PAY VISIT TO COOS

It is now thought that Brownie and Gougher, two of the men wanted in San Francisco for the murder of Policeman Robinson last month have been in Coos county recently. About the 4th day of this month two strangers called at John Yeakle's camp on the Isthmus and got breakfast, saying that they were from Roseburg looking for work. A couple of days later they passed the camp again, evidently headed for Roseburg.

On Saturday morning, Rev. Smith, on his way in from Roseburg, saw the men at Ladd's and talked with them. They stated that they had just come up from Ukiah, but were very vague in their statements. Mr. Smith says that the description of the two men match with that of the two men wanted in San Francisco, as given by the Examiner, and he feels confident that these are the parties. He telephoned Sheriff of Douglas county on his arrival here, and the men may be picked up if they show themselves in Roseburg.

Mcshall Carter's theory is that the men had been in Portland where one of them was arrested a week or so ago, that these two planned the overland and got to Durbin Saturday night, Feb. 14, visited the state there, and came down the Umpqua and through the back country, avoiding the towns. They did not slow up in Marshfield, and evidently concluded that this country would afford them no asylum and that they would better get out.

MAIL CONTRACTS FOR

NEXT FOUR YEARS

Awarded to Local People at Fair Figures—Speculators Shut Out

The Postoffice Department has announced the awarding of contracts for carrying the mail on several star routes in the Western states, for the next four years.

The new rule, that bidders must live contiguous to the routes the bid on, has had the good effect to placing the contracts to a great extent in the hands of the men who propose to do the work and not in the hands of Eastern sharks, who expect to catch snails to subcontract at a starvation figure.

The cost to the government will be about 30 per cent higher on the average than under the old contracts, but the service will undoubtedly be correspondingly better.

The postoffice department has acted favorably on the petition recently sent in asking for the establishment of a postoffice at Crescent Mine No. 2, and has ordered the office established. The name of the postoffice and probably of the town which is to be, will be "Maxwell," the name asked for. "Crescent City," having been used already for an Oregon office, now discontinued.

Fred J. Ward has been appointed postmaster, and the office will be served with a daily mail, being on the Marshfield-Coquille City route. This will be a great convenience for the people at the mine and the settlers in that vicinity, who have been a long ways from a postoffice since Coos City went down.
