily paper in Coos county.
